*Whitehall, April 4.*

**B**Y Letters received this Morning there is an Account, that His Majesty was Yesterday in perfect Health, on board the Royal Caroline, at Harwich.

*Whitehall, April 4.*

This Day his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and her Grace the Dutchess of Newcastle, set out for Dover, to embark there for Calais, from whence they will proceed through Flanders to the Hague, and from thence to Hanover.

*Whitehall, April 4.*

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Right Honourable Francis Lord North and Guilford the Dignity of an Earl of the Kingdom of Great Britain, by the Name, Stile and Title of Earl of Guilford.

The King has been pleased to grant unto William Gibbons, of the Island of Barbadoes, Esq; the Dignity of a Baronet of the Kingdom of Great Britain.

*Lisbon, March 10.* A few Days ago the Queen was taken so ill, that 'twas greatly feared she would have miscarried; but she is since pretty well recovered: However, her Physicians have advised her to go to Caldas, in order to drink the Waters, and she will accordingly set out for that Place soon after Easter.

*Stockholm, March 26.* The King has ordered a fine Silver hilted Sword, gilt with Gold, to be given to each of the principal Officers of our City Militia, as a Compliment for the handsome Appearance they made at their Majesty's Coronation. The States of this Kingdom have now under Consideration several Schemes for promoting of Commerce, and 'tis not doubted but that some new Regulations will be made in Relation thereto before the Separation of the Diet. They have likewise under Consideration a Project for putting the Marine on a better Footing than it is at present, by erecting an Academy for the Education of young Gentlemen in the Art of Navigation; and 'tis said the States have already assigned the necessary Funds for the

Support thereof. The Harvest having failed last Year in some Provinces of this Kingdom, Orders are sent to Dantzick and Lubeck for the purchasing and sending hither a great Quantity of Corn. The King's Journey to Finland, in order to review the Troops, and to see the new Fortifications, is deferred for the present.

*Warsaw, March 26.* The Count de Malachowsky, Great Chancellor of the Crown, is actually employed in preparing the Universalial for convoking the next General Diet that is to be held at Grodno in the Dutchy of Lithuania. Some Days ago we received Advice of the Emperor's having raised Count Sulkowsky, Commander in Chief of the Saxon Troops, to the Dignity of Prince of the Holy Roman Empire; and that, in Consequence thereof, the Estate he lately purchased in Upper Silesia, has been erected into a Principality.

*Copenhagen, March 28.* Yesterday the Countess de Schmettau took Possession of her Employment of Governante to the young Royal Family. By the last Letters this Court received from Stockholm, the Diet of the States of that Kingdom continue their Assembly with great Unanimity, and to all Appearance will not separate before the End of next Month. We have received Advice from Gluckstadt, that Baron Ahlesfeld, Commandant of that Fortrefs, died there a few Days ago.

*Cothen, March 31.* This Morning an Express arrived here from Carolath, with the agreeable News, that the Hereditary Princess of Carolath-Buthen, Daughter to the Prince our Sovereign, was happily delivered of a Prince on Monday last.

*Vienna, April 1.* This Week a Battalion of the Regiment of Waldeck, and another of that of Puebla, passed by this Place, the first on its March for Temeswear, and the other for Transilvania. On Tuesday next the Prince of Campo Real, Ambassador from the King of the Two Sicilies, is to make his publick Entry into this City. The same Day their Imperial Majesties and the whole Court set out for Schonbrun. A great Number of Families continue to arrive here from divers Parts of the Empire, who, after having obtained the necessary Passports, set forwards on their Journey to Hungary, where they propose to settle.

**Dresden, April 2.** On Sunday last the King, accompanied by the Princes Xavier and Charles, set out for Elfterwalda, in order to take the Diversion of Hunting, from whence he returned to the Palace in this City on Tuesday Evening. The same Day the Right Honourable the Earl of Hindford arrived here; the next Day he had the Honour to be introduced to their Majesties, and met with a gracious Reception, and on Thursday continued his Journey for Vienna. The King proposes setting out towards the End of this Week for Leipfick, in order to be present at the Fair; but 'tis thought neither the Queen nor Princes Royal will accompany his Majesty in that Journey.

**Hanover, April 4.** The Detachments of Horse appointed to escort his Britannick Majesty from the Frontiers of Holland to this Place, are on their Departure for their respective Stations.

**Franckfort, April 4.** Our last Letters from Fribourg say, that they had collected together a great Quantity of all Sorts of Materials for Repairing the Fortifications of that Place, and that the same would be begun forthwith. The Deputies of the Circle of the Upper Rhine, who have been assembled in this City for three Months past, broke up on Wednesday last, and are almost all set out for their respective Homes. Every Thing is getting ready for the Opening of our Fair, which 'tis imagin'd, by the Number of Foreign Merchants that are already arrived with their Effects, will be very considerable this Year.

**Brussels, April 10.** M. van Citters, third Deputy from the States General of the United Provinces to the Conferences which are to be held in this City concerning the Barrier, and for regulating the Tariff, arrived here on Thursday Night last, and was presented to Prince Charles of Lorraine, our Governor General, the next Day; and 'tis said that Thursday the 4th of next Month is appointed for opening the said Conferences.

**Hague, April 11.** The States of this Province are to assemble To-morrow, for which Purpose most of the Members are already arrived. This Morning Colonel York, Minister Plenipotentiary from Great Britain, set out, in Company with several other Persons of Distinction, for Helvoetfluys, in order to wait the Arrival of his Britannick Majesty. 'Tis said the Mourning for his late Serene Highness the Prince Stadtholder, will be changed the Beginning of next Month.
