Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Cirencester Mail to this Office, was Yesterday Morning, between Two and Three of the Clock, on Gerrard's Cross Common, between Wickham and Uxbridge, attacked and robbed by a single Highwayman, mounted on a Bay Mare, who carried off the said Mail, which contained the following Bags of Letters, viz.

THIS is to give Notice, pursuant to an Act of Parliament, entitled, An Act for the Amendment of the Law relating to Actions on the Statute of Hue and Cry, That William Mastin, of Meeting-House-Court, in Miles-Lane, in Thames-Street, London, Porter, as he was travelling on Foot from Hackney in the County of Middlesex to London, on Monday the Eighth Day of this Instant April, he was, between the Hours of Ten and Eleven of the Clock in the Forenoon of the same Day, met and attacked in a Field, in the Hundred of Ossulston, in the Parish of St. John at Hackney, in the said County of Middlesex, near a Walk or Field called or known by the Name of Shoulder of Mutton Field, and next adjoining to a Field where stands a Porter's Block, which last Field is next adjoining to a Field in which Almshouses belonging to the worshipful Company of Goldsmiths are in, by three Men on Foot, unknown to the said William Mastin, all of them being middle sized Men, about five Feet seven Inches high, and about thirty Years of Age; the one had on a brown Coat, and a dirty Cap on his Head under his Hat; another had on a dingey grey Coat, with his own Hair or a Wig; and the Third, the said William Mastin (by his Surprize) cannot describe; who were all very dirty, and each had a Stick in his Hand, one of which Persons knocked the said William Mastin down, and robbed and took from him four Six and Thirty Shillings Pieces, two Moidores, one Eighteen Shillings Piece, Twenty-four Guineas, and Half a Guinea, all in Gold, and Fifteen Shillings in Silver, two plain Gold Rings, each marked with the Letters W. M. and a Pair of Wrought Silver Knee Buckles, marked with the Letters W. M. and then made off.
