And every Perfon fo offending may be feized, and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any one of His Majesty's Juffices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by Natural-born Subjects or Denizens, to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3d Geo. II. Cap. 14.] By an Act paffed in the 3d Year of His prefent Majefty, it is Enacted, That if any of His Majefty's Subjects (other than the Eaft-India Company, and those licenfed by them) shall directly, or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure into, or from, the East-Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture, and Loss, of all the Ships, and Vessels, employed in such Voyage, Trade, or Adventure; and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded, or adventured, within the East-Indies, and all the Proceed, and Effects, of the same, and Double the Value thereof.

at Rivalta for these two Months past, arrived here from thence with the whole Court. We are informed by our last Advices from Genoa, that the Great and Little Council have assembled there for two or three Days together, on the Affairs of Corsica; as also to consider of the Invitation they have lately received to acceed to the Treaty of Madrid; but we do not as yet hear of their having come to any final Resolution thereupon.

Stotkholm, Aug. 25. The Court having been informed, that the Sieur Sprenger, who, during the Holding the late Diet, was banished for Life to Marstrand, has made his Escape from thence, have ordered the Council of Justice to make the strictest Enquiry into that Affair, in order, if it shall be found necessary, to punish those who had the Care of him.

Copenhagen, Aug. 29. The King arrived here Yesterday Morning from Jagerspreys; to Day he gave fome private Audiences; and Tomorrow his Majesty sets out for Friedensbourg. No Day is as yet fixed for the Queen's publick Entry into this City, but the Preparations neceffary for that folemn Occasion, are still carrying on with great Diligence. Vienna, Aug. 29. This Morning his Imperial Majesty, accompanied by Prince Aversperg, and some others of the principal Nobility, set out for Hollitfch, where he proposes staying till the 6th of next Month. We are affured, that the Regiment of Huffars of Prince Efferhali is ordered to march into Italy, in order to relieve the Regiment of Cuiraffiers of Saxe Gotha, which is to return into Hungary. Hanan, Sept. 2. The Landgrave of Heffe Caffel, our Sovereign, came to this City on Wednesday last, with a numerous Retinue. He was received by the City Militia under Arms, and faluted at his Entrance by a triple Difcharge of the Artillery upon the Ramparts. And, after dining with our Governor, and viewing the Fortifications, he fet out in the Evening on his Return to Philipsruhe. Bruffels, Sept. 3. The Commiffaries appointed for fettling the Barrier and Tariff, having receiving fome Instructions from their respective Courts, held their eighth Conference in this City on Thursday last. Prince Charles of Lorrain, our Governor General, intends to fet out the End of this Week for Ghent, and fome other Places in Flanders. 'Tis faid our Regency are going to lay a Duty upon all Foreign Paper that shall be brought into this Country, and that an Edict is actually in the Prefs for that Purpole. M. Limpens, one of the Members of the Privy Council, is fet out, by order of our Governor General, for Liege, in order to regulate, with the Deputies of the States of that Principality, fome Affairs relating to Commerce. Cologn, Sept. 4. A few Days ago, four notorious Highwaymen, who were apprehended at an Inn near Kerpen, were brought from thence, under a strong Guard, to the Prisons in this City; and as they belong to a numerous Gang that have lately formed themselves in this Country, 'tis hoped they will foon make great Difcoveries. We learn from Eyfenach, that towards the End of last Month, the Waters role to high, occasioned by the late great Rains, that the River Neffe overflowed its Banks in many Places,

Naples, Aug. 13. The King is returned to the Palace in this City from the Island of Procida, whither he went laft Week to take the Diversion of Hunting; and his Majesty has already declared his Intention of going thither again in a few Days, if the Weather continues fair. On Wedneiday laft a Gang of Thirty Robbers, who were lately apprehended in the Abruzzo, were brought under a ffrong Guard to this City, and committed to Prison. The Commerce of this Kingdom continues still free from Interruption, the Masters of the Vessels that have lately arrived in this Port, not having heard of any Barbary Corfairs being on the Coaft. They write from Apulia, that, on the 10th Inflant, they had a most violent Storm of Hail and Rain, accompanied with Thunder and Lightening, in feveral Places of that Province, and that the Damage caufed thereby is very confiderable.

Rome, Aug. 19. On Thurfday last, being the Anniverfary of the Pope's Advancement to the Papal Chair, he was complimented thereupon by Cardinal Delci, in the Name of the Sacred College. The Congregation de Propaganda Fide have lately received Letters from their Missionaries in the Kingdom of Thibet, with the agreeable News, that they have been •very fuccessful in their Endeavours of converting those Infidels to the Christian Faith; but the Advices they have lately received from their Millionaries in China, are not altogether fo favourable. Cardinal Spinola, who went fome Time fince to Albano, for the Sake of his Health, is fo extremely ill, that his Physicians have very little Hopes of his Recovery.
