Resolved,

THAT Notice be given, that the Annuities, payable at the Exchequer, after the Rate of Three Pounds Ten Shillings per Centum per Annum, and which, by an Act, passed in the Fourth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, were charged on the additional Duties on Stamp Vellom, Parchment, and Paper, will be redeemed and paid off on the 10th Day of October 1752, agreeable to the Power of Redemption in the said Act.

That Mr. Speaker do forthwith signify, by Writing, to be inserted in the London Gazette, and affixed on the Royal Exchange in London, the said Resolution of this House.

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to declare the Right Honourable John Earl Granville, Lord President of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and his Lordship took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable George William Earl of Coventry, to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Worcester, City of Worcester, and County of the same, his Lordship this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

Naples, June 1. On Sunday last, being the Feast of St. Ferdinand, whose Name the King of Spain bears, the same was celebrated with great Magnificence at Portici, where most of the principal Nobility resorted in their richest Habits to compliment their Majesties and the

young Family on that Occasion. A few Days ago two Coaches belonging to Prince Esterhazy were stopped by some Custom-House Officers, on a Supposition that his Servants had concealed some contraband Goods, of which the Ambassador having complained to the King, his Majesty highly disapproved of so rash an Action, and immediately gave Orders for the two Coaches to be delivered to the Prince's Servants. Two Men of War named the St. Charles and the Queen, put to Sea last Saturday from this Port, in order to join the two Gallies that sailed lately for the Sea of Sicily; and to cruise with them against the Barbary Pyrates.

Leghorn, June 5. The Master of a French Ship arrived in this Port says, that there was a smart Engagement last Week off Cape Passaro between four Corsairs, and two Genoese and one Venetian Ship; and that the Action lasted five Hours, in which the three last, which were attacked by the Corsairs, had defended themselves with such Courage, that they sunk one of the Corsairs with 32 Guns on board and Men in Proportion, and drove off the other three, with the Loss of only 7 Men killed and 8 wounded.

Ratisbon, June 13. Field Marshal Count Seckendorff, Governor of Philipsbourg, has presented a Memorial to the Diet of the Empire, praying for Leave to repair the Fortifications of that Place, but as yet no Answer has been given to it. On Tuesday last Count Luchesi, General of Horse in the Service of the Empress Queen of Hungary, arrived here from Paris.

Cologne, June 21. Prince Charles of Lorraine, who set out early Yesterday Morning from Brussels, arrived here that Evening, and having stopped to change his Relays, proceeded immediately on his Journey to Vienna, which he proposed reaching by Friday Night. The Persons that accompany him are the Count de Vitrimont his first Chamberlain; the Marquess de Los Rios and the Count de St. Ignon his Adjutants General; M. de Thonnois, one of his Gentlemen; Father Halberstein his Confessor; M. de Grand his first Surgeon; and M. Gilbert, his Secretary.

Hambourg, June 22. Prince William of Saxe Gotha arrived here last Saturday the 19th with his Princess, a Daughter of the Dutchess of Holstein, with whom their Highnesses propose to spend some Months in this City.

Hague, June 24. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland, who were assembled Yesterday, have this Day continued their Deliberations in the Presence of his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange. Yesterday in the Afternoon his Serene Highness, accompanied by several General Officers, reviewed the Dutch Regiment of Foot Guards, who went through their whole Exercise before him; and his Highness expressed great Satisfaction at their Appearance and Behaviour. The Princess of Orange, the young Prince, and the Princess Caroline, accompanied by several Lords and Ladies of the Court, were all present at this Review; and this Evening his Serene Highness proposes to review the Swiss Regiment of Guards in the same Manner. On Sunday Morning last a Fire broke out at Yffelstein, which burnt with such Violence, that five or six Houses were reduced to Ashes in a few Hours.

The Person who committed this Robbery, was a tall, lusty black Man, about Six Feet high, between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, marked with the Small Pox, and had on a blue Surtout or Horseman's Coat, and under it a dark coloured one, with white Metal Buttons, and wore a black or dark coloured Wig, and rode upon a large Brown Bay Horse or Mare, Fifteen Hands high, with a bald Face, and a dark black Mane, the Tail lately docked and nicked, the Wounds not healed.
