Constantinople, August 1.

THE Country about Bagdat having been a long Time infested by a large Body of Courds, Inhabitants of the Mountains; who reign'd sovereignly, and could not be drove out of their strong Holds; Solyman Pascha of Bagdat invested their Mountains, destroyed 10 or 12000 of them, and sent 350 Heads of their Chiefs to the Grand Seignor; which has been thought so essential a Service, that Castans are sent to him from hence, and to several of the principal Officers concerned in that Expedition.

Lisbon, Aug. 2. The Princess of Beira, according to the Accounts of her Royal Highness's Physicians, is entirely out of Danger. Don Paulo Josepho Correa, Gentleman of the King's Household, and Fiscal of the Royal Treasure, died some Days ago at Caparica, in the 56th Year of his Age.

Leghorn, Aug. 10. There are Advices by a Felucca which arrived here last Week from Algiers, that the Corsairs of that Place had brought in there a French Vessel, which they had taken under Pretence of some Deficiency in its Passports. They write from Tunis, that the Bey of that Place continued his Severity against those of his Subjects who were engaged in the late Rebellion of his Son; and that there hardly passed a Day without some of them suffering for it.

Vienna, Aug. 19. Amongst the late Military Promotions made here, the Baron Medayanfky, Colonel Commandant of the Regiment of Foot of Forgatsch, has been raised to the Rank of Major General.

Dresden, Aug. 20. Amongst other Military Promotions which the King has been pleased to make within these few Days, Lieutenant General Baron de Wolfsberg has been promoted to the Rank of General of Horse; and M. de Horst, Colonel of the Swiss Guards, to that of Major General of Foot. Baron de Sack, who has been nominated his Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary at the Court of Sweden, set out last Monday on his Journey thither.

Dusseldorp, Aug. 26. We are informed that Count Wartensleben, Minister from the States General of the United Provinces, to several Princes and States of the Empire, who has resided for some Time at Bonn, has made Preparations for his leaving that Place, in order to make a Tour to the Court of Manheim.
