*Lisbon, March 21.*

**T**H E King has caused an Ordonnance to be published, renewing the former Prohibition against sending Gold, either in Bars or Specie, out of this Kingdom, and for inflicting severe Punishments on those who shall for the future be found guilty of it. His Majesty has settled the Route that the Infante Anne-Marie-Francoise, future Spouse to the Archduke Joseph, is to take to Germany, by which it appears, she is to go by Land through Spain, &c. and so on to Vienna.

*Bastia, March 26.* We are informed, that since the French Troops evacuated the Posts in the interior Parts of this Island, some Misunderstandings have happened amongst the Chiefs of the Malecontents, on Account of the great Power and Authority conferred on M. Gafforio; and that four of the Pieves not only refused sending Deputies to the last general Assembly, but have even entred into a Negociation with the Marquess Grimaldi, who has thereupon sent Circular Letters to the other Communities, exhorting them to follow their Example; and requesting them, at the same Time, to send Deputies hither, in order to accommodate their Disputes with the Republick, from whom, he alledges, he has received full Powers to give them all reasonable Satisfaction; but we do not find that any of them seem inclined to comply therewith; on the contrary, they have since attended the Summons of M. Gafforio to a general Assembly, where the Resolutions taken last Assembly, for raising, upon each Pieve, a Sum sufficient to defray the Expence of a Body of Troops for their mutual Defence, under the Name of the Confederate Army, were unanimously agreed to.

*Petersbourg, April 4.* We hear by Letters from Moscow, that the Great Chancellor Count Bestucheff is entirely recovered from the Fatigue of his Journey, and has taken upon him the Management of the Affairs of his Department. The same Letters add, that her Imperial Majesty is determined to form a considerable Camp this

Summer, and that the General, who is to have the Command of it, will soon be named. They write from the Ukraine, that the Settlement which is establishing in that Country, called New Servia, encreases very fast, Numbers of Foreigners coming there continually to settle and carry on their respective Employments; that the Town of Archangelogorod, which lies in the Centre of it, is for the most Part built; and that they have already begun to fortify the same against the Insults of the Tartars.

*Florence, April 6.* On Monday last Prince San Severino arrived here from Naples on his Way to England, with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from his Sicilian Majesty. He proposes to set out for Bologna next Sunday, and to proceed from thence by the Way of Parma, Turin, and Paris, and to be in England in about two Months. By the last Letters from Corsica there is Advice, that the Transports were arrived from Toulon, and that the Embarkation of the French Troops was to begin as last Sunday.

*Stockholm, April 10.* The Queen is relaps'd, and obliged to keep her Chamber, which greatly alarms the King and the whole Court; and the Baron de Fuchs, Governor of this City, is so extremely ill, that his Physicians have very little Hopes of his Recovery.

*Vienna, April 11.* Besides the Camps that are to be formed this Summer in Moravia and Bohemia, there is also to be one in the Neighbourhood of Presbourg, but their Imperial Majesties have not as yet declared who is to have the Command of it. The Palace of the late Prince Eugene is actually fitting up for the Archduke Joseph; and as they are also forming his Household, 'tis expected his intended Marriage with the Infanta of Portugal will soon be declared at Court. The Empress Queen of Hungary has given Orders for training up the Militia in her Hereditary Countries, after the Manner of the French, so that for the future there will be a Body of 120000 Men in those Countries always ready to bear Arms.

*Copenhagen, April 14.* On Wednesday last the Court removed to Fredensbourg, where 'tis thought their Majesties will reside best Part of the Summer. The Chamberlain de Cheusses has received his last Instructions, and is preparing to set out for the Hague, where he is to reside in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from this Court.

*Dresden, April 14.* The King has appointed Count Gersdorff, Grand Bailiff of Uppet Lusatia, to be one his Majesty's Privy Council. They continue to make Preparations for the Camp that is to be formed this Summer in the Neighbourhood of this City.

*Cassel, April 15.* Baron Ullar, Colonel of Horse in the Service of the Landgrave our Sovereign, died here a few Days ago in the 50th Year of his Age.

*Berlin, April 18.* The King, accompanied by Prince Ferdinand of Brunsvick, and a numerous Retinue of General Officers, came here on Monday last from Potzdam; and after giving some Audiences at the Palace, and dining with the Queen Mother, his Majesty returned again to Potzdam. They write from Prentzlow, that on the 5th Instant they had a most violent Storm of Wind, accompanied with Hail, Rain, and most violent Claps of Thunder and Lightning, which greatly alarmed the Inhabitants, who however did not receive so much Damage from it as was expected.

*Paris, April 20.* They write from Rochelle, that in the Night between the 4th and 5th Instant, they had a most violent Hurricane, which lasted for some Hours, and greatly damaged several Vessels which lay at Anchor in that Road.

*Hague, April 24.* Prince Birkenfeld, General of Horse in the Service of this Republick, arrived here a few Days ago from Germany, and has since waited on her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, who received him with great Marks of Distinction. On Tuesday last M. Levett took the usual Oaths, at an Assembly of the States General, to qualify himself for the Post of Consul from this Republick to Tunis, in the Room of M. Hudson, who has obtained Leave to resign that Employment.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and War-rant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose.
