Naples, Sept. 3.

ON the 26th past, their Majesties, attended by their Retinue, set out for Caserta, to take the Diversion of Shooting, and returned the same Evening to this City. The new Frigate of War of 36 Guns, which was launched from the Stocks in the Presence of their Majesties on Saturday last, is named the Notre Dame de la Conception, and is reputed to be a complete Ship. She was built by Direction of a Person in the Secretary of State's Office, whom the King has ordered to inspect the Building of two new Shebecks.

Rome, Sept. 7. On the 27th past M. Figaro had an Audience of the Pope, relating to the Affairs of the Archbishoprick of Toledo. On the 30th the Equipage of Cardinal Portocarrero departed for Parma, for which Place his Eminence proposes to take a Journey. On the 1st Instant departed for Civita Vecchia, the Sister-in-Law of the French Ambassador, to embark on board one of the Pope's Gallies for Marseilles.

Modena, Sept. 6. M. Sabbatina, Bishop of this City, has caused publick Prayers to be put up in all our Churches, to employ the Almighty to send us Rain: He has likewise published a Pastoral Letter on the same Occasion; and great Reason there was for it, as the excessive Heats we have had for a long Time past, have caused such a prodigious Drought, that all the Grass has been in a Manner quite burnt up, by which Misfortune the Cattle have suffered very much. Their Serene Highnesses the Prince and Princess our Sovereigns are still at Massa, where 'tis said they will remain till the 12th or 15th Instant.

Turin, Sept. 7. Count Bogia, Secretary at War, is shortly to set out for Milan, in order to terminate, in an amicable Manner, with Count Christiani, whom the Queen of Hungary has appointed for that Purpose, the Differences which have subsisted between this Court and that of Vienna, in Relation to several Demands the Empress Queen has upon the Countries ceded to his Majesty by the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle.

Petersbourg, Sept. 7. We have received Advice from Cronstadt, that the Fleet which was equipping in that Port, were all disarmed, agreeable to the Empress's Orders. Last Sunday Evening her Imperial Majesty arrived here

from Peterhoff, and was saluted at her Entrance into this City by a general Discharge of the Cannon of the Fortress and of those of the Admiralty.

Florence, Sept. 10. All Difficulties being removed with Regard to the Building the Suburbs to the City of Leghorne, an Edict was published by the Regency on the 6th Instant, allowing certain Privileges and Exemptions to such Persons and Families as should build Houses, and establish themselves there. The Commerce of Leghorne is greatly alarmed by the frequent Captures which the Barbary Pirates make in Sight of that Port, to the infinite Prejudice of the Trade of it.

Prague, Sept. 13. The Troops which form'd the Camps of Collin and Pilsen began to march this Morning for their respective Quarters. The Regiment of Archduke Charles, and those of Konigsegg, Wolfenbuttel and Philibert, are expected here in Garrison To-morrow and the Day after. Prince Piccolomini commands in Chief the Troops quartered in this Kingdom till the Arrival of Count Brown, whom the Empress Queen has lately appointed to that Command. Prince Lobkowitz set out from hence this Morning for Vienna, from whence he will proceed to his Post in Hungary.

Vienna, Sept. 15. On Sunday last, being the Anniversary of the Turks raising the Siege of this City in the Year 1683, the same was observed as usual. On this Occasion a solemn Procession was made to the Metropolitan Church, at which the Empress Queen, who came purposely from Schonbrun, assisted; after which Te Deum was sung to Musick, and a triple Discharge was made of the Cannon upon our Ramparts. On Friday last a long Conference was held at the Palace upon the Affairs of the Empire, and the next Morning Count Colloredo, Vice Chancellor, went to Hollitsch, to communicate the Result of it to the Emperor, whose Return from thence to Schonbrun is fixed for Saturday next. 'Tis now the general Opinion that Prince Charles of Lorraine will not set out from hence for his Government of the Low Countries till towards the 20th of next Month. Yesterday Prince Lobkowitz, who arrived here on Monday last from Prague, was admitted to an Audience of the Empress Queen at Schonbrun, and next Week he proposes setting out for Hungary, in order to take upon him the Command of the Imperial Troops in that Kingdom.

Genoa, Sept. 15. A general Assembly of the Council of this Republick was held here Yesterday, when a Resolution was taken to make the Port of this City a Free Port for ten Years, and to lessen considerably the Duties upon all Merchandizes that shall be brought here in Foreign Vessels; and in Case it appears, at the Expiration of that Time, that our Commerce has reaped that Advantage which is naturally expected from it, the Serene Colleges, and the Directors of the Bank of St. George, have Liberty to prolong it for five Years more. We have just received Advice that four Barbary Chebecks have taken a Neapolitan Polacre, and one of our Barks, from under the Cannon of Montenero. The last Advices received by this Government from Corfica are not so favourable as we could wish, some of the Pieves or Communities, and particularly that of Niolo, having refused to submit to the new Regulation, and even taken up Arms in their Defence, which obliged the Marquis de Grimaldi to send a Body of Genoese Militia against them, with whom they have already had some smart Skirmishes.

Stockholm, Sept. 16. The whole Court is expected here on Saturday next from Drottingholm. A considerable Quantity of Gold and Silver Medals are striking at the Mint, which are to be distributed amongst the Great Officers of State, the Senators, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, at their Majesties Coronation. The Baron de Rosen, who commands in Chief the Swedish Troops in Finland, has acquainted the Court, that the new Forts which he had received Orders to erect upon the Frontiers of that Province, were almost completed, as were likewise the new Works that were ordered to be added to the Fortifications of the Town and Port of Helsingfort.

Copenhagen, Sept. 18. Their Majesties, who arrived here on Monday last from Jagerpreys, set out this Afternoon for Friedensbourg, where they propose staying till towards the Middle of next Month. The two Ships of War which have been equipping here for some Time past, are now ready to put to Sea; they are named the Nelleblad and the Bourbon, and 'tis said are bound for Tranquebar, in order to protect our Settlements and Commerce on that Coast. For these five or six Days past we have had such violent Tempests, that several Ships have been drove on Shore, and others cast away.

Berlin, Sept. 20. On Wednesday last the King, accompanied by the Prince of Prussia, arrived here in perfect Health from Silesia. His Majesty alighted at the Castle, where a great Concourse of Nobility and Gentry were assembled to compliment him on his Arrival; that Night he supped with the Queen Mother at Montbijou, and the next Morning set out for Potzdam.

Paris, Sept. 26. His most Christian Majesty came last Sunday, in great State, with all the Royal Family, to the Church of Notre Dame in this Town, and assisted at the Te Deum which was sung there on the Birth of the Duke of Burgundy.

The Person who committed this Robbery, was a tall lusty black Man, about Six Feet high, between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, marked with the Small Pox, and had on a blue Surtout or Horseman's Coat, and under it a dark coloured one, with white Metal Buttons, and wore a black or dark coloured Wig, and rode upon a large Brown Bay Horse or Mare, Fifteen Hands high, with a bald Face, and a dark black Mane, the Tail lately docked and nicked, the Wounds not healed.
