Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council.

Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council were this Day pleased to order, that the Parliament which stands prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-fifth of this Instant October, should be further prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-second Day of November next.

Messina, Sept. 21. The Governor of this City has received Orders not to suffer any Vessel, of what Nation soever, either to load or unload any Merchandize, without the Master's producing a Pass. There is now in this Port a Neapolitan Frigate of 20 Guns with two armed Barks, that have been cruizing on the Coast of Apuglia, and are on their Return to Naples.

Petersbourg, Oct. 6. Her Imperial Majesty has been at one of her Country Palaces with the Great Duke and Great Dutchess ever since the 20th of last Month, and is not expected here these eight or ten Days.

Stockholm, Oct. 10. The last Advices from Finland say, that the Swedish Troops had quitted their Quarters of Cantonment, and were retired into the Towns and Fortified Places for the Winter; that the Russian Troops had all done the same; that they enjoy a perfect Tranquillity there; and that the Officers of both Nations lived in a very friendly Manner, and often visited each other. The King had a few Days ago a violent Fit of the Cholick, but his Majesty is now perfectly recovered. The Prince Successor, and the Princess his Spouse, went on Tuesday last to take the Diversion of Hunting in the Forest of Nora.

Warsaw, Oct. 10. On the 7th Instant an Express arrived at Court with the agreeable News of the Opening of the Tribunal of Petrikau on the 5th, under the Direction of the Prince Sanguski, who had been elected Marshal of that Tribunal the preceding Day; and that they had named two Deputies to wait on his Majesty, to acquaint him with their Proceedings; which Deputies arrived here on the 8th early in the Morning, and were immediately admitted to an Audience of the King, and met with a very gracious Reception; after which their Majesties, accompanied by Count Bruhl, and some other Lords and Ladies of the Court, set out from hence on their Return to Dresden.

Madrid, Oct. 12. The Letters from Cadiz of the 6th Instant, mention the Arrival in that Bay of four Xebecks of 20 Guns each, lately built at Carthagena; and of two French Ships of War from Louisbourg; and that the Soberbio, a Register Ship, worth a Millon and a Half of Dollars, was ready to sail for the West Indies.

Lisbon, Oct. 13. Their most faithful Majesties have lately taken an Excursion of three or four Days to Mafra, partly out of Devotion, on Account of St. Francis's Festival, and partly for the Sake of hunting the Stag and Wild Boar in the King's Park near that Place. The next Places their Majesties have fixed upon for Hunting are Salvaterre and Villaviciora, near the Frontiers of Spain, where Preparations are making for their Reception.

Vienna, Oct. 14. On the 4th Instant, being the Emperor's Name-day, there was a very numerous Court at Schonbrun, and their Majesties dined in Publick; at which the Nuncio assisted in Form, as is usual upon such Occasions: His Excellency afterwards dined at a great Table of above 100 Covers, which was prepared for the Ambassadors, the principal Nobility of both Sexes, and the Foreign Ministers. In the Evening there was an Opera performed at the Theatre of the Place, after which there was a Fire-work in the Garden. On the 6th Instant, being the eldest Archdutchess's Birth-Day, who then entered into the 13th Year of her Age, her Highness received, upon this Occasion, for the first Time, Visits in Form from the Foreign Ministers. We have begun here, pursuant to the Orders of the Empress Queen, to pay off Part of the Arrears which was due to the Imperial Troops, the necessary Funds having been assigned for that Purpose. The Count de Haugwitz has been appointed Vice-President of the Mint and of the Mines; and the Government of Hermanstadt in Transylvania, vacant by the Death of General Meligni, has been given to Count Thierheim. They write from Brinn, that the States of Moravia had opened their Diet on the 20th of last Month; and the Day following they began to deliberate upon the Demands which had been made by Count Salm and M. Frisch, her Imperial Majesty's Commissaries.

Ratisbon, Oct. 15. The Members of the Evangelical Body held Yesterday their usual Conference, and deliberated upon the Proposition which had been made of laying before his Imperial Majesty some new Representations on the Subject of divers Religious Grievances in the Empire, and to demand the Redress of them; but as some of the Members alledged that it was not

not in their Power to vote on this Occasion before they had received new Instructions from their Courts, no final Resolution was taken thereupon.

Prague, Oct. 16. The States of this Kingdom, who have been assembled here for some Days, have now under their Consideration the Propositions which have been made to them on the Part of the Empress Queen, and in all Appearance they will soon be agreed to.

