*Moscow, March 7.*

THEY have actually begun to make Preparations for the Return of the Court to Petersbourg in the Month of May next. Last Saturday a Council was held at the Palace, at which her Imperial Majesty assisted; and the same Evening a Courier was dispatched for Petersbourg, with Orders for the Admiralty to cause all the Men of War and Frigats in that Port, as also those in the Port of Cronstadt, to be equipped with all Diligence, in order to form a Squadron which is to cruize this Summer in the Baltick, as they did last Year. The Court has likewise sent Orders for a considerable Body of irregular Troops in the Ukraine, to march forthwith towards the Frontiers of Lithuania, where several Regiments of regular Troops are ordered to assemble. These Precautions, 'tis said, are taken in Consequence of the Preparations that have been for some Time making by a certain Power, on the Frontiers of the Dutchy of Courland, where Provisions, Warlike Stores, Pontoons, and a considerable Train of Artillery are got together, but with what View, no one can as yet form any real Judgment. The Merchants of this City have, in Consideration of the Empress's abolishing the Custom-houses in the interior Parts of the Empire, made the Great Duke and Great Dutches a Present of 30,000 Rubles. They have likewise agreed to present the Senator Count Schuwallow, by whose Interest they in a great Measure obtained that Abolition, with the Sum of 20,000 Rubles, one Half of which is to be laid out in a magnificent Cross of the Order of St. Andrew, and the other to be paid him in Specie.

*Naples, March 12.* Last Week a Courier arrived here from Versailles, and a grand Council has since been held at Caserta, to consider of his Dispatches, but nothing of Consequence transpires. The Archiepiscopal Palace in this City is fitting up for the Reception of our new Archbishop, who is expected here towards the End of the Month. They are buying up, not only in this City and its Neighbourhood, but likewise in several other Parts of the Kingdom, great Quantities of Corn for the Use of the Spaniards, who are in want of that Commodity. Almost all our armed Vessels and Gallies are now cruizing in the Seas of the Romagna, and all along the Coast, but we do not as yet hear of their having taken any Prize. The

King has appointed M. Antinori, Bishop of Lanciano, to be Archbishop of Matera, and he is preparing to set out in order to take Possession of that Benefice.

*Rome, March 16.* Last Saturday a long Conference was held at Cardinal Valenti's, Secretary of State, to consider of proper Measures to revive the Commerce of the Ecclesiastical State, which has declined very much for some Time past. On Wednesday Cardinal Mellini, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Empress Queen of Hungary, had an Audience of the Pope, on the Subject of some Dispatches he received from Vienna. The Frigat that the Government bought lately at Leghorn, is sent to Malta, to be armed and equipped, after which she is ordered to cruize in the Seas of the Romagna, against the Barbary Pyrates. 'Tis said the Duties on Tobacco are going to be taken off, and that a Scheme is preparing for making good the Deficiency by a Kind of Capitation Tax. The Reason that is given for this Alteration is, the great Trouble and Expence the Government is at to prevent the Smuggling of Tobacco, which is carried to such a Height, that the Finances have suffered very much of late on that Account.

*Madrid, March 25.* His Catholick Majesty, who was last Week a good deal indisposed with a Cold, is now perfectly recovered. On the 11th of this Month an Express arrived from Lisbon, with an Account, that the Dragon Man of War, after having several Times been in Danger of being lost, had at length been obliged, by contrary Winds, to put into that Port. Upon the Receipt of this News, Orders were sent from hence for her to proceed to Cadiz with the utmost Expedition, under the Convoy of two Men of War, which were immediately dispatched to Lisbon for that Purpose. It is said, that this Ship brings above seven Millions of Dollars in Specie. Last Week a new Man of War, called the Aquilon, was launched at Ferrol.

*Hague, April 9.* The States of Holland and Westfrizeland, who opened their Assembly last Thursday, have this Day renewed their Deliberations. The Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty continue also to deliberate on the Affairs of their Department. A Deputation from the Province of Utrecht is arrived here, in order to execute a private Commission, and they have already had an Audience, for that Purpose, of her Royal Highness the Prince Governorant.

Governante. This Morning Prince William of Hesse Philipsthall took the usual Oaths, before the Council of State, to qualify himself for the Post of Major of the Regiment of Horse of Birkenfeld, and Captain in the said Regiment. M. Thilenus, Secretary of the Chamber of Accompts of this Province, died here Yesterday Morning. We hear from Ter Veere, that M. Huyssen, Counsellor of the Magistracy, and ancient Burgomaster of that Town, died there a few Days ago. They write from Tournay, that the Regiment of General Lillers marched from thence on Thursday last for Ypres, from whence the Regiment of Baden is to march on the 24th Instant for Maestricht, where it is to stay in Garrison.

This Day M. de Rosenkrantz, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, had a private Audience of Leave of his Majesty; to which he was introduced, in the Absence of the Earl of Holderness, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the Earl of Hyndford, Lord of the Bedchamber in Waiting, and conducted by Sir Clement-Cottrell Dorner, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingbourne, by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short-Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them, who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, either Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing therof do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverers, as Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
