## A P R O C L A M A T I O N.

**W**HEREAS by Letters Patent of his present Majesty, under his great Seal, which erected the Territories and Country of Georgia in America into One Free Province, under the Trustees for establishing the Colony of Georgia in America, the immediate Government thereof was, after the Determination of a Term of Twenty-one Years therein mentioned, to come to his said Majesty, his Heirs and Successors; which Term is not yet expired: And whereas the said Trustees having voluntarily made a Proposal to his Majesty, to make an absolute Surrender of all the Powers, Rights, and Trusts, vested in them by the said Charter; which his Majesty having been pleased graciously to accept, the said Trustees did, by their Indenture of Grant and Surrender, bearing Date the Twentieth Instant, grant and surrender to his Majesty, his Heirs, and Successors, the said Charter, and all Powers, Jurisdictions, Countries, and Territories, thereby granted to them; by which, the immediate Care of the said Province, and of his Majesty's Subjects there, is now devolved upon his Majesty; We being desirous of making Provision for the present Government of the said Province, and securing the Peace and good Order thereof, until his Majesty shall establish such other Form and Order of Government therein, as to his Majesty, in his Royal Wisdom, shall seem most for the Honour of his State, and the Happiness of his Subjects there; have thought fit, with the Advice of his Majesty's Privy-Council, to issue this Proclamation; and do hereby order, signify, and declare his Majesty's Pleasure, That all Persons who now are, or, at the Time of the Publication of this Proclamation, shall be duly and lawfully possessed of, or invested in, any Offices or Places of Authority, Government, or Employment, Ecclesiastical, Civil, or Military, in his Majesty's said Colony of Georgia, and particularly all Governors, Lieutenants, or Deputy Governors, President, and Assistants, Council, Judges, Justices, Magistrates, Provost Marshals, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, and all others in any Place or Rank of Government, or concerned in the Administration of Government, either Inferior or Superior, and all other Officers and Ministers holding any Office, Place, or Employment there, shall hold under his Majesty, and be continued in their said several and respective Places, Offices, or Employments, and enjoy the same with the like Salaries, Fees, and Emoluments thereto belonging, which have hitherto been actually paid, until his Majesty's Pleasure be further known, or other Provision be made for the due Government and Ordering of his Majesty's said Co-

lony: And that in the mean Time, for the Preservation of the publick Peace and Tranquillity of the said Province, We do strictly command all the said Persons, of whatsoever Rank, Degree, or Condition, to proceed in the Execution of their respective Offices, and to perform all the Duties thereunto belonging: And further, We do hereby will and command all and singular his Majesty's Subjects in the said Colony, of what Estate or Degree they, or any of them, be, to be obedient to, and aiding, helping, and assisting the said Officers and Ministers in the Performance and Execution of their said Offices, Places, and Employments, as they tender his Majesty's Displeasure, and will answer the contrary at their utmost Perils: All which Matters and Things, herein before commanded and directed, We do, by this Proclamation, order and direct to be done, performed, submitted to, and obeyed, until his Majesty shall further make known his Royal Will and Pleasure thereupon.

Given at *Whitehall* the Twenty-fifth Day of *June*, 1752. in the Twenty sixth Year of his Majesty's Reign.

Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council.

Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council were this Day pleased to Order, That the Parliament which stands prorogued to Thursday the Sixteenth of July next, should be further prorogued to Thursday the 28th Day of September following.

**W**HEREAS their Excellencies the Lords Justices have received Information, that the Plague hath lately broke out within the State or Dominion of Algiers in Africa, and that great Numbers of Persons die daily thereof—Their Excellencies have therefore thought proper, for preventing the said Infection from being brought into this Kingdom, to Order, as it is hereby ordered, with the Advice of his Majesty's Privy Council, That the Quarantine of Forty Days, now subsisting by Orders of his Majesty in Council of the 18th of June 1747, and 28th of June 1749, upon all Ships and Vessels coming from any of the Ports in West Barbary upon the Atlantick Ocean, or from any of the Ports in the Streights of Gibraltar on the Barbary Coast, or any other of the Ports on that Coast in the Mediterranean, lying between the said Streights and Cape de las Tres Forcas in the Kingdom of Fez, be extended Eastward upon the African Coast, from the said Cape de las Tres Forcas to Cape Rufara in the Kingdom of Barca—And that all Ships and Vessels already arrived and not unladen, or that shall hereafter arrive in the Ports of this Kingdom, from any of the Ports or Places between the

said two Capes, be put under the like Quarantine, and required to pursue the same Rules, Regulations, and Directions, as are contained in his Majesty's aforementioned Orders in Council:—And the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and his Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

*Constantinople, May 24.* The Captain Bawshaw, or High-Admiral, put to Sea on Wednesday Morning last with a Fleet of ten Men of War, and the like Number of Gallies, Part of which are to cruize off the Coast of Barbary, to protect the Navigation of the Regencies of Africa, and the Remainder are to sail to the Islands in the Archipelago, in order to collect the annual Tributes which the Inhabitants of those Islands pay to the Sultan. The last Advices received here from Persia seem to give this Court some Uneasiness, and 'tis said, that Measures will soon be taken for stopping the Progress of Prince Heraclius of Georgia, whose great Power, 'tis thought, may otherwise soon become prejudicial to this Empire.

