THIS Day the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, waited on his Majesty, to congratulate him on his safe Return; and being introduced to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Grafton, Lord Chamberlain of his Majesty's Household, Richard Adams, Esq; the Recorder, made their Compliments in the following Address.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty:

The humble Address of the Lord-Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

AMIDST the general Joy of the Nation for your Majesty's safe and happy Return to your British Dominions, be pleased to accept the sincere Congratulations of your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of your City of London, in Common Council assembled.

Permit us at the same Time, Royal Sir, to repeat the just and grateful Sense we have of your Majesty's paternal Care over your People, and of the many Favours by which your Majesty hath graciously distinguished your City of London.

May the Divine Providence long preserve your Majesty to reign over these Kingdoms; and may there never be wanting a Succession of Princes in your Royal House, formed by your great Example, to continue the Blessing of Civil and Religious Freedom to latest Posterity.

To which Address his Majesty was pleased to return this most gracious Answer.

I Thank you, for this very dutiful, and affectionate Address. The Support, and Improvement, of the Trade, and Commerce, of my People, is so essential to the Welfare, and Prosperity, of my Kingdoms; that the City of London may always depend upon my particular Attention to it; and upon the Continuance of my Favour, and Protection.

They were received very graciously, and all had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand.

Petersbourg, Oct. 25. On Saturday last the Empress quitted her Summer Palace, and retired to her Winter Palace. Her Imperial Majesty having given Orders for most of the Regiments which compose the Troops of this Empire to change their respective Quarters, they are all now actually in Motion for that Purpose. We are informed by several private Letters from Derbent and Astracan, that the Troubles in Persia continue to encrease, and 'tis greatly feared that unhappy Kingdom will in the End be totally ruined.

Naples, Oct. 26. Their Majesties continue at Portici, taking the Diversions of the Season. They write from Messina, that the Manufacture of Camblets, lately established in that City; meets with great Encouragement.

Rome, Oct. 30. The Pope has approved of the Nomination which the King of the two Sicilies lately made of the Abbe de Altamura to be Archbishop of Otranto. M. Borrul, the new Auditor de Rota for the Kingdom of Aragon, had some Days ago his first publick Audience of the Pope in that Quality. They have felt so many slight Shocks of Earthquakes within these few Days past in the Dutchy of Urbini, that most of the Nobility and Gentry who have Country Seats in that Dutchy; have quitted them much sooner than usual, and are returned to this City. M. Millo, the Apostolical Datary, who went some Time since by the Pope's Orders to Bologna, in order to take an exact Account of the Revenues of that Archbishoprick, is daily expected from thence with the young Prince Lambertini, one of the Pope's Nephews. By our last Letters from Naples we are informed of the Death of the Bishop of Tremoli, but no one is as yet appointed to succeed him.

Turin, Oct. 30. The King has renewed the Edict which forbids his Subjects from leaving their Estates to Monasteries; which Edict moreover declares, that all Annuities, or other Sums whatsoever, that are paid yearly by such Monasteries to private Persons out of Estates which have been left them for those Purposes, shall, after the Decease of such Persons, be paid to the Crown. His Majesty has already named most of the Officers for the two Regiments of Foot that are now raising in the Novarois and Tortonois.

Modena, Nov. 4. The Marquess de Ossun, the new French Ambassador to the Court of Naples, arrived here the 29th past, and was soon after introduced to the Duke, our Sovereign, who received him with great Marks of Distinction; after which he continued his Journey for Naples.

Ratisbon, Nov. 6. The Count de Seilern, whom the Empress Queen of Hungary has appointed to succeed Count Franckenbourg as Ambassador from Bohemia to the General Diet of the Empire, is daily expected here from Vienna. We hear from Munich, that the young Prince of Czartorjnski, who has been there about three Weeks, was set out for Manheim, from whence he proposed continuing his Tour to most of the principal Courts of Germany.

Frankfort, Nov. 11. The Protestants established in this City have agreed to renew their Solicitations for Leave to build them a Church in this City. We have an Account by Letters received this Post from Erfort, that a Fire broke out on the 3d Instant at Ilmenau, in the Province of Hennenbourg, which burnt with such Violence, that the Church, the Castle, and a great Part of the Houses of that Town, were entirely reduced to Ashes.

Paris, Nov. 12. The King, after he quitted Fontainebleau, staid a Day or two at Choisy, from whence he arrived at Versailles on Friday last.

Hague, Nov. 16. The Baron de Ulm, and M. van Welvelde, have taken their respective Oaths in the Council of State, the first in Quality of Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of Baden Baden, and the other in Quality of Captain in the Regiment of Orange Drenthe, to which they were lately preferred by her Royal Highness the Princess Governante. We learn from Schiedam, that M. Boffchaers, ancient Burgomaster of that Town, is appointed Counsellor to the Admiralty of the Meuse, in the Room of M. Elias, lately deceased.

This Day Don Louis da Cunha, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Portugal, had his first private Audience of his Majesty, to deliver his Letter of Credence; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Holderness, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knight, Master of the Ceremonies.

This Day the Envoy Extraordinary from Portugal had his first Private Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; to which he was introduced by the Master of the Ceremonies.
