Algiers, October 18.

THE Fathers of the Order of the Holy Trinity, and those of the Order of Mercy, who arrived here lately from France, have already agreed with this Government for the Redemption of 170 Slaves, amongst whom are several Women and Children; and the Spanish Commissaries, who are coming hither in order to treat for the Redemption of the Slaves of that Kingdom, are expected towards the End of the Month. Within these few Days past, ten Chebecks, and some other armed Vessels, are put to Sea on a Cruize; and 'tis believed, most of the other Vessels of the Regency, and even the Men of War, will be ready to follow them in about a Fortnight or three Weeks.

Petersbourg, Oct. 20. The Empress proposes going from hence to Moscow in the Month of December next; for which Purpose her Imperial Majesty has already named several of the Nobility who are to accompany her in this Journey; and, according to all Appearances, she will afterwards take a Tour into the Ukraine. The Count de Lynar, Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Denmark, has agreed with the Ministers of the Grand Duke, in Quality of Duke of Holstein, for the Restitution of all Deserters on both Sides.

Milan, Oct. 23. An Ordonnance is published here, which regulates the Value of all Kinds of Specie that shall hereafter pass current in Austrian Lombardy. We learn from Leghorn, that upon Advice received there, that a Contagious Distemper still continued to rage on the Coast of Africa, the Regency had ordered, that no Ship whatsoever, coming from Tetuan, or any other suspected Place, should be admitted into that Port without performing Quarantine.

Stockholm, Oct. 24. The King continues to enjoy a pretty good State of Health. They are getting ready, in our Arsenal, thirty Pieces of Iron Cannon, and some of Brass, which his Majesty proposes as a Present to the Grand Signior. The Prince Successor, and the Princess his Spouse, are expected here on Monday next from Drottingholm for the Winter.

Warsaw, Oct. 26. The Count de Mniseck, Marshal of the Court, set out on Tuesday last for Dresden; and Count Bielinski, Great Marshal of the Crown, sets out To-Day for his Seat at Otzwoltz. The Tribunal of Petrikau goes on so very successfully, that the Marshal, Prince Sanguski, has left the Direction of it to the Deputy of Volhinia, and is set out for Podolia. We have received Advice, that Prince Sablonowski, Palatine of Rava, had assembled a Body of 2000 Men, with whom he had march-

ed in Pursuit of the Heyducks; that he had come up with and beat several Detachments of them, and had at length drove them all from that Side of the Frontiers of the Ukraine; but we hear that another Body of them have since appeared on the Side of Lower Podolia. The Prince of Radziewie, eldest Son of the Palatine of Wilda, Great General of Lithuania, died lately at the Castle of Zolkiew.

Madrid, Oct. 26. Yesterday being the Birthday of the Queen Dowager, the same was celebrated at the Escorial with the usual Solemnities. The Infant Cardinal is expected this Evening, in order to pass some Days with their Catholick Majesties. The Queen is entirely recovered from her late Indisposition, but continues to take the Bark to prevent its Return.

Bern, Oct. 27. A Minister from the King of Sardinia is shortly expected here, in order to treat for the Renewing of the Capitulation for the Regiment which this Canton has in the Service of his Sardinian Majesty. M. Calmette, Minister from the States General to the Protestant Swiss Cantons, is arrived at Neuchatel, and has delivered his Credential Letters to the Magistrates and Council.

Vienna, Oct. 28. Frequent Conferences are held at Court, at which the Empress-Queen of Hungary assists, in order for the improving the Commerce and regulating the Finances of her hereditary Countries. The Emperor, accompanied by Prince d'Aversperg, returned to Schonbrun from Upper Austria on the 26th in the Morning; and in the Afternoon their Imperial Majesties came hither to visit the Empress Dowager, who is pretty much indisposed. We are assured, that it is resolved to raise a Regiment of Seventeen Companies of Invalids, who are to be employed in mounting Guard in this City.

Copenhagen, Oct. 31. On the 29th Instant in the Evening, as his Majesty was returning from the Country Seat of his Britannick Majesty's Minister, where he had been to partake of an Entertainment, his Coach was overturned, whereby the Grand Marshal, who was with his Majesty, received a small Contusion, but the King himself had not the least Hurt.

Dresden, Nov. 1. On the 21st past, M. Calkoen, the new Minister Plenipotentiary from the States General, had his first private Audience of his Majesty, the Queen, and all the Royal Family; and on the 24th he had the Honour of dining at the King's Table. The Marquess des Illarts, the French Ambassador, arrived here on Thursday last from Warsaw. Their Majesties set out Yesterday for Hubertsbourg, in order to be present at a great hunting Match which is to be in that Neighbourhood on Tuesday next; and 'tis thought they will not

not return hither till the Beginning of next Month,

Berlin, Nov. 3. The Margravine of Bareith, who was thought some Days ago to be much better, is again relapsed, and obliged to keep her Chambers. On Thursday last the Princess, Spouse of the Margrave Henry, appeared in Publick for the first Time since her Lying-in, and was complimented thereupon by all the Royal Family.

Hambourg, Nov. 6. The Chamberlain Berregaard, who is appointed Envoy from his Danish Majesty to the Court of Saxony, arrived here last Night on his Way to Dresden.

Cologne, Nov. 6. The Elector of Cologne set out from Mergentheim on the 2d Instant for Munich. We have received an Account from Aix la Chapelle, of the Death of the Count de la Marck, Knight of the Order of the Holy Ghost, Lieutenant General of the Armies of his most Christian Majesty, and Grandee of Spain of the first Class.

Paris, Nov. 6. On the 3d Instant Count Caunitz, their Imperial Majesties Ambassador to this Court, had his first private Audience of the King at Fontainebleau. On the 2d, the Marquess de Mirepoix, Ambassador from this Court to that of Great Britain, set out from hence on his Return to London. By Letters from Provence we have Advice, that the Squadron, which sailed some Time ago from Brest, under the Command of M. Macnamara, arrived the 25th past at Toulon, where it was unrigging, in order to be laid up.

Hague, Nov. 10. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland will open their Assembly To-morrow; and on Tuesday next their Serene Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange propose setting out from Loo on their Return hither. Lord Anson, Lord Delawar, Lord Hardensse, and several other Persons of Distinction, propose setting out To-morrow Morning for Helvoetsluys, to wait for his Britannick Majesty, who is expected there on the 13th from Hanover. By Letters from Middlebourg of the 6th Instant, we have an Account of the Death of M. Cocquelle, ancient Burgomaster and Councillor of that City. The last Letters from Russia, Sweden, Denmark, and other Northern Countries, all agree in their Accounts of the Frosts having set in so very severe, that most of their Rivers were already covered with Ice of a prodigious Thickness, so that in many Places their Carriages passed over the Rivers without running the least Risk.
