Smyrna, November 15.

THREE Men of War, of 40 Guns and 180 Men each, carrying the Emperor's Flag as Grand Duke of Tuscany, commanded by Mr. Acton, arrived here the 12th Instant from Constantinople, and immediately saluted with several Pieces of Cannon all the Turkish and other Ships in this Port, which Salute was soon after returned with a like Number of Guns. At Night Mr. Acton came to this City, accompanied by his chief Officers, and several Gentlemen who came with him from Leghorn, amongst whom was the young Count de Richcourt, whose Father is Prime Minister to the Grand Duke of Tuscany; and as the Commander had Letters of Recommendation from the Baron de Penckler, Minister from their Imperial Majesties at Constantinople, addressed to the Baron de Hocheper, the States General's Consul at this Place, all possible Marks of Respect were shewn them. These three Men of War will shortly put to Sea again for Alexandria, from whence they will return to Leghorn; but Mr. Acton proposes touching at the Ports of Tripoly, Tunis and Algiers, in his Way thither.

Lisbon, Dec. 18. Cardinal d'Acunha, Grand Inquisitor, died here a few Days ago, in the 87th Year of his Age. On the 6th Instant Count Stahremberg arrived here from Vienna, and on the 8th had his first private Audiences of the King and Queen, whom he complimented, in the Name of their Imperial Majesties, upon their Accession to the Throne. His Excellency proposes to stay here till the Month of June next, being charged with some particular Negotiations. The Fleet from Maragnan, an Island on the North Coast of Brasil, which we were in great Pain for, as well on Account of the Corsairs of Barbary, as the violent Tempests we have had here for these two Months past, is at length happily arrived in this Port, very richly laden. The King has lately appointed Don Emanuel Freire d'Andrade, to be Governor of Elvas; Don Francois Lagoa Nogueira, to be Governor of Olivenca; and Don Pierre de Souza de Castellobranco, to be Governor of Setubal.

Petersbourg, Dec. 29. On the 18th Instant Count Bestuchef, Great Chancellor, sent to M. Wahrendorff, the Prussian Minister, the Passports he had demanded for himself and his Domesticks. Orders were likewise sent to the different Post Masters, to furnish him with such a Number of Horses as he should require on his Journey. And an Officer of the Guards waited on him at the same Time to acquaint him with the Instructions he had received to accompany him to the Frontiers, in order to see that he had all necessary Accommodations. On the 24th M. Wahrendorff took Leave of the Foreign Ministers, and set out from hence the same Night, accompanied by all his Domesticks, on his Return to Berlin.

Warsaw, Jan. 4. A few Days ago a great Inundation happened in these Parts, at a Time when we least expected it, the Vistula being then froze over, but all on a sudden that River swelled to a prodigious Degree, and the Water forcing its Way from under the Ice, spread itself with surprizing Rapidity over the neighbouring Country, and did a vast deal of Damage to several Villages. But the Water is since got into its proper Channel, and it continues still to freeze very hard.

Dantzick, Jan. 5. The Disputes between the Magistrates and Citizens of this City, which were thought to have been amicably adjusted in Conformity to the King's Rescripts, seem now to be breaking out again, and each Party talk of sending Deputies to Dresden with new Representations to his Majesty on that Subject.

Florence, Jan. 8. Prince Esterhasi, whom their Imperial Majesties intend for their Ambassador to the King of the Two Sicilies, set out the 31st past in the Morning from Rome for Naples, having been received with great Distinction by the Pope and the principal Cardinals during the short Stay he made in that City.

Vienna, Jan. 9. Their Imperial Majesties appear again in Publick, and on Wednesday last the Baron de Klingraff, the new Prussian Minister, was admitted to his first private Audiences. On the 7th Instant Count Harrach was installed, with the usual Ceremonies, President of the Aulick Council of the Empire. The Baron de

Engelshoff, Lieutenant General and Commander in Chief of the Bannat of Tameswear, is arrived here; and has laid before the Court, an Account of the State and Condition in which he found her Imperial Majesty's Troops in those Parts: This Week a considerable Sum of Money has been paid into the Hands of the Treasurers of several publick Hospitals and Alms Houses in this City, which was left them by the Will of the late Empress Dowager.

Dresden, Jan. 10. The Count de Bellegarde, Heir to the late Count Saxe, is arrived here from Turin, and proposes to set out shortly for Paris.

Berlin, Jan. 12. Advice has been received at Court by an Express, that the Dutchess Dowager of Saxe-Eisenach, Anne Sophie Charlotte, Daughter of Albert Frederick, Margrave of Brandenburg, and Sister to Prince Margrave Charles, died at Sangerhausen in the Night between the 5th and 6th Instant, in the 45th Year of her Age. The King has permitted the Prince of Anhalt Dessau to resign his Military Employments of Field Marshal and Colonel of a Regiment of Foot in Garrison at Bielefeld, on Account of his ill State of Health.

Paris, Jan. 16. The Body of the late Marshal Saxe was carried from Chambord on the 7th Instant, attended by all his Servants, a Detachment of his late Regiment, and two Pieces of Cannon, which are to fire every half Hour Night and Day, a Ceremony that has been observed ever since his Death. His most Christian Majesty has named Count de Frise, his Nephew, to be Colonel of that Part of his Uncle's Regiment called Dragoons; the other Part, called the Uhlans, being to be disbanded. The King has also continued to him the Regiment of Foot called La Dauphine, which he commanded before; and has moreover granted him a yearly Pension of 12000 Livres. By Letters from Cadiz we are informed, that the Begona, a Register Ship, and the Pearl Frigate, were arrived there from La Vera Cruz and the Havanna, having on board a great Quantity of Gold and Silver, besides other valuable Effects.

Hague, Jan. 19. Almost all the Members of the States of Holland and Westfrizeland are arrived, and will open their Assembly Tomorrow. Last Week Mess. Horeman and Sterck took their Oaths before the Council of State, in Quality of Captains in the Troops of this Republick. His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange has appointed the Baron de Wassenar to be President of the Council of his Domains; and M. Ockerffe, Honorary Pensionary of the Town of Ziriczee, is appointed Steward of his Highness's Household, in the room of M. de Vrybergen, who has desired and obtained Leave to resign that Employment.

The King has been pleased to grant unto John Suthner, Doctor in Divinity, and one of his Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, the Place and Dignity of a Prebendary of the Free Chappel of St. George in the Castle of Windsor, void by the Death of James Barclay, late one of the Prebendaries of the said Free Chappel.

The King has been pleased to constitute Thomas Beach, Esq; to be his Majesty's Attorney General in the Island of Jamaica, in the room of Robert Penny, Esq; deceased.
