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Westminster, April 17.

**H**IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honourable Sir Henry Bellenden, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

*Lisbon, March 10.* They are getting together, with all Expedition, the Provisions and Forage for the Subsistence of the Troops that are to be encamped the Beginning of the Summer in the Neighbourhood of this City. We have lately had a surprizing Change of Weather in this Country; it is now become very fine, and there is the greatest Appearance of a plentiful Harvest. The Orders given some Time since to prevent the sending of Gold, either in Bars or Specie, out of this Kingdom, are again renewed.

*Palermo, March 13.* The Fortifications of this City have received considerable Damage by the Overflowing of the Dykes, which has frequently happened during the late great Storms. We have received Advice, that four of our Xebecs, being on a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates, fell in with three Algerine Men of War, one of which they sunk, after an obstinate Engagement, and obliged the other two to flee off.

*Genoa, March 20.* Our last Advices from Corfica are far from being favourable, for notwithstanding the French General has delivered up the strong Post of San Fiorenza to the Marquess de Grimaldi, yet the Steps that are taking by the Malecontents, seem to give this Government great Uneasiness. We are informed by Letters received this Post from Spain, that the Troops appointed to form a Camp in Catalonia, have received Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to march, and that they are actually providing the necessary Provisions for their Subsistence.

*Turin, March 23.* Last Week an extraordinary Council was held at Court, at which the King and the Duke of Savoy assisted, when a further Reduction of his Majesty's Troops was taken into Consideration, but the Resolutions taken thereupon are as yet kept secret. The Marquess des Issarts, who has resided here for some Time in Quality of Ambassador from France, set out on Tuesday last on his Return to Paris. The Earthquake that happened on the 9th Instant, did some Damage in the Valleys of Lucerne and Perouse; the Fortress of Fenestrelles also suffered a little; but the Consternation of the Inhabitants on that Occasion was very great, owing chiefly to the dreadful Noise which was heard from the neighbouring Mountains.

*Dantzick, March 28.* The Reports lately published Abroad of Differences and Disputes having arisen between the Magistrates and Citizens of this City, are without the least Foundation, every Thing here being in perfect Tranquility; and the good Understanding and Harmony that subsists between our Magistrates and Burghers is so evident, that there is not the least Appearance of any Disturbance; what Ends therefore such artful, false and malicious Reports can tend to, are known only to those

*Ratisbon, March 29.* We hear from Munich, that the Elector of Cologne was to set out from thence as this Morning, on his Return to Bonn. According to the new Military Regulation, that is going to be established in Bavaria, the Troops of that Electorate are for the future to consist of 9000 Foot and 3000 Horse in Time of Peace, besides 10000 Militia, in which the disbanded Officers of his Electoral Highness's Troops are to be employed.

*Stockholm, March 30.* The notorious Frauds and Impositions which have lately been discovered to have been committed by the Importers of Mineral Waters, have induced the King to grant an exclusive Privilege to the College of Physicians, of the sole Right of importing and vending that Commodity throughout this Kingdom.

*Vienna, March 31.* The Empress Queen, in order to encourage and promote the Manufactures of her hereditary Countries, has ordered, that for the future an additional Duty be laid on all foreign Manufactures brought into and vendd in those Countries. The Camp that is to be formed this Summer near Egra in Bohemia, will consist of 40000 Men, and that at Olmutz in Moravia, of 12000. The Regiment of Cuirassiers of Luchesi, which is here in Garrison, is ordered into Moravia; and the Regiment of Foot of Collovrath, in Garrison at Offen in Lower Hungary, is ordered to reinforce the Troops in the Bannat of Tameswear.

*Berlin, April 4.* When the King went to compliment the Queen Mother on her Birthday, his Majesty presented her with a beautiful Gold Snuff Box set with Diamonds of great Value. They write from Hall, that towards the End of last Month several Fires had suddenly broke out in some of the Villages in that Neighbourhood, without any Body's being able to judge from what Cause they proceeded.

*Bonn, April 5.* The Elector our Sovereign arrived here this Morning from Munich, where his Electoral Highness has been for some Time on a Visit to the Elector of Bavaria.

*Hambourg, April 6.* We have received Advice from Kiel, that M. Pfenning, Great Chancellor of the Dutchy of Holstein, and Knight of the Order of St. Anne, died there the 29th of last Month, in the 81st Year of his Age.

*Paris, April 8.* Besides the Marriage of the Prince of Conde with Mademoiselle de Soubise, which we hear is to be celebrated towards the End of next Month; 'tis said another is also agreed on between the Count de la Marche, only Son to the Prince of Conti, with a Princess of Modena, and the same is shortly expected to be declared at Court. The Talk of our having five Camps this Summer is again revived; the first of which is to be in the Neighbourhood of Compiègne, and will consist of the King's Household Troops; the second in Flanders, under the Command of the Prince of Soubise; the third in Hainault, under the Command of the Marquis de Breze; the fourth in Alsace, under the Command of M. de Chevert; and the fifth in Franche-Comte, under the Command of the Duke de Randan; all which Camps we are assured are to be formed with no other View than to review and exercise the Troops. We are informed by our last Letters from Cadiz, that on the 9th of last Month they had a violent Storm of Wind, which lasted for two Days, and greatly damaged several Ships which were at Anchor in that Bay.

*Hague, April 10.* The States of Holland and Westfrizeland have this Morning renewed

their Deliberations; and the Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty of these Provinces, who have been assembled here for some Time past, apply themselves with great Attention to the Affairs of their Department. We are assured, that a Resolution is taken to grant free Liberty for Cattle to be brought into the Territories of this Republick, from any of the neighbouring States, till the last Day of May next.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Edward Aftley, Henry Talbot, Thomas Sutton, and Joshua Churchill, Esqrs. together with John Milbanke, Esq; in the Room of John Vere, Esq; to be his Majesty's Commissioners for the Receipt and Management of the Duties on Salt.
