**I**T being his Majesty's Royal Intention, That the Parliament, which is summon'd to meet on Friday the 31st of this Instant (May) should then meet, and sit; The King has been pleased to direct a Commission to pass the Great Seal, appointing, and authorising His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, Thomas Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and other Lords, to open, and hold, the said Parliament, on the said 31st Day of this Instant (May,) being the Day of the Return of the Writs of Summons.

*Extract of a Letter from Major Stringer Lawrence to the Court of Directors of the East-India Company, dated at the Camp near Trichenopoly, the 15th of Sept. 1753, (which it is supposed should be the 25th of Sept.) received by the Delawar, the 7th of May 1754.*

**SINCE** my Letter of the 14th Instant, Capt. Ridge joined me with a Detachment of above 200 Europeans. This Addition of Force made me resolve to attack the Enemy, as the Monsoon approached, and their Situation was such, that they cut off our Provisions, which must have ended in the Loss of Trichenopoly: Accordingly, on the 19th, I made a Motion in the Night towards the Left of the Enemy's Camp, for they had Possession of two large Rocks, about a Mile distant from each other, and I found it necessary to gain one of them. The whole Day of the 20th was spent in Cannonading; and the better to conceal our Design, I had order'd out an 18 Pounder from the Fort, that they might think we had no other View than that of disturbing them in their Camp with our Shot. This lulled them into a Security, and at Four o'Clock in the Morning of the 21st, our Europeans being disposed in three Lines, with the Seapoys on our Flanks, and the Horse in our Rear, we attacked the Rock on the Left, called the Golden Rock, and gained it without any Loss, the Enemy retiring after a faint Resistance, and leaving behind them two Pieces of Cannon. This Earnest of Success, encouraged the Men greatly, and determined me to push on to the main Body; so, that no Time might be lost, I disabled the two Guns, and advanced towards the Sugar-Loaf Rock, just as the Day began to break. The Enemy were drawn up close to the Rock, and had fortified themselves with Breastworks, so it was necessary to gain their Black Camp, that we might fall upon them in the Rear: This was effected with little Trouble, and our Soldiers marched thro' a constant Fire from nine Pieces of Cannon, attacked a Line of Men, which greatly outnumber'd themselves, and in

their Lines. They however rallied, and made some faint Resistance afterwards, supported by the Morattas, who rode up very desperately; But as these could not sustain a galling Fire, which fell upon them from all Quarters, they at length run away, and left us compleat Masters of the Field of Battle, their whole Camp, Baggage, and Ammunition, and ten Pieces of Cannon. The Remains of their Army retreated, some towards Altoora and Syringham, some towards Tondamons's Country, and some towards Tanjour. The Polligars and Seapoys bring in Prisoners every Minute. The Action lasted near two Hours. We took eight Officers, and 100 Soldiers, besides the Killed, which might be about 60 more. The Morattas saved the rest, and prevented a Pursuit, as they were vastly superior to Monage, our Tanjour Friend, in Numbers. On our Part, we had six Officers wounded, and several Men killed and wounded, as you will see by the inclosed Return. I received a slight Wound in the Arm with a Musket Ball; but I thank God it does not prevent me from keeping the Field, and continuing to do my Duty.

*His Majesty having been graciously pleased, by Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Mr. Charles Fdarne, at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. *Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingbourne, by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.*

*Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.*

*This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.*
