A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

THEREAS our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the Twenty fecond Day of this Instant November; We, with the Advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said Twenty second Day of November, to Thursday the Seventeenth Day of January next; and we have given Order to our Chancellor of Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And we do hereby further declare our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Seventeenth Day of January next, be held, and fit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Seventeenth Day of January next.

Given at our Court at St. James's the Twenty first Day of November, 1750, in the Twenty fourth Year of our Reign.

GOD Save the KING.

Petersbourg, Nov. 6. On the 1st Instant, all the Nobility and Foreign Ministers appeared at Court, to compliment her Imperial Majesty on her coming to reside in her Winter Palace; on this Occasion the Court was very numerous and extremely splendid. The Frost is set in here very severe. The Lake of Ladoga is froze up, as is the Little and Great Neva, the Ice whereof is so firm, that People go upon it without the least Danger; and several Ships, which did not depart in Time, are entirely froze up. We have received Advice of the Death of General

Bismark, Commander in Chief of her Imperial Majesty's Forces at Pultowa. General Arnimb, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Poland, has communicated to this Court, a Rescript which his Polish Majesty caused to be published before his Departure from Warsaw; whereby he enjoyns all the Governors and Commanders bordering upon the Russian Territories, to be very careful not to suffer the least Prejudice to be done to the Subjects of this Empire; and particularly not to receive any Person whatsoever, who shall attempt to escape out of the Russian Territories.

Warfaw, Nov. 17. On the 12th Instant 2 Fire broke out in the Belfry of the Church adjoining to the Convent of the Dominicans, which burnt with such Violence, that 'twas impossible to extinguish it. There were four fine Bells in it, three of which were melted; and the fourth, which was the largest, fell down and broke to Pieces; but by good Providence, neither the Church, nor the Convent, nor any of the neighbouring Houses, received much Damage. The last Letters from Moldavia say, that the Plague continues to make great Havock in several Towns and Villages in that Province; that it had spread itself into Upper Podolia, where it likewise carried off great Numbers of People; and that they were taking all imaginable Precautions to prevent its spreading.

Vienna, Nov. 18. Her Imperial Majesty advances happily in her Pregnancy. Count Nadasty, Chancellor of Hungary, is returned hither from Presbourg, where he has been to regulate every Thing necessary for the Opening of the General Diet of the States of Hungary, which now seems fixed for the 18th of April next. Their Imperial Majesties continue in their Resolution of going thither on that Occasion; of which the Protestants of that Country having been informed, are determined to make use of that Opportunity to solicit her Imperial Majesty for some Redress of their Religious Grievances. Frequent Conferences continue to be held at Court upon the Means for making the Establish-

ment of Commerce at Trielte become more flourishing. The greatest Part of the Officers and Soldiers belonging to the Regiment of Prey-fing, which was lately disbanded, are already pro-

vided for in other Regiments.

Bern, Nov. 20. Towards the End of last Month, a Duel was fought at Lausanne, between Mr. Rowley, a younger Son of Admiral Rowley's, and M. Monrond of that Town; in which Mr. Rowley had the Missortune to be wounded; whereupon M. Monrond, who gave the Challenge, fled to Lyons; but as Mr. Rowley is fince recovered of his Wounds, which were at first thought to be dangerous, and is now preparing to set out for England, it is expected that M. Monrond will soon return from Lyons, in order to take his Tryal for this Offence.

Ratisben, Nov. 22. We have received Advice from Munich, that Count Konigsfeldt, Great Chamberlain and Minister of State to the Elector of Bavaria, died there the 16th Instant, aged 72. He had filled several considerable Employments, and amongst others, that of Minister Plenipotentiary to the Congress at Soissons.

Hambourg, Nov. 24. The Duke of Meck-lenbourg has lent hither M. de Birckholtz, one of his Privy Councillors, in order to represent to the Count de Raab, the Imperial Minister, the Reasons which oblige that Prince to forbid the raising of any more Recruits for the Imperial Troops in Mecklenbourg, least the other Princes of the Empire should insist on doing the like. By Letters from Copenhagen we learn, that the Small Pox continues to carry off great Numbers of People in that City; and that the Queen of Denmark is again with Child. We have received Advice of the Death of Lieutenant General Benseld, Commander of the Danish Troops in Norway.

Berlin, Nov. 24. M. Rozencrantz, late Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, fets out To-morrow on his Return to Copenhagen, from whence this faid he will go with the same Character to the Court of Great Britain. M. Thienen, his Successor, who has been extremely ill of the Small Pox, is in a fair Way of Recovery. The Winter is set in very severe, and there has already fallen a great Quantity of Snow. The Distemper amongst the horned Cattle continuing to rage in this Country, all necessary Precautions are taking to prevent its spreading. Advice has been received from Ebeleben, of the Death of Prince Augustus of Schwartzbourg Sondershausen, in the 60th Year of his Age.

Hague, Dec. 1. On Saturday Morning died here, after some Months Illness, the Right Ho-nourable the Countess of Hyndford, Lady of the Bed-chamber to her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange. The States General have issued a Placart, in which they say, that having

been informed that the Distemper among the Cattle, after having in a Manner ceased in their Dominions for some Time, had begun again to rage with great Violence; their High Mightinesses were convinced the Renewal of that Daltemper was owing to the Introduction of foreign Canter for which Reason they prohibit the Importation of any Cattle into the Republick's Tetritories till after the 1st of April next, on pain of a Fine of 2000 Florins, besides the Confiscation of the Cattle for the Benefit of the Poor; those who shall be unable to pay the Fine, are to be publickly whipped, and banished for Life. The States of Holland likewise came to a Resolution during their last Assembly, to prohibit a-fresh the Importation of all Cattle into their Province, as also to forbid the transporting of Cattle from one Place to another, without proper Certificates of Health from the Bir F, or other Officers of the respective Places. I'mis Resolution has fince been made publick, by a Proclamation dated Nov. 21, N. S.
