ABSTRACT of several Acts of Parliament, now in Force, which were made for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East-India Company to be erected.

BY the following Acts of Parliament now in Force, and which were made, for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from Trading to the East-Indies under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India Company, to be erected; it is enacted as follows, *viz.*

5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By an Act passed in the 5th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except those Licensed by the East-India Company, are prohibited from going to the East-Indies. — And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East-India Company are empowered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in the East-Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence; And every British Subject, who shall procure, solicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince, or State, to sail, or go, or trade, in, or to the East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every such Offence, 500*l.*

7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By another Act passed in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, every Subject of His Majesty, who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-Indies or purchased there, by any such Offen-

ders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person, by his Order, or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with double the Value thereof.

9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.] By an Act passed in the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting, the raising, establishing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company, from, and after, the 24th Day of June, 1723, to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading to the East-Indies, and from being interested in, or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Capital, of such Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any such Foreign Company, together with Treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney-General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney-General's waving in such Bill, the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value; and insisting only on the Single Value thereof; And in such Case, the Single Value is to be decreed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majesty accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern, which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall have, or be intitled to, in any such Foreign Company; and who shall not, within Six Months, next after the Accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforesaid, truly discover the same in Writing to the East-India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known and not discovered, as aforesaid; and any Person making such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than such as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going

to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared guilty of a High Crime, and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment, or Fine, for the same, at the Discretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.

And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

Genoa, Aug. 10. Frequent Councils are held here, to consult on the most proper Means of quieting the Minds of the Malecontents in Corsica, the Affairs of that Island still continuing very much embroiled. The Palace of Doria is compleatly fitted up for the Reception of the Dutchess of Parma, and the Gallies appointed to conduct her Highness to Antibes, are daily expected in our Port. They write from Bastia, that the Squadron of French Men of War, which returned lately from before Tripoly, were put into the Port of Ajaccio, without any seeming Appearance of their returning soon to Toulon.

Copenhagen, Aug. 19. The Sale of the Merchandize lately brought here from China is quite finished, and has proved very advantageous to our East India Company, most of the Goods having sold at an exceeding good Price; and the King, as a fresh Mark of his Generosity to that Company, has given them the Sundermanland Man of War of 50 Guns, compleatly rigged, for their Protection, which is computed to be worth at least 60000 Crowns. Baron Gyldenkrone has obtained Leave to quit his Post of President of the Chamber of Finances, and is allowed a considerable Pension, in Consideration of his long and faithful Services.

Dresden, Aug. 20. Their Majesties Departure for Poland continues fixed for the 28th Instant; and we are assured that the Princes Xavier and Charles are to accompany them in that Journey. The Ceremony of the Marriage of the Chamberlain Count Miazinsky, with the young Countess of Collowrath, was celebrated at

Court, with the greatest Solemnity, on Thursday last, in the Presence of their Majesties, and all the Princes and Princesses of the Royal Family.

Schaffhausen, Aug. 20. Notwithstanding the rigorous Orders lately given by his most Christian Majesty, to prevent any of his Protestant Subjects from departing out of his Dominions, great Numbers have actually escaped into Swisserland and other Places. Last Week fourteen of them were seized in the Neighbourhood of St. Claude in Franche Comte, and sent Prisoners to Billay. Twelve others, who a few Days before were endeavouring to escape from Grefivaudan to Geneva, were also apprehended, and sent Prisoners to Grenoble; so that 'tis now with the greatest Difficulty those Protestants ever reach the Frontiers of France, as Soldiers are almost continually patrolling the high Roads in order to secure them and their Effects.

Milan, Aug. 20. Information having been given to Count Pallavicini, our Governour-General, that a large Troop of Banditti is lately form'd in this Dutchy, who have already committed very great Outrages, particularly upon the River Adda, where they robbed and plundered several small Vessels passing up and down that River with Goods and Merchandizes, and have carried off a large Quantity unmolested; his Excellency, in order to put a Stop to such villanous Proceedings, has caused publick Notice to be given, that whoever apprehends any one of those Offenders, shall be entitled to and receive the Sum of one hundred Sequins.

Franckfort, Aug. 21. This Morning the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, who has been for some Weeks at the Baths of Schwalbach, passed through this City on his Return Home. They write from Ratisbon, that it has been resolved, in the three Colleges of the Empire, to reimburse Baron Haagen, Commander of Philipsbourg, all the Money he has advanced in repairing the Fortifications of that City.

Berlin, Aug. 22. We are assured that the King intends going the Beginning of next Month to Silesia, in order to review the Troops quartered in that Country. We learn from Franckfort upon the Oder, that for some Time past there have been prodigious Flights of Locusts in the Neighbourhood of that City, which have greatly damaged the Fruits of the Earth.

Leipsick, Aug. 22. The young Prince of Anhalt Zerbst, who has been near two Years on his Travels to some of the principal Courts of Europe, arrived here on Tuesday last; and on Friday Morning set out for Zerbst, the Place of his Residence.

Versailles, Aug. 25. On Sunday last their Majesties, accompanied by the Dauphiness and Mesdames de France, went to the Chapel Royal, and assisted at Te-Deum, which was sung to Musick, on the happy Recovery of the Dauphin; and at Night a grand Firework was played off over-against the grand Gallery in the Garden, which was so well conducted, that the King ordered a handsome Sum of

of Money to be distributed amongst those who had the Management of it. And this Morning their Majesties received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers on Occasion of the Dauphin's Recovery. On Sunday next his Royal Highness will remove to Meudon, for the Change of Air. The Count de-Noailles set out on Friday last for Antibes, in order to receive the Dutchess of Parma; and the Detachments of Guards, appointed to escort that Princess hither, have taken the Route of Provence.

Paris, Aug. 25. An Arret of the King's Council of State is published here, annulling that of the Parliament against the Vicar of the Parish of St. Stephen du Mont, which condemned the Vicar to give a certain Sum of Money to be distributed amongst the Poor, and also to be banished the Kingdom for three Years.

Brussels, Aug. 28. The Damage sustained by the Sea's breaking down the Sluice at Fort Schlick, so far merits the Attention of this Court, that the Marquess de Botta Adorno set out on Wednesday last, by Order of Prince Charles of Lorraine our Governor General, for Ostend, in order to see the same effectually repaired.

Hague, Aug. 29. We are informed by Letters received this Morning from Dieren, that her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and her Children, continue there in perfect Health; and that her Royal Highness made a Tour last Week to the Seat of M. Bout, Deputy to the Assembly of the States General on the Part of the Province of Zealand.
