Whereas in the Act of Uniformity, which establishes the Liturgy of the Church of England, Provision is made for such Alterations in the Prayers for the Royal Family, as from Time to Time shall become necessary, and be directed by lawful Authority : It is thereupon this Day ordered in Council, That in the Morning and Evening Prayers, in the Litany, and in all other Parts of the Publick Service, as well in the Occasional Offices, as in the Book of Common Prayer, where the Royal Family is appointed to be particularly prayed for, the following Form and Order shall be observed, viz,

Westminster, March 22. This Day, the Lords being met, a Mellage was fent to the Honourable Houft of Commons by the Honourable Sir Henry Bela lenden, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod. acquainting them, that, The Lords, authorized by virtue of his Majesty's Commission for declaring bis Royal Affent to feveral Acts agreed upon by both Houfes, do defire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read ; and the Commons, being come thither, the faid Commission, intpowering his Royal Highnels the Duke of Cumberland, the Lord Archbilhop of Canter« bury, the Lord Chancellor, and feveral other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Allent to feveral publick and private Bills, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to,

An' AET for granting an Aid to bis Majely by a Land Tax, to be raifed in Great Britain, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven bundred and fifty one.

An Act for enabling his Majesty to raise the several Sums of Money therein mentioned, by Exchequer Bills, to be charged on the Sinking Fund ; and for impowering the Commissioners of the Treasury to pay off the Old and New unsubscribed South Sea Annuities, out of the Supply granted to bis Majesty for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and fifty one; and for enabling the Bank of England to hold General Courts and Courts of Directors, in the Manner therein dirested, and for giving certain Persons Liberty to fubscribe Bank and South Sea Annuities omitted to be subscribed, pursuant to two Acts of the last Seffion of Parliament. An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters. An Act to indemnify Perfons who have omitted to qualify them selves for Offices and Employments within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for that Purpole. An Act for the better carrying on and regulating the Navigation of the River Thames and His, from the City of London Westward, to the Town of Cricklade in the County of Wilts. An Act for repairing the Road leading from West Lavington to the Devizes, and from the Devizes to Seend, in the County of Wilts.

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Their Royal Highnesses the Princess of Wales, the Duke, the Princesses, the Issue of the Prince and Princess of Wales, and all the Royal Family.

Petersbourg, March 2. They talk of a Camp's being to be formed in Livonia towards the Beginning of May next; and 'tis even faid that her Imperial Majesty, accompanied by the Great Duke, will go thither, in order to view the .Troops which compose it.

On the 28th paft the Rome, March 6. Duke of Deux Ponts, after having observed the Curiofities of this City, had an Audience of Leave of the Pope; and, on the 1st Infant, set out on his Return to Germany. He presented Chevalier Coltrolini (who attended him during his Stay in this City) with a Gold Snuff-Box adorned with a large Diamond; to his Lady and Brother a Gold Repeating Watch each, and 150 Crowns to be distributed amongst his Servants. The Morning of his Departure, the Minister of the Elector Palatine refiding at the Court of Naples, came, by Order of the Elector his Master, to this City, to compliment the Duke, on Notice that he did not defign to go to Naples. On the 2d the Commander Solari, Ambassador from the Grand Master of Malta to the Pope, landed at Civita Vecchia from on Board a Malteze Ship of War; which Ship is to cruize for fome Weeks on the Roman Coast against the Barbary Pirates. The Grand Master has fent a very rich Present to • the Pope by this Ambaffador. Vienna, March 10. Her Imperial Majesty has appointed Field Marshal Prince Lobkowitz, who arrived here a few Days ago from Prague, to be Military Governor of that City, in the Room of the late Field Marshal Count Ogilvy; and the Regiment of Foot, vacant by the Death of the faid Count Ogilvy, is given to General Sincere. Prague, March 10. The late fudden Thaw has melted the Snow fo fast upon the Mountains of Bohemia, that the Waters came down in fuch Torrents as to overflow the Moldau and Szazawa; by which Means all the neighbouring Towns and Villages were laid under Water for feveral Days together, and have thereby received very confiderable Damage; but as the Waters begin to fall, we hope foon to hear of their being confined again to their usual Channel. Venice, March 12. Since the Accommodation of the Dispute with the Pope, and the Return of the Nuncio, nothing farther relating to the Affair of Aquileja has been transacted here; but it is faid that the Convention for the final Adjustment of that Matter is concluded at Vienna to the mutual Satisfaction of the Republick and of that Court. All that remains to be done is, to get the Approbation of the Court of Rome, and the necessary Instruments from thence for putting the Treaty in Execution; both which, it is imagined, will be obtained with Difficulty. Brussels, March 22. The States of Brabant have been affembled for fome Days past, and have under Confideration divers Propositions which have been made by the Chancellor on the

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers [Part of the Government. A new Edict is just published here, ordering all Persons whatsoever, who are possessed of any old Coin-which is not full Weight, to carry it directly to the Mint, in order to its being new coined. The late Tempestuous Weather and heavy Rains have caufed the River Senne, that runs by this City, to overflow its Banks, by which Inundation the lower Part of this City, and its Neighbourhood, have received confiderable Damage. Hague, March 25. Yesterday was observed as a folemn Day of Fasting and Humiliation throughout these Provinces, when his Highness the Prince of Orange, accompanied by his Royal Confort, and the reft of his august Family, attended at Divine Service both in the Morning and Afternoon. The States General have publisted a Placart, whereby they forbid the bringing any fat horned Cattle into these Provinces from Foreign Countries, after the first of October next, or any lean ones after the first of November following, on Pain of forfeiting 2000 Florins for each Offence. We learn from Gibraltar, that M. Butler, the States General's Conful, was arrived there from Mequinez, with a Treaty of Peace and Commerce concluded between Muley Abdalla, Emperor of Fez and Morocco, and their High Mightineffes the States General of the United Provinces; which Treaty was figned at Tetuan on the 21st of January laft, by M. Butler and the Emperor of Morocco's Prime Minister. Hague, March 28. The Letters which arrived by the laft Poft from Vienna fay, that the Empress Queen of Hungary was happily delivered of an Archdutchefs on the 19th Inftant, between Ten and Eleven o'Clock in the Forenoon,
