PRESENT,

The King's most Excellent Majesty, Lord Chancellor, Lord Chamberlain, Lord President, Duke of Bedford, Lord Privy Seal, Duke of Newcastle.

THEREAS upon Wednesday the 16th Day of January last, and at other Times, great Numbers of a falle, malicious, scandalous and seditious printed Paper, intitled, Conflictutional Queries, earneship recommended to the Serious Confideration of every true Briton, were by the Penny-Poft, and other Ways fecretly fent and dispersed to and amongst his Majesty's Subjects in and about the Cities of London and Westminster, in which are contained many most falle and injurious Reflections on his Majefty : And whereas both Houses of Parliament have taken into Confideration the dangerous Tendency of the faid infamous Libel, and conceiving the most just Indignation against the Author, Printers and Publishers thereof, have by their unanimous Resolution declared, That the faid printed Paper is a false, malicious, fcandalous, infamous and feditious Libel, containing the most false, audacious and abomi nable Calumnies and Indignities upon his Majesty, and the most presumptuous and wicked Infinuations, that our Laws, Liberties and Properties, and the excellent Constitution of this Kingdom, are in Danger under his Majesty's legal, mild and gracious Government, with Intent to inftill groundlefs Sufpicions and Jealoufies into the Minds of his Mai fly's good Subjects, and to alienate their Affections from his Majesty and his Royal Family. And that in Abhorrence and Deteftation of fuch abominable and s ditions Practices, the faid printed Paper be burnt by the Hands of the common Hangman, in the New Palace-Yard, Westminster, on Friday the 25th Day of January last, at One of the Clock in the Afternoon, and that the Sheriff of Middlefex do attend at the faid Time and Place, and caufe the fame to be burnt there accordingly. And in order that the Author, Printers and Publishers of the faid false, scandalous and seditious Libel, may not escape the Punishment due to their Crimes, both Houses of Parliament have, by their feveral Addresses, humbly defired his Majesty, That he will be graciously pleased to give immediate Orders, that the most effectual Means be taken for discovering the Author, Printers and Publishers of the said Libel, and for bringing the faid Author, Printers and Pub lishers to condign Punishment. His Majesty having taken the fame-into his Royal Confideration, and in order to comply with the faid Addresses, and that so great a Crime may not go unpunished, and to deter others from the like Practices, doth therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Counail, hereby order, direct and command all his

Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and all other Civil Magistrates whatfoever, to make diligent Search and Inquiry after the Autlor, Pr n ers and Publishers of the faid Infamous Libel; and that they do apprehend and feize the faid Perfons, and give proper Information thereof, that the faid Offenders may be punified according to the utmost Rigour of the Law, And his Majefty doth hereby firictly charge and command all his loving Subjects, that they do use their utmost Endeavou s to d scove . nd appr -hend the faid Offender or Offenders. And for the Encouragement of all Perfons to be diligent and industrious in their Endeavour to m ko fuch Discovery; His Majetty doth hereby promile and declare, That any Person or Persons, who shall discover the Author, Print rs or Publifhers, or any of them, of the faid Infamous Libel, fo as fuch Offender or Offenders be convicted of the faid Officies, or of any of them, shall have and receive, for every such Offender fo differenced and convicted as aforefaid, the following Rewards, viz. For the Difcovery of the Author thereof the Sum of One Toujand P u is; for the Discovery of e h of the Printers th reof the Sum of Two H ndied  $P u \rightarrow r$ ; and for the Discovery of e ch of the Publishers there if the Sum of Fity P un. For the Payment of which faid feveral Rewards, for every fuch respective Offender so discovered and convicted, his Majesty hath given the nec flary Orders to the Lords Commissioners of lis Treasury.

That in cafe any Perfon or Perfons enter on board a Ship or Vessel in Distress, without Leave of the Commander, or the superior Officer of the Customs, and take away Goods from the faid Ship, for such Offence shall, within the Space of Twenty Days, make double Satisfaction to the Parties aggrieved, or suffer Twelve Months Imprisonment.
