Alter Titley, Esq; His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, has transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, the following Account from Copenhagen, dated the 30th of October N.S. It having been found necessary to change the Situation of the Fire kept hitherto upon a Sand-Bank, at the Point of Jutland, called Schagen, for the Use of Mariners; His Danish Majesty has ordered Notice thereof to be given to the Publick, and, in Pursuance of that Order, the proper Officers fent an Advertisement, accompanied with a Memorial, to Mr. Titley, desiring him to transmit the said Advertisement to England, for the Information of the British Traders to the Baltick; of which Advertisement the following is a Translation.

Advertisement.

WHereas the Sand-Hill at Schagen, upon which a Fire has been kept hitherto in the Night Time for the Direction of Ships failing through the Cattegat, is almost washed away by the Sea; and there is now erected, instead of the said wasting Sand-Hill, a Tower of Sixty Four Feet high, standing further within the Land at the Distance of Eight Hundred Feet from the Sand-Hill, and Four Hundred Feet more towards the North; upon which Tower the Fire is to be kept for the Future, and to commence on the 21st of January, O. S. in the ensuing Year 1752: Therefore, by Order of the King of Denmark, Norway, &c. this Notice is given to the Publick, to the End that Mariners, being duly apprized of the Alteration beforehand, may regulate their Course through the Cattegat accordingly.

Should the foresaid Sand Hill happen to be destroyed and carried quite away, by any violent Storm, before the Time abovementioned, in that Case a Fire will immediately be lighted up upon the Tower, instead of that which has

hitherto burnt upon the Sand-Hill.

Constantinople, Dec. 4. The Contagious Distemper, which made such great Havock in this City and its Neighbourhood, is now entirely ceased, and great Numbers of Artificers arrive here daily from the different Provinces of this Empire, in order to supply the Places of those who died of that fatal Distemper.

Lisbon, Dec. 9. The King has appointed Don Pacheco to be his Ambassador to the Emperor of China, and he is accordingly to set out for that Court in the Spring. They are prepaing to rebuild the Palace of Corte-Real which was burnt down some Months ago; in the mean while the Infants Don Pedre and Don Antoine, who used to reside in that Palace, have Apartments in the Royal Palace. On Saturday last the new Ambassador from the Grand Master of Malta was admitted to his first publick Audiences of their Majesties, when he complimented them upon their Accession to the Throne, and delivered the several rich Presents he brought with him.

Warsaw, Dec. 22. The Hayducks, who, at the Beginning of this Month, began to shew themselves in great Numbers upon the Frontires of this Republick, and to commit great Outrages, by plundering several Towns and Villages, have lately retired from thence; whereupon Count Branicky, Great General of the Crown Army, has taken all imaginable Precautions to prevent their Return to do further Mischief.

Prague, Dec. 25. General Count Brown, whom her Imperial Majesty has appointed to command in Chief the Troops in this Kingdom, is expected here from Transilvania towards the Beginning of next Month. They are preparing to rebuild the Barracks lately burnt down, the necessary Funds for that Purpose being already appropriated. The Weather is set in so very cold and frosty for these four or five Days past, that Carriages cross the Moldau in several Places without running the least Risque. All the Troops quartered in this Kingdom being ordered to be compleat against the Spring, several Officers, who were taking their Diversions in this City, are returned to their respective Regiments, in order to raise Recruits for that Purpose.

Stockbolm, Dec. 26. Tis said the Diet has come to a Resolution to keep the Land and Sea. Forces of this Kingdom upon a respectable Footing, and that they have ordered the necessary

Funds

Funds to be raised for that Purpose. Last Week the Deputies of our East-India Company waited on the King, to compliment him upon his Coronation; when his Majesty assured them, that he would take all Opportunities of doing every Thing in his Power to protect and encrease their Commerce.

Manufactury set up in Stiria for the making of Woollen Cloth goes on very successfully; and within this Month past several Pieces of that Manufacture have been brought to this City, and generally approved. The Empress gives it all the Encouragement possible, having taken divers Foreign Workmen into her Service, and allowed them Salaries, in Proportion to their Abilities, out of her own Revenues. A few Days ago our Archbishop published a Pastoral Letter, inciting the Inhabitants of this City to relieve their poor necessitous Neighbours at this Holy Season, which is greatly commended.

Berlin, Jan. 4. The King has ordered a considerable Sum of Money to be delivered to each of the Ministers of the several Churches of this City, to be distributed amongst the poor House-keepers in each Parish. His Majesty, being desirous of assisting all in his Power the new Manutacture of Hardware established at Neustadt-Eberswald, in the Marche of Brandenbourgh, has ordered Houses to be built for the Reception of the Workmen employed therein,

at his own Expence.

Brussels, Jan. 6. The Magistrates of this City have assembled several Times within these few Days past at the Town Hall, in order to deliberate upon the Proposition which has been made to them by the States of Brabant, concerning the raising the 20th Penny for the Empress Queen, and the 10th Penny for supporting the Household of Prince Charles of Lorrain our Governor General; but we do not hear that they have as yet taken any definitive Resolution thereupon. They continue to talk as if the Port of Ostend would shortly be made a Free Port, in order the better to promote and extend the Commerce of this Country.

Dusseldorp, Jan. 7. The Diet of the States of Juliers and Bergues is upon the Point of separating, having finished most of the Business that was laid before them, entirely to the Satisfaction of the Court. We learn from Cleves, that a few Days ago a Fire broke out in the House of an Advocate in that City, which greatly alaemed the Inhabitants, but by timely Assistance a Stop was put to its Spreading, and only the House in which it beg an, was burnt down.

Hague, Jan. 11. Our Lords the States of this Province will open their Assembly Tomorrow, most of the Members being already arrived. Yesterday the Body of his late Serene Highness the Prince of Orange was put into

the Cossin in the Presence of the Barons de Burmania and Grovestins, and of all the principal Officers and Gentlemen of his Court. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has appointed Commodore Reynders and Captain Hautbord, to be Members of the College of the Admiralty of Zealand.
