Dusseldorp, Sept. 20. Recruits are almost daily arriving here from Westphalia and the Upper Rhine, where they were enlisted to serve in the Imperial Troops. They have all uniform Cloathing given them at Cologne; after which they are sent forwards for the Austrian Low Countries.

Brussels, Sept. 20. 'Tis now said that Prince Charles of Lorraine, our Governor General, will not leave Vienna till the 15th or 20th of next Month. The Prince and Princess of Lichtenstein are daily expected here from Spa. The Price of Provisions in this City is considerably augmented within these few Days past, on Account of the vast Quantity of Rain that has lately fallen, which has made the Roads impassable in many Places, so that the Country People have not been able to come near us with their Carriages. They write from Ostend and Nieuport, that all the Meadows round them are under Water.

Hambourg, Sept. 21. M. Haseler, whom the King of Prussia sends as Minister to Denmark, in the Room of M. de Vofs, who is recalled from that Court, has passed through Hambourg on his Way to Copenhagen.

Paris, Sept. 24. The King has disposed of the Government of Flanders, vacant by the Death of the young Duke of Boufflers, in Favour of the Prince of Soubize; and that of Champagne and Brie, which the Prince of Soubize resigned on this Occasion, has been conferred by his Majesty on the Count de Clermont, a Prince of the Blood of France. The publick Rejoicings for the Birth of the Duke of Burgundy, have been surprizingly great throughout the whole Kingdom.

Hague, Sept. 28. Our Lords the States of this Province will open their ordinary Assembly To-morrow, for which Purpose almost all of them are already arrived here. We learn by an Express from Aix-la-Chapelle, that his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange continues in good Health, and proposes setting out from that Place on Wednesday next for Maestricht, where he is to embark on board a Yacht for Holland.
