St. James's, April 20.

HIS Majesty has been pleased to order Letters Patent to pass under the Great Seal of Great Britain, for Creating His Royal Highness George, William, Frederick (the Prince of Great Britain; Electoral Prince of Brunswick Lunenburgh; Duke of Edinburgh; Marquess of the Isle of Ely; Earl of Eltham; Viscount of Lancaster; Baron of Snaudon; and Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter;) Prince of Wales, and Earl of Chester.

Halifax in Nova Scotia, Feb. 8. We have had so open a Winter, that we have frequently heard from Chinesco that all was well in that Quarter, our last Letters from thence being dated the 21st of last Month.

Lisbon, March 28. On Wednesday last sailed from this Port a Ship of War for Rio de Janeiro, having on board a large Quantity of Arms and Ammunition for that Colony, and some Officers, which the King sends thither in order to see the last Ordonnance concerning the Mines in that Country, carried into Execution; and the Fleet of Merchantmen, bound for the Bay of All Saints, is upon the Point of putting to Sea. As the Corsairs of Barbary have for some Time past appeared in great Numbers upon our Coast, two Men of War are equipping here with all Expedition, in order to give them Chace.

Turin, April 7. All the Officers of the Troops of this Kingdom, who are absent from their Regiments, have Orders to join them by the Middle of next Month, the King's Commissaries having ordered a Review of the Troops in their respective Departments, to be made about that Time. The Conferences which have been lately held for altering the Exercise amongst the Foot Soldiers, are at an End, the Officers appointed for that Purpose having regulated every Thing agreeable to the King's Desire; and those of the Horse will now soon hold their Conferences in order to make likewise some new Regulations in relation to their Exercise. Duke Hamilton, who has resided at this Court for some Months past, set out from hence on Monday last, in order to take a Tour into the principal Cities of Italy.

Leghorn, April 10. The Emperor's three Ships of War, which arrived here lately from the Levant and the Coast of Barbary, have performed their Quarantain, and are now un-

loading. The Captain of a Merchantman, who arrived here a few Days ago from the Island of Capraia, reports, that three Genoese Frigates had taken an Algerine Corsair of 18 Guns and 47 Men off the Island of Pianosa, after a Chase of three Days. There were two Corsairs in Company when the Genoese first discovered them, but one made her Escape. Last Week a Neapolitan Bark, laden with Wine and some other Merchandize, ran on Shore in this Neighbourhood, but all the Crew and a great Part of the Effects were saved. We are informed by a Venetian Felucca, that the Turkish Troops quartered in Dalmatia, have received Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to march. This News appears the more surprizing, as we are sensible of the pacifick Temper of the Grand Seignor, and of the strong Assurances he has given for some Time past of his sincere Desire to live in perfect Friendship with all the Christian Powers.

Stockholm, April 12. The Body of the late King was Yesterday laid in State, where it is to remain till its Interment, which is to be performed with great Funeral Pomp. No Day is yet fixed for the present King's Coronation; in the mean Time his Majesty applies himself close to Business with his Ministers. On the 27th Instant will be held a Chapter of the Order of the Seraphims, when 'tis thought several new Knights of that Order will be created; and 'tis said a Promotion of Land and Sea Officers will be made about the same Time.

Hague, April 27. The States General have established a Commission for regulating and renewing of the Magistrates in the different Cities and Towns in Dutch Flanders. This Commission is composed of M. Verschoor on the Part of the Province of Guelderland; the Baron de Giessenbourg on the Part of that of Utrecht; the Baron d'Yffelmuyden on the Part of the Province of Overijssel; and M. de Cantis on the Part of that of Groninguen. Count Wartensleben, Major General in the Service of this Republick, Colonel of a Regiment of Foot upon the Repartition of Zealand, and Adjutant General to the Prince Stadtholder, died here this Morning.