Dresden, Oct. 18. Their Polish Majesties arrived here Yesterday from Pforten. The Baron de Malzahn, the new Prussian Minister, is also arrived here; he comes to relieve M. Vofs, who is going with the same Character to the Court of Vienna.

Hambourg, Oct. 20. We learn from the Frontiers of Hungary, and particularly from the Bannat of Tameswaar, that the Turkish Garrisons have all been lately changed without the least Disorder on the Part of the Janissaries. The Master of a Ship arrived here from Algiers reports, that the Dey and Regency, being under strong Apprehensions of a Visit from the French and Spaniards, have greatly augmented their Garrisons, and made all necessary Preparations to prevent a Surprise.

Berlin, Oct. 20. The King, accompanied by General Count Rothenbourg, arrived on Saturday last from Potzdam in this City. The Baron de Sierstoff, Minister from the Elector of Cologne, had soon after a private Audience of his Majesty. In the Evening his Majesty paid a Visit to the Queen Mother, and on Sunday returned to Potzdam. Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick is set out for Wolfenbuttle, where he proposes to stay some Time. The Baron de Thienen, the new Danish Envoy Extraordinary to this Court, arrived here on Saturday last from Copenhagen. On Wednesday last M. Helzendorff, an Engineer belonging to the Train of Artillery, made Tryal of a Piece of Cannon of a new Invention in the Presence of his Majesty and several General Officers, which was greatly admired.

Ofnabrug, Oct. 21. The Count de Richecourt, Envoy Extraordinary from their Imperial Majesties to the King of Great Britain, arrived here on Saturday last from Hanover, and set out immediately for Vienna; his Excellency was saluted by the Cannon of our Ramparts both at his entering into and going out of this City. The Marquess de Valori, and M. Wall, the French and Spanish Ministers, passed by this Place the same Day from Hanover; the first on his Way to Paris, and the latter for the Hague, in order to embark there for England.

Brussels, Oct. 22. The Assembly of the States of Brabant ended Yesterday, but their Resolutions have not as yet been made Publick. Letters from Lisle say, that they have established there a publick Hospital, in which all such Poor People, as used to be continually begging about the Streets, are obliged to work at different Employments. This Method is pursued throughout all French Flanders, and it were to be wished that something of the same Kind was established in this City.

Brussels, Oct. 26. Before the Separation of the General Assembly of the States of Brabant, a Resolution was taken to grant the Subsidies demanded of them by the Grand Chancellor of Brabant, on the same footing as they were last Year: The Grand Chancellor made also the three following Propositions to the said Assembly, in the Name of the Empress Queen, 1. To abridge the Clergy of that Province of some of the Privileges they at present enjoy. 2. That the Clergy give in an exact Inventory of all the Revenues they have possessed since the Death of Charles the Fifth. 3. That they furnish the Sum of two Millions of Florins. Which Propositions it is believed will be taken into Consideration at the next Assembly; and 'tis assured, that this Sum of two Millions of Florins is to be employed in the rebuilding the old Court that was burnt down. Another Ordonnance is just published, by order of Prince Charles of Lorraine, against the People of Mechlin, who are continually interrupting the People employed in cutting the Canal from Louvain to that Place. Letters from Paris of the 23d of October say, that the East India Company have lately proved 26 Mortars, carrying two Bombs each, which they propose sending to some of their Settlements Abroad. This Company have three Ships Loading at Port l'Orient, bound for Bengall. The Prince of Saxe is soon expected at this Court. As we hear nothing farther relating to the Clergy, 'tis expected they will all conform to the Orders which the Intendants have received on that Subject. The King has lately borrowed fifteen Millions of the Farmers, and Receivers General; that is to say, eight Millions of the First, and seven of the Last; and 'tis believed some new Fund will soon be established for the Payment thereof; and the rather, as the Comptroller General has a Project on foot for that Purpose. We learn, that the Duke of Modena is making a Port at Massa, in order to promote the Trade and Commerce of his Country.

Hague, Oct. 27. The Magistrates of Amsterdam have issued a Proclamation, by which they offer 6000 Florins for the apprehending and bringing to Justice a Person known by the Name of Count Tottleben, who has lately carried off a young Lady of that Town, under the Age of Fifteen, Heiress to a considerable Fortune. On Friday last died at Rotterdam, aged Eighty-two, Count Hoogendorp, formerly Receiver General of the Union, which Place had been some Time ago transferred to one of his Sons.

Helvoetsluys, Oct. 28. Last Night arrived here, after a very tedious Passage, the Right Hon^{ble} the Lord Anson, with the Yachts under his Command.
