Naples, September 10.

THEIR Majesties Departure for Caserta is fixed for the End of this Week. On Tuesday last a Frigate of 16 Guns was launched in this Port, and named *Amelia*, in honour to the Queen, who bears that Name. We hear from Capaccio, that the Bishop of that Diocese has been lately murdered by one of his own Servants, whose Conduct he had censured; and though the greatest Diligence had been used to apprehend the Villain, he had found Means to escape.

Genoa, Sept. 14. On Sunday last two of the King of Sardinia's Gallies, which have been for some Time past on a Cruize in the Seas of Sardinia, passed by this Place on their Return to Villafrancha, where they are to be laid up. We are informed by the Master of one of our Pinks that arrived here a few Days ago from the Coast of Calabria, that he fell in with four Neapolitan Chebecks, off Cape Spartivento, cruizing against the Barbary Pyrates.

Milan, Sept. 19. An Ordonnance is published here, forbidding all Merchants, Traders and Artificers whatsoever, to depart this Dutchy with their Families, in order to settle elsewhere, on Pain of being sent to the Gallies, and even punished with Death in some particular Cases. The said Ordonnance also contains a free Pardon to all those who have left this Country, for ten Years past, without the Consent of the Government, provided they return Home with all convenient Speed; and all who refuse to comply therewith, will be severely punished whenever they happen to fall into the Hands of Justice in this Country.

Grenoble, Sept. 20. On the 9th Instant, between Seven and Eight o'Clock in the Evening, a Shock of an Earthquake was felt at Thein, a small Town situate some Leagues from hence, accompanied with a Noise like that of Thunder; which Shock was so violent, as greatly to alarm the Inhabitants, and throw

down several Chimnies, but happily no Lives were lost.

Vienna, Sept. 21. Their Imperial Majesties are expected at Schonbrun next Thursday. The Empress Queen having declared some Time ago, that all her Protestant Subjects, who were desirous of removing from any Part of her Dominions to Transilvania, should have the free Exercise of their Religion, great Numbers of Persons are, in Consequence thereof, gone thither, not only from Upper Austria, but from several other of the Hereditary Countries.

Madrid, Sept. 25. Monday the 23^d of this Month being the King's Birth day, the same was celebrated at Court with the usual Magnificence. His Catholick Majesty was pleased that Morning to Knight, and to invest (in the Name of the King of Great Britain) his Excellency, Sir Benjamin Keene, with the Ensigns of the Order of the Bath. The same Day M. de Sada, late Ambassador at Turin, was appointed Viceroy of Navarre; and the Count de Torrepalma was named Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of Vienna, in the Room of M. de Aflor. By Letters from Cadiz we are informed, that five Ships of the French Squadron were returned into that Bay; and that the *Nueva Espana*, from Vera Cruz, the *St. Antonio* from the Caraccas, the *Pearl* from the Havana, and an *Aviso* from Carthagena, arrived there on the 11th Instant.

Hague, Oct. 3. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland have this Day continued their Deliberations. Yesterday Count Viry, the Sardinian Envoy Extraordinary, had his Audience of Leave of the President of the States General, and received the usual Presents; and this Morning Count Lascaris, his Successor, delivered his Credential Letters to the said President. We are informed by our last Dispatches from Soestdyk, that her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and her Family, continue there in perfect Health, and that it was thought she intended to stay there till towards the End of this Month.

Navy-Office, October 4, 1754.

The Right Hon. the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having appointed Money for paying Half Pay to Sea Officers, from the 1st of January 1754, to the 30th of June following, according to his Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf;

These are to give Notice, that the said Payment will begin to be made at the Treasurer of the Navy's Office in Broad Street, on Monday the 21st Instant, at Nine of the Clock in the Morning, and continued the two following Days, beginning at the same Hour; That all Persons may then and there attend to receive what may become payable unto them, and not only bring with them the Affidavit required touching their not having enjoyed the Benefit of any publick Employment, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they are to be paid the said Half Pay, but also produce Certificates that they have subscribed to the Test, and taken the Oaths required by Act of Parliament to his present Majesty. And in Case any of the said Sea Officers shall not be able to attend themselves to receive their Money, but employ Attorneys for that Purpose, that the said Attorneys may produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Persons they are employed by.

General Post Office, March 2, 1754.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
