**H**IS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint Sir Danvers Osborn, of Chickland's, in the County of Bedford, Baronet; to be Captain General and Governor in Chief of His Majesty's Province of New York, in the Room of the Honourable George Clinton, Esq; who has requested His Majesty's Permission to return to England.

Whitehall, June 6.

The King has been pleased to signify his Pleasure, by Warrant, to the Right Honourable Thomas Earl of Effingham, Deputy to his Grace Edward Duke of Norfolk, Earl Marshal, and Hereditary Earl Marshal of England, That, the Ladies, Lepell Phipps, Wife of Constantine Phipps, Esq; Mary Fitzgerald, Wife of George Fitzgerald, Esq; Emily Caroline Nassau Hervey, and Caroline Hervey, Daughters of the Right Honourable John Lord Hervey, deceased, shall have and enjoy; respectively, the same Place, Pre-eminence, and Precedency, in all Assemblies, and Meetings, whatsoever; as the Daughters of an Earl of the Kingdom of Great Britain, in the same Manner as if their Father had lived to enjoy the Dignity of an Earl of the said Kingdom.

Westminster, June 7.

**H**IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honourable Sir Henry Bellenden, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

*An Act for granting to his Majesty a certain Sum of Money, therein mentioned, out of the Sinking Fund, and for applying certain Surplus Moneys remaining in the Exchequer, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Three, and for the further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament, and for enlarging the Time limited by an Act of the last Session of Parliament, for subscribing Annuities after the Rate of Three Pounds per Centum per Annum, and Three Pounds Ten Shillings per Centum per Annum, into the joint Stock of Annuities, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.*

*An Act for continuing several Laws relating to the Punishment of Persons going armed or disguis-*

*ed, in Defiance of the Laws of Customs or Excise; to the Drawback of the Duties upon Copper Bars exported; and to the Duties upon Foreign-made Sail Cloth; and also for Encouragement of the Silk Manufactures; and for taking off several Duties on Merchandizes exported; and for encouraging the Trade of the Sugar Colonies in America; and for vacating the Security for the Duty on Salt lost in any River, or in Port, after shipped, and for enlarging the Time for proving the Loss of Salt; and for Relief of Masters of Ships with respect to the Importation of Soap and Candles, contrary to an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of his Majesty's Reign; and also for the more effectual Payment of the Bounties upon British-made Sail Cloth; and to empower the Commissioners of the Treasury to direct the Payment of the Bounty to John Henniker and others, upon Four Ships fitted out for the Whale Fishery, and lost in the Greenland Seas, and also to Philip How, and others, upon Two Ships employed in the said Fishery, notwithstanding some of the Forms required by Law in fitting out such Ships were not complied with.*

*An Act for the better preventing of clandestine Marriages.*

*An Act to explain, amend, and continue several Laws more effectually to prevent the spreading of the Distemper which now rages amongst the Horned Cattle in this Kingdom; for the more effectual paying the Expences of passing Vagrants; for obviating Doubts that may arise touching the keeping of Prisoners until the Prison of the Marshalsea of the Court of King's Bench shall be rebuilt or repaired; and for amending so much of the Act of the Twenty-fourth of his present Majesty for regulating the Commencement of the Year, and for correcting the Calendar now in use, as relates to the Time of electing publick Officers of the City of Chester.*

*An Act for purchasing of the Museum or Collection of Sir Hans Sloane, and of the Harleian Collection of Manuscripts, and for providing one general Repository for the better Reception and more convenient Use of the said Collections, and of the Cottonian Library, and of the Additions thereto.*

*An Act to render more effectual an Act, made in the twelfth Year of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen Anne, intituled, An Act for providing a publick Reward for such Person or Persons as shall discover the Longitude at Sea, with Regard to the making Experiments of Proposals made for discovering the Longitude, and to enlarge the Number of Commissioners for putting in Execution the said Act.*

*An Act to explain, amend, and continue the Provisions made by two Acts of Parliament, of the Nineteenth and Twenty-first Years of his Majesty's Reign, for the more effectual disarming the Highlanders in Scotland, and to make Provision for the more speedy ascertaining the lawful Debts or*



*Claims upon the Lands and Hereditaments that some time belonged to Alexander Robertson of Strowan, which with other forfeited Estates are, by an Act of the Twenty-fifth Year of his Majesty's Reign, annexed to the Crown unalienable.*

*An Act for regulating the Manner of licensing Ale Houses, in that Part of Great Britain called England, and for the more easy convicting Persons selling Ale, and other Liquors, without Licence.*

*An Act for the Amendment and Preservation of the publick Highways and Turnpike Roads of this Kingdom, and for the more effectual Execution of the Laws relating thereto.*

*An Act to confirm certain Acts and Orders made by Justices of the Peace being of the Quorum, notwithstanding any Defect in not expressing therein, that such Justices of the Peace are of the Quorum.*

