**W**alter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N. S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers sent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

### Advertisement.

**W**hereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships sailing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said washing Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the <sup>21st of January, O. S.</sup> <sub>1st of February, N. S.</sub> in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

*Peterbourg, Oct. 19.* Colonel Panin, whom the Empress sent some Time ago to Stockholm, to compliment their Swedish Majesties on their Accession to the Throne of that Kingdom, returned here a few Days ago, extremely satisfied with his Reception at that Court; the Account he gives of which seems perfectly agreeable to her Imperial Majesty. A large Quantity of Wines and other Provisions are sending from hence to Moscow;

from whence we are informed, that Count Ra-foumofsky, General in Chief of the Cossacks, was preparing to set out for that Place with a large Retinue, in order to wait the Arrival of her Imperial Majesty. We learn from Riga, Revel, and Wybourg, that the Troops cantoned in those Districts during the Summer, were all gone into Winter Quarters. And by Advices from Derbent and Astracan we are informed, that the Troubles in Persia, which for a long Time had interrupted our Commerce with that Kingdom, began to be appeased. This News gives great Satisfaction to our Merchants, who now propose sending a large Quantity of rich Merchandize to Ispahan the ensuing Spring.

*Leghorn, Oct. 24.* The Magistrates of Health having been informed, that a Ship from the Levant, supposed to have the Plague on board, had attempted to put into Porto Ferrajo, have sent strict Orders to all the proper Officers on the Sea Coast of Tuscany, not to permit any Ship whatever from the Levant to come into any of their Ports. The two Jews, who put themselves under the Protection of a Clergyman in this City, in order to be instructed in the Christian Religion, are sent from hence to a Convent in Florence.

*Stockholm, Oct. 26.* The King has lately made a great Promotion of Military Officers, when Mess. Palmstruck and de Muhl were appointed Majors General. The Diet continues its Deliberations with the greatest Unanimity.

*Prague, Oct. 26.* The Commissaries of War, who have been for some Time at Com-mottau, to divide the Horses that have lately been purchased for remounting the Imperial Cavalry, are returned here, having sent to Vienna an Account of the Number they have delivered to each Regiment, amounting in the Whole to about 2000.

*Vienna, Oct. 30.* The Empress Queen of Hungary has raised Prince Ligne to the Rank of Field Marshal of her Armies; Count Wenceslaus is named to command the Imperial Troops in Transilvania, in the Room of the late Count Bernes; and 'tis said Count Trautmandsdorf will have the Command of the Regiment of Cuirassiers, vacant by the Death of the said Count Bernes. The Baron de Burmania, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General to this Court, arrived here on Thursday last from the Hague. By our last Letters from Bohemia we are informed, that a Fire had lately broke out at Kolin, which burnt very violently for many Hours, and reduced near half the Houses in that Town to Ashes, before a Stop could be put to the Flames.

*Copenhagen, Oct. 30.* The King returned here from Jagerspreys last Thursday Evening; and Yesterday the Queen Mother came hither from Hirschholm for the Winter. His Majesty has appointed M. Sobutze, Rector of the College of Altena, to be Professor of Theology in the University of this City.

**Ulm, Oct. 30.** The Post Boy belonging to this City was attacked in the Night between the 24th and 25th Instant near Guntzbourg, a little Town in the Circle of Swabia, by about twelve Men, who, after they had rifled his Portmanteau, and taken out the Bags of Letters belonging to Augsbourg, Munich, Ratisbon and Vienna, suffered him to go forwards without doing him any farther Mischief: Whereupon he came here as fast as possible, and having acquainted the Postmaster with what had happened, a Detachment of Dragoons belonging to this Garrison were immediately sent in Quest of them, but to no Purpose. The Vintage is all finished in this Country, and there are much greater Quantities of Wine this Year than was expected.

**Berlin, Nov. 2.** The King has appointed the Privy Councillor de Derschau, Son of the late Major General of that Name, to be President of the Council of the Regency of the Province of East Frizeland; and he is accordingly preparing to set out to take Possession of that Employment. On Thursday last died here Lieutenant General Count Schwerin, in the 52d Year of his Age. Prince Lobkowitz arrived here the latter End of last Week from Silesia, in Company with Baron Dankelman.

**Bonn, Nov. 4.** On Friday last a Fire broke out in the Village of Bleisheim, which burnt with such Violence, that upwards of twenty Houses and Barnes were reduced to Ashes in a very few Hours.

**Hambourg, Nov. 5.** By the Master of a Ship arrived here from Tripoly we learn, that Ali Effendi, whom the Dey and Regency of that City had lately sent to the Ottoman Porte, to execute an important Commission, had acquitted himself with such Success, that the Dey, to shew how much he was pleased therewith, had proposed Marrying his only Niece to that Minister's eldest Son. We are likewise informed, that the great Knowledge which the said Ali Effendi had acquired in Political Affairs during his Embassy at the Hague, had engaged the Dey to send him with the same Character to the Court of France, and that he was accordingly on the Point of setting out for Marseilles on his Way to Paris.

**Brussels, Nov. 8.** The Regency have lately published a Placard, wherein it is declared, that for the future a Duty of six Liards shall be paid for every Pound of Chocolate and Coffee that shall be brought into these Provinces; three Sols upon every Pound of Tea; and 10 per Cent. upon all painted or stained Linnens coming from France, England, or Germany.

**Whitehall, November 9.**

On Thursday Evening last the Right Honourable the Earl of Holderness, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, arrived here from the Hague.

**Dublin, Oct. 31.**

Yesterday being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Birth Day, the great Guns were fired at his Majesty's Park the Phoenix, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks; at Noon there was a very numerous Concourse of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes at the Castle, who appeared in most extraordinary Splendour to compliment his Grace the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode, set to Musick, was performed. In the Evening a Play was given by his Grace to the Ladies; at Night there

were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy; throughtout the City. And at the Castle the Ball and the several Entertainments were extremely grand, and conducted with the utmost Regularity; and the Decorations of the Ball and Supper Rooms entirely new, and particularly elegant. The Dress of her Grace the Duchess of Dorset, which was very magnificent, was all of the Manufactory of this Country.

Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Cirencester Mail to this Office, was Yesterday Morning, between Ten and Three of the Clock, on Gerrard's Cross Common, between Wickham and Uxbridge, attacked and robbed by a single Highwayman, mounted on a Bay Mare, who carried off the said Mail, which contained the following Bags of Letters, viz.

The Person who committed this Robbery, was a tall lusty black Man, about Six Feet high, between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, marked with the Small Pox; and had on a blue Surtout or Horseman's Coat, and under it a dark coloured one, with white Metal Buttons, and wore a black or dark coloured Wig, and rode upon a large Brown Bay Horse or Mare, Fifteen Hands high, with a bald Face, and a dark black Mane, the Tail lately docked and nicked, the Wounds not healed.
