Lisbon, May 19.

THE King has appointed Don Joseph Gaetan de Soto-major to be Governor of the Isle of St. Thomas, and Don Joseph Manuel de Melo of that of Sta. Catherina.

Naples, June 5. Wednesday last being the King of Spain's Birth-day, and also of the third Son of the King our Sovereign; there was a grand Appearance at Court of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers to compliment his Majesty on that Occasion. By our last Advices from Algiers, Tunis and Tripoli, Preparations were making there for sending out several armed Vessels on a Cruize.

Madrid, June 8. His Majesty has appointed the Marquis de Campo Fuerte, Captain General of the Kingdom of Estramadura, to be a Member of the Council of War, and Don Pedro Giron d'Ahumada to be Intendant of Segovia.

Mantua, June 11. The Duke and Dutches of Wirtemberg arrived here last Wednesday from Milan, and the following Day continued their Journey. M. Colombo, Resident from the Republick of Venice to the Court of Turin, is on his Return Home, and will be succeeded by M. Gobbi.

Stockholm, June 14. The Queen advances happily in her Pregnancy. Several Regiments of Horse and Foot are ordered to assemble in the Neighbourhood of this Capital, in order to be reviewed by his Majesty.

Copenhagen, June 16. The Troops, which are encamped in the Neighbourhood of the Castle of Fredericksberg, are daily exercised in the Military Performances usual in Time of War, and last Wednesday they were all review'd by his Majesty. Prince Frederick Francis of Brunswick Wolfembuttel, the Queen's Brother, and Colonel of a Regiment of Foot in the Prussian Service, arrived here on Tuesday Morning from Berlin, and waited the same Day on their Majesties at Fredericksberg, and was graciously received; and it is said, his Highness is

to remain there till towards the End of this Month.

Ratisbon, June 17. Baron de Widmann, their Imperial Majesties Minister to the Elector of Bavaria, arrived here last Sunday Evening from Munich; and on Friday he continued his Journey for Carlsbad.

Berlin, June 19. The King has appointed M. Conradi, who lately commanded Margrave Henry's Regiment, a Counsellor of the Regency for Wesel. The Command of the Regiment of Bork has been given to M. Bornstedt, Lieutenant-Colonel of Bonin's Regiment of Foot; M. Vierech, Counsellor of Legation, set out some Days ago for Ratisbon, where he is to assist M. Polman in his Functions of Minister to the Diet.

Hanover, June 19. Don Joseph de Sylva-Passanha, late Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Portugal to the States-General of the United Provinces, who arrived here some Days ago, is soon to set out for Vienna to execute a particular Commission, and afterwards is to proceed to his Post at Naples.

Dusseldorp, June 21. In the Beginning of last Week, five Barges came down the Rhine loaden with Passengers from Suaben and Wirtemberg, for Holland, where they intend to embark for Nova Scotia and other British Settlements in America.

Verfailles, June 22. The King has appointed the Prince of Conde, Steward of his Majesty's Household; and that Prince has accordingly taken the usual Oath. His Majesty has granted the Marechall de Maillebois's Request of Resigning his Government of Douay, in Favour of his Son Count Maillebois, who is Lieutenant General and Master of the King's Wardrobe.

Paris, June 22. The King has nominated Baron Zuchtmantel to be his Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to the Elector Palatine, in the Room of Count Tilly. The Pope's Nuncio Extraordinary, Signior Branciforte, made his publick Entry here on the 17th of this Instant, and went Yesterday in State to Verfailles, where

he had his first publick Audience of the King, with all the usual Ceremonies on such Occasions.

Rotterdam, June 26. We hear from Bergen-op-Zoom, that Lord Drumlarig's Regiment, which had been garrisoned there for some Time, left that Place on the 21st of this Instant, in order to march for Ypres, one of the Places of our Barrier.

Hague, June 26. On Sunday next the Court will go out of Mourning for the late Prince Maximilian of Hesse Cassel.

Hague, June 28. The States of Holland and West-Friesland have this Day resumed their Deliberations. The Deputies who have been in Dutch Flanders to make the usual Changes of the Magistrates are return'd hither, and have made a Report of their Proceedings to the Council of State. Baron Schwartzenberg, Governour of Namur, is arrived here from his Government; and the Barons Boetzalaer and Burmania are preparing to set out for Maestricht, in order to visit the Fortifications and Magazines of that Place.

Kensington, July 1.

Prince San Severino Albertini, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of the Two Sicilies, had this Day his first private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke.

And also his first private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Amelia; to both which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knight, Master of the Ceremonies.