*An Act for the preventing of the Inconveniences and Dangers that may arise from the present Methods of digging Gravel, Sand, Stone, Chalk, and other Materials, on the several Commons and Waste Grounds within this Kingdom, for the Repair of the Highways, and for other Purposes.*

*An Act for allowing further Time for Inrollment of Deeds and Wills made by Papists, and for Relief of Protestant Purchasers, Devisees, and Lessees.*

*An Act to permit Persons professing the Jewish Religion to be naturalized by Parliament, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.*

*An Act to enable the Owners of Houses and Lands in the Parish of Saint Botolph without Aldersgate, and the Inhabitants thereof, to repair the Church and Steeple belonging to the said Parish.*

*An Act to enable James Mallors to open a Street from the West Side of King's Street, in the Parish of St. Margaret, in the City of Westminster, to the back Part of the Houses, Gardens, and Yards on the West Side of Delahaye Street, in the same Parish, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.*

*An Act for laying a Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or one Sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, on every Scots Pint of Ale and Beer which shall be brewed for Sale, brought into, tapped, or sold, within the Town of Paisley, and Liberties thereof, in the County of Renfrew, for improving the Navigation of the River Cart, and for other Purposes.*

*An Act for repairing and widening the several Roads in the County of Peebles, leading from Tweedcross, towards the City of Edinburgh, by Blyth Bridge, La Mancha, and Wheam, and by Linton and Carlops, and from Ingleston, through Carlops, until all the said Roads join the Limits of the County of Edinburgh.*

*An Act for repairing, amending, and widening the several Roads leading from the Red Post, in the Parish of Fivehead, through the Towns of Langport and Somerton, to Butwell, and also from Curry Rivell to Puckington Lane, and from Cary Bridge to Street Cross, in the County of Somerset.*

*An Act to explain and amend an Act, passed in the Twentieth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for repairing the Road leading from Catherick Bridge, in the County of York, to Yarm in the said County, and from thence to Stockton in the County of Durham, and from thence through Sedgefield, in the said County of Durham, to the City of Durham.*

And to Sixteen Private Bills.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

THE Season of the Year is so far advanced, and the Business before you so entirely finished, that it is necessary to put an End to this Session of Parliament. The Zeal which you have shewn for my Person and Government in all your Proceedings, calls for my sincere Thanks; and the Care and Affiduity you have exerted, in making such Provisions as may advance the Commerce of my Subjects; supply and extend their Manufactures; and put a Stop to some Disorders that required Reformation; are no less agreeable to me, than they are Proofs of your Prudence, in laying hold of this Time of Tranquillity to make Domestick Improvements.

The State of Foreign Affairs has received no material Alteration since your Meeting. You may depend on my steadily pursuing the same Principles and Ends, which I then declared to you. To preserve the Peace; to consult the real Prosperity of my People; and, at the same Time, to assert and maintain the Honour and just Rights of my Crown and Kingdoms; are the fixed Objects of all my Measures.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

In granting the Supplies for the current Year, you have equally shewn your Concern for the publick Service, and your Regard to the Ease of your Fellow-Subjects. I thank you for both; as well as for providing with so much Foresight, for the future Augmentation of the Sinking Fund.

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

I have nothing to desire of you, but what I am persuaded you wish for yourselves. Do your utmost Endeavours in your several Countries, to promote the true Interest and Happiness of my People; to propagate Industry; and to preserve good Order and Regularity amongst them; make them sensible of the Blessings they enjoy; and, by these Means, the Quiet and Security of my Government will be best established.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by his Majesty's Command, said:

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

It is his Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, That this Parliament be prorogued to Tuesday the Fourteenth Day of August next, to be then here held; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Tuesday the Fourteenth Day of August next.

Palermo, May 4. A Tunisian Corsair is brought in here by three armed Chebecks; she was taken off Messina, and had on board 20 Pieces of Cannon, and 130 Men, who are all put in Irons; and as the two Men of War, the St. Philip and the Queen, are out on a Cruise, 'tis hoped we shall soon hear of some others of those Pyrates being taken.

Naples, May 8. Last Week an extraordinary Council was held at Portici, upon some Dispatches received from the Courts of Madrid and Versailles. On Saturday last a Duel was fought between

between Count Palaſtrelli, Aid-Major of the Regiment of Italian Guards, and Captain Pignatelli, of the ſame Regiment, in which the former loſt his Life; and the King having been informed that the Captain was the Aggreſſor, has ordered him to be arreſted and brought to Tryal. On the 26th paſt, the Right Honourable the Earl of Rochford, his Britannick Maſteſty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Turin, arrived here with his Lady; ſince which he has been admitted to an Audience of their Maſteſties at Portici, by the Marqueſs Fogliani, Prime Miniſter and Secretary of State, and was moſt graciously received. His Lordſhip propoſes to ſtay here a few Days longer, in order to ſee every Thing remarkable in this City, and then to ſet out for Florence, and from thence to Venice, which he propoſes to reach by the End of this Month, in order to partake of the Feſtival of the Aſcenſion.

