Naples, June 11.

THE St. Charles Man of War, and another Ship lately equipped in this Port, put to Sea this Day, in order to join the Chebecks under the Command of Captain Martinez, who is out on a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates. The King has disposed of the rich Abby of La Maggiore in Favour of M. Braniforte, the Pope's Nuncio at the Court of Venice. They write from Barletta, that sixty more Recruits arrived there last Week for the new Battallion of the Regiment of Royal Macedonia. We are informed by the Master of a Felucca who arrived here on Thursday last from the Coast of Sicily, that, on the 26th of last Month, a Shock of an Earthquake was felt at Messina, and in its Neighbourhood, but that it happily went off without doing any considerable Damage.

Rome, June 17. The Pope has caused a Bull to be issued, authorizing his Catholick Majesty to demand four Months Revenue of all the Ecclesiastical Benefices throughout his Dominions, as well in Europe, as in America, in order to defray the Expence of the great Armaments that are preparing in the different Ports of Spain against the Corsairs of Africa. In the Night between the 7th and 8th Instant, a Shock of an Earthquake was felt here; it lasted about half a Minute, and did no other Damage than throwing down the Chimneys of some old Houses. But at Vellattri, Frescati, Marino, Albano, and Castel Gandolfo, the Shock was more severe, so that many of the Inhabitants, through Fear, quitted their Houses lest they should be buried under their Ruins; however the Damage they received on this Occasion does not appear so considerable as was at first apprehended.

Genoa, June 18. Last Tuesday the Great Council met to chuse a Doge, when the Election fell almost unanimously on John-James-Veneroso, who thereupon received the Compliments of all the Orders of this Republick the same Day. The present Exigencies have occasioned the Republick to lay an additional Duty upon Wine, which is paid by the Inhabitants without Reluctance.

Vienna, June 22. Her Imperial Majesty is so well recovered of her late lying-in, that she proposes to appear in Publick next Saturday. We are assured, that before the Departure of the Court for Bohemia, the Archbishop Prince of Saltzbourg's Commissaries will receive, from the Hands of the Emperor, the Investiture of the Temporalities of his Archbishoprick. Baron Schertzer, Lieutenant Field Marshal of the Imperial Forces, Governor of the Fortrefs of Carlstadt in Croatia, and Commander in Chief of the Troops in that Province, died there some Days ago, after a short Illness. By his Death the Command of the late Duke of Ahrenberg's Regiment of Foot, which the Empress some Time since conferred on him, as also the Command of a Regiment of Croats, are become vacant.

Manheim, June 30. The Elector our Sovereign, and the Prince of Deux Ponts, intend to set out next Wednesday for Slangenbad, where they propose to spend about eight or ten Days. They design taking their Route by Mentz, in order to pay a Visit to the Elector of that Name. Their Highnesses will be accompanied in this Tour by the Barons Wachten-donck and Wreden, and attended by a numerous Retinue.

Brussels, July 1. On Friday last a grand Council was held at Court, at which Prince Charles of Lorraine, Governor General of these Countries, assisted, having come from Ter Vuren for that Purpose. We are assured, that the Princess Charlotte of Lorraine will come here from Vienna in the Month of September next.

Hague, July 4. We are informed by our last Dispatches from Friseland, that her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, with the young Prince Stadtholder, and his Sister, intend setting out from Oranje-Woud To-morrow on a Tour to Leuwaerden. Count Bentinck, who has been into Germany on private Affairs, is expected back from thence To-day or To-morrow.

Whitehall, July 13.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Matthew Hiccox, Esq; to be His Majesty's Agent and Consul General in the Islands of Madeiras.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was; between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed; at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