*Petersbourg, June 15.* A few Days ago her Imperial Majesty received Dispatches by a Courier from M. Obreskoy, our Ambassador at Constantinople, by which we learn, that the Grand Signior persists invariably in his Resolution of living in perfect Friendship with all the Christian Powers, and particularly with this Empire. We also learn by the same Dispatches, that the Tartars having lately made an IncurSION into the Russian Territories, his Sublime Highness was no sooner informed thereof, than he immediately gave Orders to the Grand Vizier and the Divan to take all possible Precautions to prevent the like for the Future.

*Naples, June 16.* On Sunday last the Queen appeared in Publick for the first Time since her Lying-in, on which Occasion her Majesty received the Compliments of the principal Nobility. This Week several Vessels arrived here laden with Corn and other Provisions, the Masters of which assure us, that they perceived no Barbary Corsairs on the Coast; so that 'tis imagined those Pyrates have for the present quitted these Seas.

*Florence, June 19.* The Council of this Regency are taking all possible Precautions to prevent the Commerce of the Maritime Places in this Grand Duchy from suffering the least Prejudice on Account of the new Port which the Court of Modena is erecting at the Mouth of the River Lavenza. We learn from Pisa, that no less than sixteen Highwaymen were executed there last Week, three of which were burnt alive, six broke on the Wheel, and the other seven hanged. We have had in this Country, since the Beginning of this Month, so many violent Storms of Rain and Hail, that the Fruits of the Earth have suffered very much.

*Schaffhausen, June 24.* We learn from Zurich, that a numerous Band of Robbers have lately formed themselves in that Canton, where, as well as in the Canton of Bern, they have committed the greatest Outrages.

*Prague, June 24.* Count Brown, Commander in Chief of the Troops in this Kingdom, who arrived here a few Days ago from

Vienna, has been employed Yesterday and Today in reviewing the Troops of this Garrison; and next Week he proposes setting out from hence to review those in the Circles of Pilsen and Leutmeritz. Field Marshal Prince Lobkowitz passed through this City on Tuesday last, on his Way from Hungary to Raudnitz. They continue to say a Camp will be formed in the Neighbourhood of Colin in the Month of August next; and 'tis even said, that the Regiments for that Service are already named. Publick Prayers are put up in all the Churches of this City, by Order of our Archbishop, for the happy Delivery of her Imperial Majesty.

*Dresden, June 27.* The King's Departure for Poland will certainly take Place the Beginning of August next; and there is the greatest Reason to hope, from the good Harmony which seems at present to subsist between the principal Nobility of Poland, that the General Diet, which his Majesty then goes to hold, will prove more successful than the last.

*Hambourg, July 1.* Letters from Stockholm, of the 23d of last Month, bring us Advice of his Swedish Majesty's Departure for Finland that Morning, with only two Gallies and two Yachts, being attended by Baron Possé, who is to go to the Court of Russia with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary, in the room of M. Greifenheim, nominated as Minister at the Diet of Ratisbon. Major General Lantingshausen, who, during the last Assembly of the States of Sweden, conducted himself with great Zeal in the Party of the Republicans, has asked and obtained his Dismission; as has likewise the Count de la Gardie, one of his Majesty's Aids de Camp. Yesterday in the Afternoon the new Queen of Denmark set out from Altona, in order to continue her Journey to Friedericksbourg. Her Majesty received the Compliments of the Duke of Holstein Ploen, of the Foreign Ministers, and of the Deputies of the Magistrate of Hambourg, the Day before her Departure. The Swedish General Lieven arrived here this Morning from Copenhagen, where he has delivered the Order of the Elephant; and from hence he is to go to Berlin, to deliver to his Prussian Majesty that of the Black Eagle, with both which the late King of Sweden was invested.

*Whereas by the Death of Robert Tigh, Esq; his Majesty's late Consul at Elsenore, his Effects are now devolved to his only Daughter, Widow of the late Commodore Fontenay, an Officer in his Danish Majesty's Service, and to her Children, Subjects of the King of Denmark; and the said Widow, according to the Custom of that Country, having obtain'd the Benefit of a Royal Proclamation, dated the 25th of April last, enjoining all Persons whatsoever, that may have any Claim or Pretensions upon the late British Consul aforesaid, to make known the same either to the Widow Fontenay herself, or to Vice Admiral Fontenay, at Copenhagen, within the Space of one Year and six Weeks; after the Expiration of which Term no farther Claims are to be received on the Account of the said Consul deceased. The British Creditors, if any such there be, are therefore to take Notice thereof, and put in their Claims accordingly.*
