*Florence, October 20.*

**C**OUNT Richecourt, President of the Council of this Regency, is returned here from his late Tour to Pisa; and on Monday, being the Feast of S<sup>t</sup>a. Theresia, her Imperial Majesty's Name-day, his Excellency gave a grand Entertainment, and afterwards a Ball, to a great Number of Persons of Distinction of both Sexes. 'Tis said another Reform in our Troops will soon take Place, and that all the Military Force, allowed for the Protection and Defence of this Grand Dutchy, will then consist only of three Regiments of Foot, and one of Dragoons.

*Strasbourg, Oct. 26.* Baron Wensen, heretofore Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark to the Court of Spain, and who, on his Return from Copenhagen to Madrid, was obliged to stop at Lyons, on Account of an Indisposition with which he was suddenly seized, arrived here last Week, greatly recovered; he has since continued his Journey for Copenhagen, by the Way of Cassel. The Marquess de Argenson, the new Lieutenant General of this Province, who has been here for about three Weeks, is also set out on his Return to Paris. A most magnificent Monument is erecting, in the Lutheran Church of St. Thomas, in order to perpetuate the Memory of the late Marshal Count Saxe. The Swiss Regiment of Lochmann, consisting of three Battalions, passed through this City on Thursday last, on their March for Landau, where they are to rest in Garrison. We learn from Emichsburg, in the Lower Palatinate, that the Countess de Linnage-Dachsberg was safely delivered of a Daughter, who had been christened by the Name of Elizabeth-Christine-Marienne.

*Cassel, Oct. 29.* The Hereditary Prince of Anspach, who has been for some Time past at

the Courts of Berlin and Brunswick, arrived here on Wednesday Night last.

*Dusseldorp, Nov. 6.* A Resolution having been taken at Court, to change the Situations of the several Regiments garrisoned in this Dutchy and that of Juliers, Orders are given for providing the necessary Provisions and Carriages for that Purpose.

*Whitehall, November 17.*

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Humphry Bland, Esq; Lieutenant-General of his Majesty's Forces, to be Commander of all and singular the Land Forces employed, or to be employed, in his Majesty's Service, in that Part of the Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, and also of the Castles, Forts, and Barracks there, in the room of George Churchill, Esq; deceased.

*Dublin, November 11.*

Yesterday being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Birth Day, the Great Guns were fired in his Majesty's Park the Phoenix, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks; in the Evening a Play was given by his Grace the Lord Lieutenant for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy. The Birth Day happening on Saturday, the Ball at the Castle, and the Supper, are defer'd until Monday.
