Rome, November 30.

SEVERAL Expresses have arrived here from France within this Month past, with Dispatches relating to the Ecclesiastical Affairs of that Kingdom. Those brought by the last Courier were of great Importance, and occasioned the holding an extraordinary Congregation, at which the Pope and most of the Members of the sacred College assisted. The Result of this Meeting is kept secret, but we hear the Pope has since caused a Courier to be dispatched to M. Gualtieri, his Nuncio at the Court of France, with fresh Instructions touching his Conduct in those Affairs. They have begun to repair the Port of Ancona, the Expence of which will be very considerable, but 'tis thought it will be one of the most commodious Ports in all Italy when finished.

Genoa, Nov. 30. The Ceremony of the Installation of the Noble John James Veneroso, in the Dignity of Doge of this Republick, was performed last Sunday with all imaginable Pomp and Magnificence. A most sumptuous Entertainment was prepared on this Occasion at the Ducal Palace, which was served up at different Tables, to upwards of 300 Persons of both Sexes. The last Dispatches received by the Government from the Marquess Doria, our Commissary General in the Island of Corsica, give the most pleasing Hopes that the Malecontents will at length submit to the Genoise Government. The Captain of an English Ship that arrived here a few Days ago from the Coast of Barbary, but last from Leghorn, assures us, that three Vessels, of a new Construction, carrying 20 Guns each, were equipping for the Sea at the Port of Sallee. The said Captain also assures us, that in passing the Island of Sardinia, he fell in with an Algerine Pink, conducting home a Neapolitan Vessel which she had taken in her Cruize. The last Letters received here from Spain inform us, that his Catholick Majesty has come to a Resolution to suppress the Register Ships, and to send only Galleons to the West-

Indies for the future, and that this Alteration is to take Place in the Year 1756.

Vienna, Dec. 7. On Wednesday last an Edict was published here, requiring all her Imperial Majesty's Subjects in Lower Austria, to deliver in an exact Account of their Revenues. On Sunday last the Abbe Ferrari, who is charged with the Affairs of the Genoese at this Court, waited on Count Colloredo, Vice Chancellor of the Empire, with a Letter from the Doge and Senate, in Relation to the Affairs of San-Remo and Campo-Freddo, but the Count excused himself by alledging, that as the Government of Genoa had refused to accept the Rescript or Memorial addressed to that Republick on the Part of the Aulick Council of the Empire, he could not receive any Letter on Behalf of the said Republick. Notwithstanding it is confidently asserted, that their Imperial Majesties intended Journey in the Spring to Trieste is put off to the Year 1756, they are still going on in repairing the Roads from hence to the Maritime Places. We are assured, that the Marriage of the young Count de Taxis, with the eldest Daughter of Count Welzeck, Counsellor of the Aulick Council, and that of Count Thun, with the young Countess de Fels, will be celebrated in a short Time.

Copenhagen, Dec. 11. The Chamberlain Count Wedel Frias, Envoy Extraordinary from this Court to that of Sweden, returned here last Tuesday from Stockholm, and has been introduced to the King, and met with a gracious Reception. As soon as this Lord has received his Instructions, he is to set out for Paris, where he is to reside in Quality of Ambassador from this Court. Major General Finecke having obtained the King's Leave to retire, his Majesty has given the Regiment of Horse of Fuhstien, of which he was Colonel, to M. Schulembourg, one of his Aids de Camp. The Queen Mary, one of the Ships belonging to our East India Company, which has been for some Time equipping for China, is now ready to put to Sea with the first fair Wind.
