

Vienna, April 13. General Engellshoffen, Commander in Chief of the Troops in the Bannat of Tameswaer, who arrived here some Time since, set out on the 2d Instant, on his Return to his Post. The Prince Bishop of Bamberg having appointed Baron Horneck to receive, from the Hands of the Emperor, the Investiture of the Temporalities of his Bishoprick, he is preparing rich Liveries, in order to acquit himself of that Commission with the greater Magnificence. Their Imperial Majesties have already declared their Intention of viewing the Camp that is to be formed this Summer in the Neighbourhood of Prague.

Dresden, April 14. We are assured that the King intends to set out in the Beginning of June next for Poland, and that he will be accompanied in that Journey by the Princes Xavier and Charles.

Berlin, April 16. The Distemper amongst the horned Cattle continuing to rage very much in the Old Marche, they have renewed the Orders against driving them into any other Provinces of his Prussian Majesty's Dominions.

Utrecht, April 20. The States of this Province have named a Deputation from the three different Orders of the People, with the Baron Viscontii, Secretary of State, at their Head, to wait on her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, on Affairs of Importance; and this Deputation will accordingly set out in a few Days for the Hague, in order to execute their Commission.

Brussels, April 21. We are informed by an Express from Vienna, that her Imperial Majesty has appointed the young Count Lannoy, Prince d'Ayseau, Baron Gottignies, Count Loos, Count Calenberg, and Baron Boland, to be Chamberlains to his Highness Prince Charles of Lorraine, our Governor General. We have received Advice, that the Regiment of Foot of Randwyk, in the Dutch Service, marched last Monday from Ypres for Holland; and that the first Battalion of the Swiss Regiment of Sturler, marched from Dendermond the same Day for Namure, where it is ordered into Garrison.

Hague, April 23. Yesterday there was an extraordinary Drawing-Room at Court, at which were present great Numbers of Persons of both Sexes, and of the first Distinction. Last Night died here M. Leebergh, ancient Burgo-master and Counsellor of the Regency of Gouda, &c.