*Florence, May 11.* On the 2d Inſtant the Hereditary Prince of Anſpach, after ſeeing the Curioſities of this Place, ſet out from hence for Bologna. On the 7th there was an Aſſembly of the Knights of the Order of St. Stephen, both ſecular and Eccleſiaſticks, when the Emperor's Pleaſure was ſignified to them, that for the Future they ſhould wear the Habit of the Order in all publick Functions. On the 8th a Battallion of the Lorrain Regiment of Foot Guards arrived here from Leghorn. We are informed by our laſt Advices from Toulon, that four French Gallies are already equipped in that Port, to embark her Royal Highneſs the Dutcheſs of Parma, on her Return to Lombardy.

*Leghorn, May 12.* The laſt Advices received here from Corſica inform us, that the Chiefs of the Malecontents of that Iſland have ſecured five Perſons who were deputed to wait on them with ſome Overtures for an Accommodation with the Genoefe.

*Rome, May 14.* The Departure of the Court for Caſtel-Gandolfo, is fixed for the 1ſt of next Month. The Abbe Count Clati, agreeable to the Commiſſions he has received from the Pope, is preparing to ſet out for Germany, to carry the new Prince of Saltzbourg, the Archepiſcopal Pallum, which the See of Rome ſends to every new elected Archbiſhop of that Principality. On the 1ſt Inſtant, M. de Calignac had an Audience of Leave of the Pope, and on Saturday laſt he ſet out on his Return to France. We learn from Forli, a Town in the Romagna, that a violent Shock of an Earthquake was lately felt there, and in that Neighbourhood, but that the ſame happily went off without doing any conſiderable Damage.

*Stockholm, May 17.* On Monday laſt, being the King's Birth-day, who then entred into the 44th Year of his Age, the ſame was celebrated at Court with great Solemnity. His Maſteſty has ordered the Garrifons in Swediſh Pomerania to be augmented with about 1200 Men. Two Battallions are ordered to be transported to Finland, in order to be employed at the Fortifications.

*Vienna, May 19.* Their Imperial Maſteſties Departure for the Camp at Kitſee in Hungary, remains fixt for the 4th of next Month; after which they propoſe going to review the Body of Artillery that is to be drawn together for that Purpoſe at Teyn upon the Moldau.

*Copenhagen, May 21.* The Directors of our Eaſt-India Company have received Advice, that one of their Ships, named the Princeſs Wilhelmine-Caroline, arrived ſafe at the Cape of Good Hope on the 28th of January laſt; and that ſome Days after two of our Men of War, named the Nettelblad and Bornholm, alſo arrived there from Tranquebar; ſo that an Account of their Arrival in ſome of the Ports of this Kingdom, is ſhortly expected.

*Hambourg, May 25.* The Deputies, whom the Regency of this City ſent to Vienna, to thank their Imperial Maſteſties for their good Offices in procuring the Re-eſtabliſhment of our Commerce with Spain, are expected back this Week. The Chamberlain Count Cheuſſes, the new Daniſh Miniſter Plenipotentiary to the States General, arrived here laſt Night, and this Morning continued his Journey for the Hague.

*Bruffels, May 26.* This Morning Prince Charles of Lorrain, our Governor General, ſet out from hence with a numerous Retinue for Vienna. The ſame Day the Prince of Tour Taxis, the Emperor's principal Commiſſary to the Diet of Ratiſbon, arrived here with the Princeſs his Spouſe.

*Cologn, May 28.* Laſt Saturday. Prince Charles of Lorrain arrived here about Six in the Afternoon, and was ſaluted at his Entrance by a general Diſcharge of the Artillery upon our Ramparts; and having changed Relays, his Highneſs continued his Route for Warth, where he intended to lay that Night: Yeſterday 'twas expected he would reach Dettingen, and this Night Langenfeld, from whence he propoſed to reach Schonbron in three Days and an half.

*Hague, May 31.* The States of Holland and Weſtfrizeland, who aſſembled Yeſterday, have this Morning continued their Deliberations. Baron d'Aylva, lately appointed one of the Deputies to the Aſſembly of the States General, on the Part of the Province of Frizeland, has taken his Seat in that Aſſembly, having been introduced by Baron Burmania. Count Cheuſſes, who is coming hither to replace the late Count Dehn as Envoy Extraordinary and Miniſter Plenipotentiary from the King of Denmark, is expected here ſome Day next Week, the neceſſary Paſſports for his Equipage having been already ſent away.
