It was this Day Ordered in Council, That
the Parliament, which stands prorogued to
Thursday the 28th Day of September next,
should be further prorogued to Tuesday the 31st
Day of October following.

*ABSTRACT of several Acts of Par-
liament, now in Force, which were made
for preventing His Majesty's Subjects from
Trading to the East-Indies, under Foreign
Commissions; and from being interested
or concerned in any Foreign East-India
Company to be erected.*

BY the following Acts of Parliament
now in Force, and which were made,
for preventing His Majesty's Subjects
from Trading to the East-Indies under
Foreign Commissions; and from being inter-
ested, or concerned, in any Foreign East-India
Company, to be erected; it is enacted as
follows, *viz.*

5th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By an Act passed in
the 5th Year of His late Majesty King George
the First, all His Majesty's Subjects, except
those Licensed by the East-India Company, are
prohibited from going to the East-Indies. —
And to the End such Offenders may be brought
to Justice, the East-India Company are em-
powered to arrest, and seize, such Offenders in
the East-Indies, and to send them to England,
there to answer for the said Offence; And
every British Subject, who shall procure, sol-
licit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission,
Authority, or Pass, from any Foreign Prince,
or State, to sail, or go, or trade, in, or to the
East-Indies, incurs, and forfeits, for every such
Offence, 500*l.*

7th Geo. I. Cap. 21.] By another Act passed
in the 7th Year of His late Majesty King
George the First, every Subject of His Majesty,
who shall go to, or shall Trade, or Adventure
into, or from, the East-Indies, (contrary to
the Laws in being,) and shall be convicted
thereof, in any of His Majesty's Courts of Re-
cord at Westminster, is to pay, and suffer such
Fine, and Imprisonment, as the Court shall
think fit.

And all the Goods, and Merchandize, that
shall be bartered or traffick'd for, in the East-
Indies or purchased there, by any such Offen-
ders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or
in the Custody of any other Person, by his Or-
der, or Procurement, are declared to be for-
feited, with double the Value thereof.

9th Geo. I. Cap. 26.] By an Act passed in
the 9th Year of His late Majesty King George
the First, all His Majesty's Subjects are pro-
hibited from subscribing, contributing to, en-
couraging, or promoting, the raising, establish-
ing, or carrying on, any Foreign Company,
from, and after, the 24th Day of June, 1723,
to be raised, formed, or erected, for Trading
to the East-Indies, and from being interested in,
or intitled to, any Share in the Stock, or Ca-
pital, of such Foreign Company, under For-
feiture of all his, her, or their Interest, in the
Capital, Principal, Stock, or Actions, of any
such Foreign Company, together with Treble
the Value thereof.

And the Attorney-General is empowered to
exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chan-
cery, or Court of Exchequer, against such Of-
fenders, for the Discovery of such Offence;
which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to
make on the Attorney-General's waving in such
Bill; the said Forfeiture of the Treble Value,
and insisting only on the Single Value thereof;
And in such Case, the Single Value is to be de-
creed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every Subject of His Majesty ac-
cepting of any Trust, or knowing of any In-
terest, Share, Part, Proportion, or Concern,
which any other of His Majesty's Subjects shall
have, or be intitled to, in any such Foreign
Company; and who shall not, within Six
Months, next after the Accepting such Trust,
or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest,
Share, Proportion, or Concern, as aforesaid,
truly discover the same in Writing to the East-
India Company, or their Court of Directors,
shall forfeit Treble the Value of the Interest so
accepted in Trust, or so known and not dis-
covered, as aforesaid; and any Person making
such Discovery, is intitled to a Moiety of the
Forfeiture.

And all His Majesty's Subjects, (other than
such as are lawfully authorized thereunto,) going
to, or found in the East-Indies, are declared
guilty of a High Crime, and Misdemeanor, and
are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Im-
prisonment, or Fine, for the same, at the Dis-
cretion of such of His Majesty's Courts of Re-
cord

cord

cord at Westminster, where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.

And every Person so offending may be seized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act passed in the 3d Year of His present Majesty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majesty's Subjects (other than the East-India Company, and those licensed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof,

Naples, Aug. 15. The King is returned to the Palace in this City from the Island of Procida, whither he went last Week to take the Diversion of Hunting; and his Majesty has already declared his Intention of going thither again in a few Days, if the Weather continues fair. On Wednesday last a Gang of Thirty Robbers, who were lately apprehended in the Abruzzo, were brought under a strong Guard to this City, and committed to Prison. The Commerce of this Kingdom continues still free from Interruption, the Masters of the Vessels that have lately arrived in this Port, not having heard of any Barbary Corsairs being on the Coast. They write from Apulia, that, on the 10th Instant, they had a most violent Storm of Hail and Rain, accompanied with Thunder and Lightning, in several Places of that Province, and that the Damage caused thereby is very considerable.

