*ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.*

**B**Y the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be erected; it is enacted as follows, *viz.*

*5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.*] By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies. — And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East-India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, solicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to sail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every such Offence, 500*l.*

*7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.*] By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, every Subject of His Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies or purchased there, by any such Offen-

ders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with double the Value thereof.

*9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.*] By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting, the raising, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, from, and after, the 24th Day of June, 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of such Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any such Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney-General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney-General's waving in such Bill, the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value, and insisting only on the Single Value thereof; And in such Case, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majesty accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall have, or be intitled to, in any such Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforesaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known and not discovered, as aforesaid; and any Person making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than such as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going

to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment, or Fine, for the same, at the Discretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.

And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

*Petersbourg, August 4.* By Letters from Moscow we are assured, that they are working with great Diligence in rebuilding the Houses which were burnt down there by the late great Fires. The same Letters add, that since the Punishment of the Ringleaders of the late Disturbances in several of the Villages round that Capital, all Things have been very quiet; but that the Troops quartered in those Villages, to keep the Inhabitants in Awe, have not as yet been removed. We have an Account from Siberia, of the Death of M. Soucharoff, Governor General of that Province; but no Person is yet appointed by her Imperial Majesty to fill that important Post.

*Naples, Aug. 4.* Their Majesties, and the young Royal Family, are returned to their Palace in this City from Portici. The Queen is perfectly recovered from her late Lying-in, and proposes going with his Majesty next Week to the Island of Procida, in order to take the Diversion of Hunting. A few Days ago an extraordinary Council was held at Court, at the breaking up of which a Courier was dispatched for Madrid, but the Contents of his Dispatches are kept secret. The News of the Death of the Archbishop of Otranto is confirmed, and great Interest is making at Court to succeed him in that rich Benefice. By Letters from Tivoli we have an Account, that on the 21st past at Night they felt a most violent Shock of an Earthquake, but that the Damage caused thereby was not very considerable.

*Leghorn, Aug. 7.* The Regency of this City having received certain Advice of the Plague's continuing to increase at Algiers, have renewed their Orders, that no Ships whatsoever coming from that Coast, be permitted to enter into any of our Ports without performing a strict Quarantine. The Reports that have been spread of certain Imperial Regiments being soon to march from Lombardy into this Duchy, are, as we apprehend, without Foundation, as no Preparations whatsoever are making for their Reception. They write from Parma, that the Departure of the Dutchess of that Place, with her Daughter, for France, was fixed for the 2d of next Month.

*Rome, Aug. 11.* We had last Week, by the Arrival of a Vessel from Tunis, a Confirmation of the Flight of the Bey's eldest Son towards the Confines of Algiers; and that the former Tranquillity was again restored at Tunis. This Country has been greatly troubled of late with terrible Shocks of Earthquakes, for besides those lately felt at Gubbio and Foligno, our Letters to Day bring us an Account of a violent one that happened a few Days since at Spoleto. Some Country People have been lately apprehended, by Order of this Government, for having secreted a large Quantity of Gold Coin which they found in digging at the Seat of Prince Pallavicini at Passerano. Upon their Examination they discovered where most of it was concealed, which was found according to their Direction; it appears to be very ancient, but is not greatly defaced, having been well secured in a strong Urn.

*Prague, Aug. 14.* The Prince of Furstenberg, who has spent best Part of the Summer at his Seat in this Kingdom, came here on Thursday Night last with all his Family. All the Troops destined to form the Camp at Colin are arrived, but the wet Weather has as yet prevented their being daily exercised as usual. On Saturday last a Fire broke out at a Baker's in the Old Town, and burnt with great Violence, but by timely Assistance it was soon got under, only three or four Houses having been consumed.

*Dresden, Aug. 16.* Count Bestucheff, who resided many Years at the Court of Vienna in Quality of Minister Plenipotentiary from the Empress of Russia, arrived here two or three Days ago, and has already had the Honour of being presented to the King, and the rest of the Royal Family; and next Week he proposes leaving this Place, in order to continue his Journey for Petersbourg. The King has lately made a Promotion of Military Officers, amongst whom the Majors General Bellegarde, Vitzhum, Munchau, and Plotz, have been raised to the Rank of Lieutenants General; and Colonel Bohlau, of his Majesty's Body Guards, has been raised to that of Major General. M. Calkoen, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces, has obtained

tained Leave of this Court to return to Holland on his private Affairs, and proposes setting out from hence To-morrow for the Hague; he goes by the Way of Hanover, where 'tis said he is to execute a private Commission of great Importance.

*Dusseldorp, Aug. 22.* We learn by Letters from Neuhaus, that the Court of the Elector of Cologne is extremely brilliant, occasioned by the great Number of Persons of Distinction whom his Highness's Presence has brought thither. The same Letters add, that on Wednesday last his Electoral Highness's Birth-day was celebrated there with great Magnificence, on which Occasion the States of the Bishoprick of Paderborn made him a Present of 10,000 Florins. 'Tis said his Highness intends to set out from thence on the 10th of next Month for Bon; and that he will take his Route by Arensbouurg, where he proposes staying two or three Days, in order to take the Diversion of Hunting in that Neighbourhood.

*Brussels, Aug. 23.* They write from Luxembourg, that several considerable Bodies of Recruits were lately arrived there from different Parts of the Empire, in order to compleat the Regiments in Garrison at that Place.

*Hague, Aug. 24.* The States of Holland and Westfrizeland, who opened their Assembly Yesterday, have this Day continued their Deliberations. Baron Reischach, Envoy Extraordinary from their Imperial Majesties to this Republick, has received, by Express, an Account of her Imperial Majesty's happy Delivery of an Archduchess on the 13th Instant, and has communicated the same to the President of the Assembly of their High Mightinesses the States General.
