**Petersbourg, Dec. 28.** On Tuesday last an Edict was published here, for preventing an Ordonnance, of the 29th of November last, relating to the Exportation of Russian Merchandize into Foreign Countries, being carried any farther into Execution, her Imperial Majesty declaring her Intention, that the Ordonnances relating thereto, shall remain on their ancient Footing. We have received an Account, by a Courier from Constantinople, of the Death of the Grand Signior, and that Osman his Brother, the Third of that Name, has been advanced to the Ottoman Throne. To-morrow, being the Birth-day of the Empress our Sovereign, the same will be celebrated with great Magnificence at the Winter-Palace; on which Occasion, it is said, her Imperial Majesty intends to make a numerous Promotion of Military Officers. The Great Chancellor Count Bestucheff, whose Illness confined him for a long Time, appeared at Court last Wednesday for the first Time since his Indisposition, and was received with great Affection by her Imperial Majesty.

**Stockholm, Jan. 7.** Their Majesties continue to enjoy perfect Health at the New Palace in this City, where they received the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, last Wednesday, being New Year's Day; and at Night there was a Ball in the Queen's Apartment. The King has caused an Advertisement to be published, at the Request of the Directors of the Bank of this City, offering a large Reward to such Persons as shall hereafter discover the Author or Authors of counterfeit Bank Notes or Bills of Exchange.

**Prague, Jan. 11.** On Sunday Night last we had as severe a Frost in this Country as has happened in the Memory of Man. As the Mills for grinding Corn in these Parts are worked by Water, and as the Rivers upon which they stand have been so full of Ice for these three Weeks past, as to prevent their working; most of the Country People, who only carry their Corn to be ground as they have Occasion for it, have been greatly distressed for Want of Bread. Last Thursday a Fire broke out in the Neighbourhood of the Convent of the Franciscans, but it was happily extinguished after burning down one House, and damaging two or three others. They are very successful in raising Recruits for the Imperial Cavalry, not only in this City and its Neighbourhood, but also in the different Circles of this Kingdom.

**Berlin, Jan. 17.** M. Geseke, an eminent Physician of this City, has began to introduce the Practice of Inoculation for the Small-Pox, in which he has hitherto proved very successful. We have received an Account from Wolfshagen, of the Death of Count Schwerin, in the 71st Year of his Age. He was one of his Majesty's Chamberlains, and Knight of the Teutonic Order, &c.

**Paris, Jan. 17.** We are informed, that the King has ordered a Lettre de Cachet to be dispatched to the Archbishop of Aix, commanding him to repair to a certain little Town in his Diocese, there to remain in Exile; but that his

Majesty has, at the same Time, sent Orders to the Parliament of Provence, to discontinue any further Proceedings against that Prelate.

**Hague, Jan. 23.** The States of this Province continue to-Day their Deliberations. The Baron d'Eerden, Deputy to the Assembly of their High Mightinesses, on the Part of the Province of Overysse, is arrived here from that Province.
