Naples, September 25.

THE Count de Conversano having threatened to murder one of his Servants for demanding his Dismission, and the Servant thereupon applying to the Alcaide of the Court for Justice, the Alcaide sent to desire the Count to comply with the said Servant's Request; but the Count despising the Message, gave Occasion to the Alcaide to make Representations thereof to the King, who ordered immediately the Count into Confinement in the Castle Nuovo. On the 17th Instant the King nominated M. Ciocche to succeed to the vacant Bishoprick of Brindisi.

Rome, Oct. 3. Cardinal Querini has received a Courier with Dispatches from the Senate of Venice for him and Cardinal Rezzonico, relating to the Affair of Aquileja; to reconcile which, an Expedient is proposed to suppress that Patriarchate, and to form, instead of it, two Archbishopricks, one in Gorizia, in the Empress's Dominions, and the other at Udine, in the State of Venice. On the 23d past, being the King of Spain's Birth-day, Cardinal Portocarrero was complimented by the Foreign Ministers, the Cardinals, Prelates and Nobility, Subjects, Feudatories, and Well-wishers of that Crown; on which Occasion he entertained fifty of them at a most magnificent Dinner.

Warsaw, Oct. 5. Several of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers are set out this Morning for Dresden, and their Majesties Departure remains fixed for the 8th Instant, the Relays being already ordered. Their Majesties propose reaching Kuttno on the 8th in the Evening, and on the 9th Kleczow, the 10th Posenia, the 11th Bauchwitz, and the 12th Pforten. The Ladies of Honour, and the principal Officers of the Court, set out also on the 8th, and take their Route by Way of Breslaw. The last Advices from the Ukraine say, that a considerable Party of Heyducks had been entirely defeated on the 20th of last Month, by a Detachment of Soldiers from the Crown Army.

Stockholm, Oct. 6. Last Week publick Prayers were put up in all the Churches of this Kingdom, to beseech the Almighty to deliver us from the Contagion which still continues to rage very much amongst the horned Cattle, not only in the Neighbourhood of this City, but also in sever-

al of the Provinces of this Kingdom: And as it is apprehended that this Distemper may be attended with dangerous Consequences to such as may happen unknowingly to eat of the Flesh of any infected Beast, the Royal College of Physicians have drawn up, and caused to be printed, by order of the King and Senate, some new Instructions for the Inspectors of Provisions, with Regard to their viewing all Beasts that shall be killed for publick Use.

Vienna, Oct. 7. By Advices received from Bosnia we are assured, that the Janissaries have revolted against the Governor of that Province, who having sent a Body of other Troops against them, an Action ensued, in which above 700 Men had been killed, and that the Bashaw had been obliged to send to Constantinople for Succours. That the Bashaw of Belgrade being apprehensive of something of that Kind, had found Means to persuade the Janissaries in his Government to swear they would comply with the Orders of the Porte, which he said he had just received; and as soon as they had taken the Oath, he informed them, that the Sultan's Orders were, that one Part of them should march directly towards Bender, and the other to some very remote Place; which raised so great a Ferment amongst them, that they seized the Tchaoux of the Porte, and had him in their Hands when the Letters came away; however, it was hoped they would release him, and obey the Orders of the Porte.

Dresden, Oct. 11. Their Majesties are expected To-morrow at Pforten, a Seat of Count Bruhl's in Lusatia; it is thought his Majesty will stop there two or three Days to take the Diversion of Hunting. The King's heavy Baggage is already arrived in this City from Warsaw. Advice has been received, that in the Night between the 8th and 9th Instant, some Rogues had found Means to break into the Castle of Niechwitz, belonging to the Prime Minister Count Bruhl, and had carried off every Thing that was valuable in it. Several Detachments of Horse have been sent out in Pursuit of these Robbers, but we have not as yet learnt that they have heard any Thing of them.

Berlin, Oct. 13. The King of Prussia has lately given a Pension for Life to M. Voltaire of 5000 Rixdollers per Annum; and on the 2d Instant, that Author's new Tragedy of Cataline was

was acted before his Majesty and the Foreign Ministers. The Margravine of Bareith is still here, though she has been recovered for some Time from her late Illness. By Letters received from Warsaw, 'tis certain that the King of Poland left that Place on the 8th Instant. His Majesty does not return by the Way of Breslaw, but by Posen and Grotten; and 'tis thought he will stay a Day or two at Count Brühl's House in Lusatia before he goes to Dresden. There have been within these few Days past nineteen Officers of the Regiments of Foreade and Wirtemberg taken up and put into Prison in this City, but the Cause of their Imprisonment is not yet known.