Rome, Aug. 19. On Thursday last, being the Anniversary of the Pope's Advancement to the Papal Chair, he was complimented thereupon by Cardinal Delci, in the Name of the Sacred College. The Congregation de Propaganda Fide have lately received Letters from their Missionaries in the Kingdom of Thibet, with the agreeable News, that they have been very successful in their Endeavours of converting those Infidels to the Christian Faith; but the Advices they have lately received from their Missionaries in China, are not altogether so favourable. Cardinal Spinola, who went some Time since to Albano, for the Sake of his Health, is so extremely ill, that his Physicians have very little Hopes of his Recovery. Our Letters by this Day's Post are full of melancholly Accounts of Earthquakes that happened the Beginning of this Week in several Places of the Ecclesiastical State, which have done an infinite deal of Damage; and particularly at Civitta Castellana, where several of the Inhabitants have had the Misfortune to be buried under the Ruins of their Houses.

Modena, Aug. 23. Yesterday his Serene Highness the Duke our Sovereign, who has been

at Rivalta for these two Months past, arrived here from thence with the whole Court. We are informed by our last Advices from Genoa, that the Great and Little Council have assembled there for two or three Days together, on the Affairs of Corsica; as also to consider of the Invitation they have lately received to accede to the Treaty of Madrid; but we do not as yet hear of their having come to any final Resolution thereupon.

Stockholm, Aug. 25. The Court having been informed, that the Sieur Sprenger, who, during the Holding the late Diet, was banished for Life to Marstrand, has made his Escape from thence, have ordered the Council of Justice to make the strictest Enquiry into that Affair, in order, if it shall be found necessary, to punish those who had the Care of him.

Copenhagen, Aug. 29. The King arrived here Yesterday Morning from Jagerspreys; to Day he gave some private Audiences; and Tomorrow his Majesty sets out for Friedensbourg. No Day is as yet fixed for the Queen's publick Entry into this City, but the Preparations necessary for that solemn Occasion, are still carrying on with great Diligence.

Vienna, Aug. 29. This Morning his Imperial Majesty, accompanied by Prince Aversperg, and some others of the principal Nobility, set out for Hollitsch, where he proposes staying till the 6th of next Month. We are assured, that the Regiment of Hussars of Prince Esterhasi is ordered to march into Italy, in order to relieve the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Saxe Gotha, which is to return into Hungary.

Hanan, Sept. 2. The Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, our Sovereign, came to this City on Wednesday last, with a numerous Retinue. He was received by the City Militia under Arms, and saluted at his Entrance by a triple Discharge of the Artillery upon the Ramparts. And, after dining with our Governor, and viewing the Fortifications, he set out in the Evening on his Return to Philipsruhe.

Brussels, Sept. 3. The Commissaries appointed for settling the Barrier and Tariff, having receiving some Instructions from their respective Courts, held their eighth Conference in this City on Thursday last. Prince Charles of Lorraine, our Governor General, intends to set out the End of this Week for Ghent, and some other Places in Flanders. 'Tis said our Regency are going to lay a Duty upon all Foreign Paper that shall be brought into this Country, and that an Edict is actually in the Press for that Purpose. M. Limpens, one of the Members of the Privy Council, is set out, by order of our Governor General, for Liege, in order to regulate, with the Deputies of the States of that Principality, some Affairs relating to Commerce.

Cologne, Sept. 4. A few Days ago, four notorious Highwaymen, who were apprehended at an Inn near Kerpen, were brought from thence, under a strong Guard, to the Prisons in this City; and as they belong to a numerous Gang that have lately formed themselves in this Country, 'tis hoped they will soon make great Discoveries. We learn from Eysenach, that towards the End of last Month, the Waters rose so high, occasioned by the late great Rains, that the River Nefle overflowed its Banks in many Places,

Places, and laid great Part of the adjacent Country under Water; that the Rapidity of the Stream was so sudden and so great, as to destroy most of the Bridges upon that River; and that several People, who lived near its Banks, were drowned, with most of their Cattle.

Dusseldorp, Sept. 5. According to our last Advices from Bonn, the Elector of Cologne was daily expected there from his Journey into Westphalia. The Desertion amongst the Troops in this Garrison is become more frequent of late than ever; and, by our best Accounts, the greatest Part of them take the Road to Wesel, and enter into the Service of the King of Prussia.

Hague, Sept. 7. Count Bentinck, who has been for some Time at his Seat in Guelderland, is returned here, and assists regularly at the Assembly of their High Mightinesses the States General. We have received Advice this Morning from Germany, that the Elector of Cologne is safe arrived at Augustebourg, from the Journey his Electoral Highness has lately taken into Westphalia.
