Cadix, Jan. 8. There appears to be no Foundation for the Report that has prevailed for some Time past, that the King was going to re-establish the Sending the Flota and Galloons to America; on the contrary, his Majesty has augmented the Number of Register Ships which have of late Years been employed to carry Merchandize to America in their Stead; it being found more convenient to have Register Ships which go off as they find Loading, than to wait for the Parade of a large Fleet. Advice has been received by the Chamber of Commerce, that three Register Ships, named the Brilliant, the Notre Dame de Rosaire, and the Triumphant, sailed from the Havanna the 28th of October last, on their Return to Europe, but, in passing the Bahama Channel, the Triumphant struck against a Rock; it being near the Shore, the Crew had the good Fortune to save themselves, with all the Money, and most of the valuable Effects. We expect with Impatience the Arrival of the other two, the Cargoes whereof are computed to be worth at least 4000000 Piastras.

Naples, Jan. 9. Their Majesties returned here this Afternoon in perfect Health from Persano. The King has appointed Prince Custola to be one of his Council of State, in the room of the late Prince Corfini. They have lately discovered, in the Neighbourhood of the City of Capua, where there stood formerly a Temple dedicated to Jupiter, several beautiful Marble Pillars, &c. which his Majesty has ordered to be sent to Caserta, in order to be used in the new Palace that is erecting there.

Rome, Jan. 13. On Saturday last, being Twelfth-Day, the Pope went in great State to the Chapel in the Quirinal, and heard Mass sung to Musick by Cardinal Delci, at which most of the Members of the Sacred College assisted. They go on with great Vigour in repairing the Port of Anzio, which 'tis thought will be finished next Spring. A Project is on Foot for the Erecting two new Bishopricks in the Portuguese Settlements in the Indies, and 'tis said the Pope waits only for the Return of an Express from Portugal, to carry the same into Execution. We have had such a prodigious Quantity of Rain fall of late in this Country, that the Waters of the Tiber are swelled almost to the Top of its Banks, which gives us great Uneasiness, lest that River should overflow, and cause the same Havock it did here about two Years since.

Milan, Jan. 16. The Hereditary Prince of Anspach, who has resided for some Months past at Turin, arrived here on Thursday Night last, with a numerous Retinue; and is treated with great Marks of Distinction.

Copenhagen, Jan. 22. Yesterday being the Anniversary of the King's Coronation, the same was observed at Court as usual. The Crews of the Sunderland and the Three Princesses will pass in Review To-morrow or next Day before the Commissaries of the Marine, those two Ships being ready to sail with the first fair Wind for Tranquebar.

Hambourg, Jan. 26. The King of Denmark having given Orders for all his Regiments to be compleat by the Spring, several of his Danish Majesty's Officers are arrived here within these few Days past; in order to raise Recruits

for their respective Regiments. They write from Constantinople, that soon after the Grand Vifier's first Secretary was deposed, he was conducted Prisoner to an old Castle about two Leagues from Adrianople, where he is ordered to be strictly guarded.

Hague, Feb. 1. The States of this Province have continued to Day their Deliberations. Baron Knuth, Deputy to the Assembly of the States-General, on the Part of Overyssel, is set out from hence for that Province. 'Tis said the Duke of Modena has acquainted their High Mightinesses, by Letter, that the Hereditary Princess, his Daughter-in-Law, was safely delivered of a Prince on the 4th of last Month.