Copenhagen, Oct. 13. The Weather being cold, and the young Family being already settled in Town, their Danish Majesties have thought fit to leave Friedensburg a little sooner than they intended, and are expected this Day at the Palace of Christiansburg, in order to take up their usual Residence for the Winter; though the King proposes still to make Weekly Excursions to Jagersberg, for the Diversion of Hunting, as he did last Year. The Small-Pox continues very fatal in this City, great Numbers, chiefly Children, dying daily of it; and the Dyfentery and Purples are also very rife, but not very fatal; though the latter has proved so to Count Baben, a young Nobleman who died lately of that Illness in Laland; for not only Copenhagen, but also several Parts of the Country are visited more or less with these Periodical Distempers. The Officers who carried the usual Present of this Court to the Dey of Algiers, are lately come back from thence, and have brought Presents for their Danish Majesties in Return from the Dey.

Brussels, Oct. 19. It is generally reported, that the Duke d'Arenberg will be declared Prime Minister of this Court in the Room of the Marquis de Botta. Several Detachments of Troops, as well Foot as Horse, have received Orders to march and take up their Quarters in the different Towns and Villages upon the Borders of this Country, in order to prevent Wheat and other Grain's being carried out by Strangers, which has been greatly practised of late. The States of the Province of Brabant are to assemble To-morrow, to take into Consideration the Demand of the usual Supply made by the Chancellor of that Province. We learn from Mons, that twenty Men out of each Company of the Garrison of that City, are appointed to work at the new Fortifications of that Place, which are vigorously carried on. They write from Lille, that the Inspectors of the French Horse and Foot had received Orders to dismiss all such Soldiers as appeared to be under five Foot four Inches high, and to fill up the Companies again with new Recruits. By Letters from Paris of the 16th of October we are informed, that the Time had been prolonged for the Clergy's conforming to the King's late Declaration, and that the Bishops were actually making out Accounts of the yearly Incomes of the Estates and Livings of the Clergy,

in order to comply therewith. When these Accounts are given in, each Clergyman will be taxed in Proportion to his Income, and 'tis said that this Way of taxing, which is in lieu of the twentieth Penny, will produce the King upwards of twenty Millions of Livres a Year. Advices from Genoa say, that the Master of a Ship from Barcelona had informed them, that the Spanish Squadron which was assembled at Carthagen, was sailed from that Port to cruize against the Corsairs of Barbary; that it consisted of some Ships of War, and four armed Xebecs, and was commanded by Don Pedro de la Costa; and that since that Squadron had put to Sea, they have not perceived any of those Corsairs cruizing upon the Coasts of Spain.

Hague, Oct. 20. During the last Assembly of the States of Guelderland, at Zutphen, at which the Prince Stadtholder assisted, those States came to the following Resolutions; To take some Measures for the more easy and regular Payment of their Quota to the Generality; to make his Highness first Member of the College of the Nobles of their Province; and to appoint him Rector of the University of Harderwyck. They likewise resolved to enlarge his Serene Highness's Territories about Loo; but the Prince declined the Offers they made him of a very considerable Sum by way of Gratuity, and some other Advantages they had determined to confer upon him. M. Kluppel has taken the Oaths as the Republick's Consul at Tripoli.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to their Excellencies the Lords Justices, that on Wednesday the 26th Day of September last, about Eleven o'Clock at Night, Mr. Thomas Emes, Vestry Clerk of St. George's Queen Square, was knocked down before his own Door in Eagle Street, near Red Lyon Square, Holborn, by Persons unknown, and was not only robbed of his Watch, Money, one Silver Shoebuckle, his Shirt Buttons, a Silver headed Cane, and his Hat, but likewise very much wounded on his Head, and bruised on his Temples, of which Wounds and Bruises he languished seven Days and died; Their Excellencies, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, are pleased to promise his Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who gave the Blows) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a further Encouragement, their Excellencies are pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid upon the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders, by the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury.
