Naples, Dec. 10. We flatter ourselves that the Difficulties which lately arose in Relation to the Accommodation of the Differences between this Court and the Order of Malta, are in some Measure removed; and the rather, as Permissi-

on is not only given by the King for the Masters of all Vessels belonging to Malta, to purchase Provisions in the Ports of the Two Sicilies; but his Majesty has likewise revoked the Decree that obliged the Knights of that Order, who have Commanderies in this Kingdom, to reside at such Commanderies upon Pain of Confiscation of the Revenues arising therefrom. For these five or six Days past, the Eruptions of Mount Vesuvius have been so very violent, from three different Places, as not only to alarm the adjacent Inhabitants, but even those of this City. The Time for the Marquess de Fogliani's taking Possession of his new Employment of Viceroy of Sicily, is not yet fixed. Advice having been received at Court, that the Barbary Corsairs appear again in great Numbers upon our Coasts, Orders are given for four armed Chebecks to put to Sea immediately in quest of those Pyrates. The Officers who were some Time ago sent to Dalmatia, in order to raise Men for the second Battallion of the Regiment of Royal Macedonia, will, by their Accounts, be able to compleat that Battallion in a very short Time.

Genoa, Dec. 16. Cardinal Tempis, the Pope's late Nuncio to the Court of Portugal, who arrived here the Beginning of this Month, set out from hence last Monday for Rome.

Rome, Dec. 16. On the 8th Instant, being the Anniversary of the Emperor's Birth-day, Cardinal Alexander Albani, Minister from his Imperial Majesty to the Holy See, received, on that Occasion, the Compliments of most of the Members of the Sacred College, and many other Persons of Distinction, to whom he afterwards gave a splendid Entertainment. Yesterday Cardinal Porto Carrero had a private Audience of the Pope, after which he dispatched a Courier for Madrid. Last Tuesday died here, greatly lamented, the Baron de Bruggen; he was Chamberlain to the Pope, and descended from

from one of the most noble and ancient Families in the Dutchy of Courland.

Milan, Dec. 17. The Emperor has erected the Town of Casal Maggiore, in the Cremonese, into a City, with all the Rights, Privileges and Prerogatives, usually enjoyed by other Cities in his Territories. A Fire broke out last Wednesday Night in the Palace of Count Pavis, but it was happily extinguished without spreading itself to any of the neighbouring Houses.

Stockholm, Dec. 17. On Sunday last a Jew was baptized in the Chapel of the new Palace, and named Adolphus, their Majesties standing Godfather and Godmother. Last Friday died here Count Frolich, President of the Tribunal of Justice, and Knight of the Order of the Sword.

Prague, Dec. 21. The raising of Recruits for the Imperial Horse goes on very successfully, upwards of 250 Men having been sent from hence, since the Beginning of this Month, for their respective Regiments quartered in this Kingdom.

Vienna, Dec. 21. Her Imperial Majesty is so well pleased with the Conduct of the Magistrates of this City, that instead of displacing them Yesterday, according to annual Custom, a Decree was issued for confirming them in their respective Offices for another Year. A Resolution having been taken for making divers Alterations in the Gardens of Schonbrun this Winter, upwards of 1000 Men are already employed in that Business.

Madrid, Dec. 23. Wednesday the 18th of this Month, being the Queen's Name-Day, there was a numerous and brilliant Appearance at Court, of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment their Majesties upon that Occasion; after which M. Wall, Secretary of State, gave a grand Dinner at his House in the Retiro; and at Night the Opera of Dido was performed in the Palace, at which their Majesties were present.
