**W**HEREAS upon Wednesday the 16th Day of January last, and at other Times, great Numbers of a false, malicious, scandalous and seditious printed Paper, intituled, *Constitutional Queries, earnestly recommended to the serious Consideration of every true Briton,* were by the Penny-Post, and other Ways secretly sent and dispersed to and amongst his Majesty's Subjects in and about the Cities of London and Westminster, in which are contained many most false and injurious Reflections on his Majesty: And whereas both Houses of Parliament have taken into Consideration the dangerous Tendency of the said infamous Libel, and conceiving the most just Indignation against the Author, Printers and Publishers thereof, have by their unanimous Resolution declared, That the said printed Paper is a false, malicious, scandalous, infamous and seditious Libel, containing the most false, audacious and abominable Calumnies and Indignities upon his Majesty, and the most presumptuous and wicked Insinuations, that our Laws, Liberties and Properties, and the excellent Constitution of this Kingdom, are in Danger under his Majesty's legal, mild and gracious Government, with Intent to instill groundless Suspicions and Jealousies into the Minds of his Majesty's good Subjects, and to alienate their Affections from his Majesty and his Royal Family. And that in Abhorrence and Detestation of such abominable and seditious Practices, the said printed Paper be burnt by the Hands of the common Hangman, in the New Palace-Yard, Westminster, on Friday the 25th Day of January last, at One of the Clock in the Afternoon, and that the Sheriff of Middlesex do attend at the said Time and Place, and cause the same to be burnt there accordingly. And in order that the Author, Printers and Publishers of the said false, scandalous and seditious Libel, may not escape the Punishment due to their Crimes, both Houses of Parliament have, by their several Addresses, humbly desired his Majesty, That he will be graciously pleased to give immediate Orders, that the most effectual Means be taken for discovering the Author, Printers and Publishers of the said Libel, and for bringing the said Author, Printers and Publishers to condign Punishment. His Majesty having taken the same into his Royal Consideration, and in order to comply with the said Addresses, and that so great a Crime may not go unpunished, and to deter others from the like Practices, doth therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, hereby order, direct and command all his

Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and all other Civil Magistrates whatsoever, to make diligent Search and Inquiry after the Author, Printers and Publishers of the said Infamous Libel; and that they do apprehend and seize the said Persons, and give proper Information thereof, that the said Offenders may be punished according to the utmost Rigour of the Law. And his Majesty doth hereby strictly charge and command all his loving Subjects, that they do use their utmost Endeavours to discover and apprehend the said Offender or Offenders. And for the Encouragement of all Persons to be diligent and industrious in their Endeavour to make such Discovery; His Majesty doth hereby promise and declare, That any Person or Persons, who shall discover the Author, Printers or Publishers, or any of them, of the said Infamous Libel, so as such Offender or Offenders be convicted of the said Offences, or of any of them, shall have and receive, for every such Offender so discovered and convicted as aforesaid, the following Rewards, viz. For the Discovery of the Author thereof the Sum of *One Thousand Pounds*; for the Discovery of each of the Printers thereof the Sum of *Two Hundred Pounds*; and for the Discovery of each of the Publishers thereof the Sum of *Fifty Pounds*. For the Payment of which said several Rewards, for every such respective Offender so discovered and convicted, his Majesty hath given the necessary Orders to the Lords Commissioners of his Treasury.

Whereas on the 26th of January last, an Advertisement was inserted in the Gazette concerning the Loss of the *Ellis Brigantine*, Roger Francis, Master, near Looe in Cornwall, offering a Reward to those Persons who were concerned in Plundering and Carrying away the Cargo of the said Vessel, provided they were brought in by the 12th Instant, and delivered to Mr. George Dyer, of Looe aforesaid. And whereas it is found that such Notice has not fully answered the Intentions of the Sufferers; The Merchants of London, Trading to those Parts, have thought proper to insert the Penalties for such Offenders, by an Act of Parliament of the 12th of Queen Anne, and made perpetual in the 4th of King George the First, which enacts,

That in case any Person or Persons enter on board a Ship or Vessel in Distress, without Leave of the Commander, or the superior Officer of the Customs, and take away Goods from the said Ship, for such Offence shall, within the Space of Twenty Days, make double Satisfaction to the Parties aggrieved, or suffer Twelve Months Imprisonment.

The following Clause enacts,

That in case any Goods be found upon any Person or Persons, carried off from such Ship or Vessel in Distress, shall, upon due Notice, deliver them to the Owner, or the Person authorized to receive the same; or in Default, for such Goods shall pay treble the Value.

And the succeeding Clause enacts,

That if any Person or Persons shall wilfully do any Thing tending to the immediate Loss of the Ship, or shall steal any Pump belonging to the same, or shall be aiding and abetting in stealing such Pump, shall be made guilty of Felony without Benefit of Clergy.

And that no one guilty, may plead Ignorance of the Penalties and Punishments which the Law has provided, the Concern'd, who are desirous, if by any Means, to avoid prosecuting the Offenders, do give till the 1st of March next for bringing in the said Goods.

And the Persons so doing shall be sufficiently rewarded by Mr. George Dyer as aforesaid; but in Case of Failure the Offenders will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity of the Law. And whoever will discover where any of the said Cargo is concealed, so that it be recover'd, shall receive as a Reward Ten Pounds per Cent. and so proportionably for a larger Sum.
