Naples, March 7.

THEIR Majesties and the whole Court are at Caserta, and 'tis thought will not return to this City before Easter. The King goes often a Hunting of wild Boars, and killed several last Week with his own Hands in the Forest of Venafre. Last Week an Express arrived here with some Dispatches relating to the Negotiation that is carrying on between the Empress Queen, and his Catholick Majesty, for maintaining the Tranquility of Italy. The Workmen employed by the Court in digging up the Ruins of the ancient City of Heraclea, have lately discovered some extreme fine marble Statues, very little defaced.

Rome, March 11. The Promotion of Cardinals, that has been expected for some Time, is still deferred. Thefts and Robberies are become more frequent in the Ecclesiastical State than ever, all the Precautions made use of to prevent them, having hitherto proved ineffectual. M. Spinelli, the new Legate of Bologna, is set out to take Possession of that Post. The Government having been informed that there is more Corn in the Ferrarois than is necessary for the Subsistence of its Inhabitants, has given Leave for Transporting a certain Quantity into the Dutchies of Parma and Placentia, where it is greatly wanted.

Fribourg in the Brisgau, March 12. General Bohn is arrived here from Vienna, with Orders to cause the Fortifications of this City to be rebuilt in a more regular Manner than they were before the late War, agreeable to a Plan that was laid before their Imperial Majesties and approved by them.

Stockholm, March 17. The King continues to assist regularly at the Deliberations of the Senate. His Majesty's Departure for some of the principal Provinces of this Kingdom, in order to review the Troops, is fixed for the 30th of next Month. The

Report of some Disturbances between the Russians and us in Finland, are entirely without Foundation. We have received Advice from divers Places of this Kingdom, of their having lately felt several Shocks of an Earthquake, and particularly at Fahluo and in the District of Tholland, but that they had happily gone off without doing any considerable Damage. We learn from Gothenbourg, that they are in daily Expectation of the Arrival of two of our East-India Company's Ships from China, richly laden.

Prague, March 18. The Regiments of Waldeck and Puebla marched from hence a few Days ago, the first for Tameswear and the latter for Transilvania; and it is generally believed, that several Regiments, quartered in this Country, will soon receive Orders to march into the Low Countries, and that they will be replaced here by others from Hungary. Count Brown, whom her Imperial Majesty some Time since appointed Chief Commander of the Imperial Troops in this Kingdom, is not yet arrived here from Vienna.

Copenhagen, March 18. The Society established in this City for the Encouragement of Matrimony, and for the Relief and Support of Widows, Orphans and Invalids, have at length chosen Directors for the Management of that Society. Count Lynar, late Minister from this Court to that of Russia, who, on his Return from Petersbourg to this City, was taken ill at Hardersleben in Holstein, arrived here this Morning.

Soleurs, March 18. The Differences between the Canton of Berne, and the Abby of St. Gal, are at length adjusted. We have received Advice by the last Post from Italy, that Count Christiani, Great Chancellor of the Duchy of Milan, set out from Milan on the 12th Instant for Ostiglia, in order to sign a Convention with the Venetian Commissaries, for ending all Disputes that have arisen in Relation to the Confines of their respective Territories.

Vienna, March 18. On Monday last there was a grand Appearance at Court to compliment their Majesties on the Anniversary of the Birth of the Archduke Joseph, their Imperial Majesties eldest Son; but the Promotion of General Officers, which was expected to be declared that Day, did not take Place. All Things are now settled for taking the Investiture on the Part of the Duke of Holstein Gluckstadt: The Aulick Council has already made its Report to the Emperor in Relation thereto, and his Imperial Majesty will shortly appoint a Day for performing the Ceremony. Count Seilern, a Member of the Aulick Council, is appointed Minister Plenipotentiary from this Court to that of Turin. The Emperor has created M. Schaut, Privy Councillor to the Margrave of Brandenburg Anspach, a Baron of the Holy Roman Empire. The first Battalion of the Regiment of Puebla arrived here on Wednesday last from Bohemia; and, having passed in Review before Count Leopold de Daun, Commandant of this City, embarked the next Morning, and sailed away for Offen, from whence they are to continue their March by Land for Transilvania.

Berlin, March 20. The King has conferred on M. Weyher, the Post of Grand Bailiff and President of the Regency of Lawenbourg; and his Majesty has appointed M. Machenau, Councillor of the Chamber of Justice at Halberstadt, to be Councillor of the Tribunal of Konigsberg.

Dresden, March 21. Field Marshal Count Sulkowsky is raised to the Dignity of a Prince of the Empire. The Departure of Count Flemming for Vienna will take Place as soon as his Lady, who was brought to Bed a few Days ago of a Son, is able to bear the Fatigue of the Journey. By our last Advices from Warsaw we are informed, that Count Potocky, Palatine of Braclaw, was married on the 4th Instant to the young Countess of Saphia.

Munich, March 23. The Departure of the Elector of Cologne for his own Court, is fixed for the 12th or 15th of next Month. That Prince, and the Elector our Sovereign, went on Monday last to Neubourg, on a Visit to the Elector Palatine, and returned here last Night.

Cologne, March 27. Two considerable Bodies of Recruits have marched from hence within these few Days past, the first to compleat the Regiments in Garrison at Luxembourg, and the other to be incorporated in that of Prince Charles of Lorraine, which is quartered at Brussels. A Gang of Fellows, who for some Time past have made it their Business to coin and put off false Money, were apprehended a few Days ago at Ravensberg, a Town belonging to the King of Prussia in Westphalia; they have since been conducted Prisoners to Wesel, in order to be tried for the same. We learn from Bielefeld, that a Peasant named Didier Bentrup, died lately in that Neighbour-

hood, aged 113 Years; and that in the Village of Dornberg, about a League from that Place, there is a Man now living, aged 115 Years, who enjoys a perfect State of Health. They write from Ratisbon, that Baron Walbrun, Minister from the Duke of Wirtembourg to the Diet of the Empire, died there on the 17th Instant.

Brussels, March 27. At an Assembly held last Week at the Town House, the Magistrates consented to continue the same Duties upon Provisions as were raised last Year, agreeable to the Request of the Court. Her Imperial Majesty has appointed M. Gentis, Bishop of Antwerp, and the Marquis de Spontin, to be Members of her Council of State in this Country. Prince Charles of Lorraine has taken the Diversion of Hunting in the Forest of Soignies twice this Week, in both which Parties of Pleasure he was accompanied by several of the Principal Nobility of this Place.

Hague, March 30. M. Citters, Pensionary of Middlebourg, who is appointed by their High Mightinesses to be one of their Commissaries to the Congress at Brussels, arrived here a few Days ago. The Members of the Council of State went in a Body on Thursday last to the Assembly of the States General, and laid before them the State of War for the Year ensuing. The Deputies from the Province of Friseland, who arrived here a few Days ago, in order to execute a private Commission, have already had a Conference with the Deputies of their High Mightinesses, and with those of the Council of State. The Duke of Brunswick Wolfembuttel has been greatly indisposed for some Days past, but is now much better.
