Kensington, October 17.

THIS Day Signior Zon, Resident from Venice, had his first private Audience of Her Royal Highness the Princess Amelia; to which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Lord Chamberlain's Office, October 18.

The Court goes out of Mourning on Tuesday next, for that Day, it being His Majesty's Coronation Day.

Lisbon, Sept. 3. His Majesty's Ship the Notre Dame de Pieté, and the Notre Dame d'Attalaya, are arrived at the Mouth of the Tagus, in about ten Weeks, from Rio de Janeiro. We have received Advice from Elvas, that Don Francis d'Azevedo, Governor of that City, died there, a few Days ago, in the 96th Year of his Age.

Barcelona, Sept. 15. The Squadron commanded by Don Alvarez Cabrero, which put in here some Time ago to refit, failed again last Sunday, and the next Day came up with an Algerine Corsair of 22 Guns, which they took after a smart Engagement. She sailed from Algiers the 30th of last Month, with Provisions on board for a Cruize of forty Days; and her Crew consisted of 80 Men, 21 of whom were killed in the Action.

Petersbourg, Sept. 16. A Man of War and three Frigats will soon be launched here. The Empress has ordered the Body of Troops, who have been for some Time assembled on the Frontiers of Livonia, to separate, and march into Winter Quarters.

Naples, Sept. 17. The King having been informed, that a Quarry of White Marble has been discovered in the Province of Basilicate, of the same Quality with that in the Neighbourhood of Massa Carrara, has ordered the Sieur Vanvitelli, Architect to the Court, to go and examine into it. His Majesty has caused an Edict to be published, strictly forbidding the Exportation of Corn or Cattle out of this Kingdom, under very severe Penalties.

Leghorn, Sept. 18. We hear from Corsica, that the Malecontents, finding themselves unable to besiege Bastia, have retired to the Mountains, from whence they are continually sending small Parties to plunder the Houses of all such as adhere to the Genoese Government.

Genoa, Sept. 21. The Marquess Doria, the new Commissary General in Corsica, having requested a farther Reinforcement of Troops, the Government have ordered three Companies of 100 Men each, exclusive of Officers, to be immediately sent thither, and the Embarkation began accordingly last Monday Morning. We are informed by the Master of one of our Pinks that arrived here a few Days ago from Palermo, that some Algerines, being on a Cruize on the Southern Coast of Sicily, had made a Descent, and carried off seven or eight Persons, and several Head of Cattle.

Rome, Sept. 21. M. de la Bruyere, who, since the Departure of the Duke de Nivernois, was charged with the Affairs of the Crown of France at this Court, died here on Wednesday last of the Small Pox, which Distemper has made great Havock in this City for some Time past.

Milan, Sept. 25. The Establishment of the new Farm of Tobacco continues to create great Uneasiness amongst the People; and may, if not prevented, produce some fatal Disturbance in the State. The Duke Administrator is come to a Resolution to enclose the great Forest between Castelletto and Abbiate-Grasso, and to stock the same with Deer.

Stockholm, Sept. 28. Their Majesties, who reached Drottningholm on the 20th Instant, from their late Tour into Scania, are expected hear from thence next Monday. The Men of War and other Ships building in several of the Ports of this Kingdom, for the Service of the Crowns of France and Spain, are, for the most Part, near finished, and 'tis imagined will put to Sea some Time next Month for Brest and Ferrol.

Copenhagen, Sept. 28. Last Thursday their Majesties came to their Palace in this City for the Winter. The King has ordered four Frigats to be equipped, two of which 'tis said are intended

intended to be sent to the East Indies. The Lutheran Families established in Walachia, having obtained the Grand Seignior's Permission to build them a Church for the publick Exercise of Religion, have sent Deputies here to collect Money for carrying on the same.

Vienna, Sept. 28. On Thursday last their Imperial Majesties arrived at Schonbrun from Hollitsch, with the Archduke, and the rest of the Imperial Family. It is computed there have failed down the Danube, in the Course of this Month, upwards of four hundred Families, going from Upper Austria and Swabia, to settle in Transylvania, where they enjoy the free Exercise of Religion. We have received Advice, that Count Damnitz, who, in the last Promotion of General Officers, was raised to the Rank of Field Marshal of her Imperial Majesty's Armies, died at St. Polten, in Lower Austria, on the 21st Instant.

Frankfort, Sept. 30. The Prince Bishop of Augsbourg, who, in his Return from Brussels, took the Route of Schwetzingen, in order to visit the Elector Palatin, arrived here last Night, and set out this Morning on his Return Home.

Leipsick, Oct. 1. The Fair this Year is very brilliant, the Number of Foreign Merchants, and Persons of Distinction, that are already arrived, being equal to those of any preceeding Year.

Berlin, Oct. 1. The King has raised Mess. Kleist, Blankensee, Retzow, Hulsen and Manstein, to the Rank of Majors General of Foot. Lieutenant General Mollendorff, having obtained Leave to quit the Service, his Majesty has given his Regiment of Dragoons to Count Finkenstein, on whom he has also conferred the Rank of Major General.

Mans, Oct. 3. The States of the Province of Hainault, who have assembled here for some Days past, having finished their Deliberations, the Duke d'Ahrenberg, their President, is returned to Brussels. We continue to make Preparations for the Reception of the Princess Charlotte of Lorrain, who is expected here towards the End of next Month.

Dusseldorp, Oct. 3. Count Harscamp, late Governor of this City, being dismissed from that Employment, his Electoral Highness has disposed of the same in Favour of Lieutenant General Count Bronkhorst-Styrum, who has accordingly taken Possession thereof.

Hague, Oct. 10. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland are separated till a new Convocation. We learn by our last Dispatches from Soestdyk, that her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and her Family, continue there in perfect Health, and that her Royal Highness proposes to leave that Place next Monday on her Return here. We have received an Account from Middlebourg, of the Death of M. Veth, Counsellor of the Magistracy of that City.
