Constantinople, April 2.

THE Swedish Merchants settled in Moldavia and Walachia, have, thro' the Intercession of the Swedish Minister at this Court, obtained Leave of the Grand Seignior to build themselves a Church in the City of Bucharest.

Naples, April 18. The Court is still at Portici, where the King diverts himself two or three Days in a Week with hunting. Publick Prayers are ordered to be put up in all the Churches of this Kingdom for the happy Delivery of the Queen. 'Tis reported here, that a smart Engagement happened a few Days ago off Messina, between some of our armed Vessels, and five Algerine Corsairs, which lasted three Hours, during which one of our Frigates was so much damaged as to be obliged to put into Messina to refit; but that the Loss of the Algerines was much more considerable, two of their Ships being sunk, and the three that escaped greatly damaged. The King having been informed, that the two young Saxon Princes, Xavier and Charles, intend to visit some of the principal Kingdoms of Europe, and that in their Tour they propose staying some Time at this Court, has ordered magnificent Apartments to be prepared for them in the Royal Palace.

Rome, April 22. On Monday last a Body of two hundred Soldiers marched from hence for Civita Vecchia, in order to go on board the Pope's Gallies that are fitting out in that Port for a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates. The Great Chancellor of Poland's Son, who has been here for some Time viewing the Curiosities of this Place, set out from hence a few Days ago on his Return Home.

Vienna, April 29. Their Imperial Majesties continue to enjoy perfect Health at Schonbrun, where the young Imperial Family are also to go next Wednesday. The Emperor has lately raised the Baron de Wickeradt, Hereditary Drost of the Dutchy of Guelderland and County of Zutphen, to the Dignity of Count of the Holy Roman Empire, Count Bestuchef, who has resided here several Years in Quality of Ambassador from Russia, is preparing for his Departure from hence, in order to return Home. The young Prince Litchenstein is appointed one of their Imperial Majesties Chamberlains. The new Manufacture of China, lately set up in this City, is in such high Repute, that the King of Portugal, and some other Foreign Princes, have

already sent Commissions for compleat Services of it to be prepared for them. We are informed by a Courier from Milan, that the Congress held at Ostiglia, for regulating the Limits of the Dominions of the Queen of Hungary and the Republick of Venice, is broke up, after having settled those Limits to the mutual Satisfaction of both Parties.

Dusseldorp, May 6. His Serene Highness the Elector Palatine our Sovereign arrived Yesterday at Manheim from the Tour he has taken to Neubourg and Munich. A few Days ago a Gang of Highwaymen were brought here and committed to Prison; they were all taken together near Burghues, where they had committed several Robberies. Last Week between seven and eight hundred Soldiers, belonging to the Troops of the Elector of Cologne, passed by this Place on their Way to relieve the Garrisons of Keyfersworth, Urdingen, Rhinberg and Nuys.

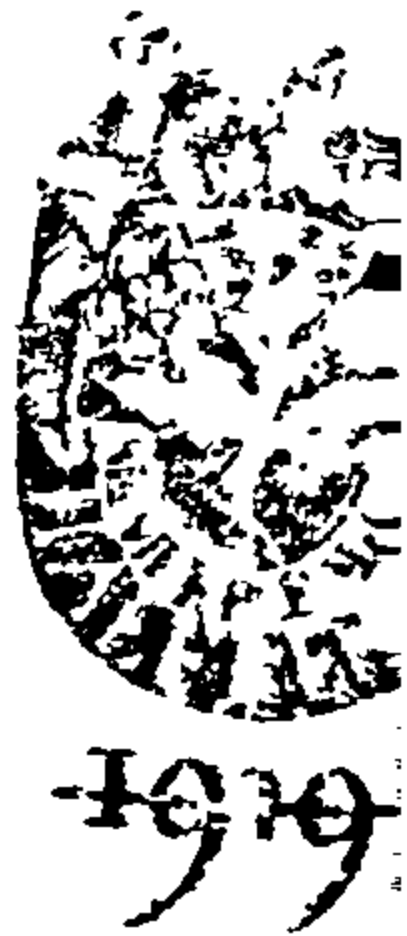

*An Act for making and repairing the Road,
 leading from the Town of Athy, in the County of
 Kildare, through Part of the Queen's County,
 and through the Town of Castlecomer, in the
 County of Kilkenny, to the Town of Old Leigh-
 lin, in the County of Carlow, and from thence
 to and through the Town of Leighlin Bridge, in
 the said County of Carlow.*

*An Act for making and repairing the Road,
 leading from the Town of Mountrath, in the
 Queen's County, through the Towns and Lands
 of Little Frankford, Galrus and Cloniver, in the
 King's County, to the Town and Lands of Clone-
 fin, in the said County.*

*An Act for establishing an Infirmary in the
 City of Corke, and to vest the House called the
 Infirmary House, and the back Yard thereunto
 belonging, which is built at the East End of the
 Church Yard of St. Mary Shandon, otherwise
 St. Ann's, in the Liberties of the City of Corke,
 in certain Trustees for ever, and to give such
 Trustees such Powers as may be necessary to pro-
 mote and execute the Purposes of an Infirmary in
 the City of Corke, and for uniting several small
 Parishes in the Suburbs of the said City.*
