

marched into *Lorraine*, to take their Winter Quarters; that the Confederates have posted themselves in such manner, that *Brissach* is wholly blocked up, though with the assistance of the Imperialists at *Friburg*; Commanded by General *Schurz*, the Neutrality between that place and *Brissach* being broken off; The 4 instant Major-General *Dunneville* took the strong House of *Henningen* in *Suntzow*, in which Countrey the French possess at present only *Besfort* and *Lantzow*, which places the Confederates hope likewise to be very suddenly Masters of; The *Markgraef* of *Baden* being gone with the *Munster* Troops, and the Regiment of *Breyer*, to attack *Besfort*, and General *Yeshmiller* is marched for the same purpose towards *Lantzow*; the 6 instant 8000 Men, under the Command of the Duke of *Hofstein*, Lieutenant-General of the Elector of *Brandenburghs* Army, began their march towards *Burgundy*, where, with the assistance of the Inhabitants, they hope to do something considerable. The Duke of *Lorraine* is with his Troops on the Frontiers of *Lorraine*. From *Vicenza* they write, that the Ambassador of *Sweden* had in a late Conference with the Ministers of that Court, intimated the intention of the King his Master, to employ his Arms against the Elector of *Brandenburgh*.

Am la Chapelle, Dec. 11. The news we had of the Imperial Army being on its march this way, put us here in great disorder, we apprehending that some Regiments would have been put upon us, to quarter this Winter; to prevent which, our Magistrates immediately deputed some of their Body, to go to General *Sporke*, and to offer him a sum of Money; and we are told, they have succeeded in their Errand: On Saturday last, General *Sporke* had his Head Quarters at a place called *He-Vaels*, his Troops being all quartered within the Territory of this City; yesterday they marched again, and passed by this place, and this night General *Sporke* is lodged at *Ellermeuler*. We are told, that this Army, to ease the Countrey of *Fuliers*, will have its Head-Quarter at *Bon* this Winter, and not at *Dueren*, as was said.

Hague, Dec. 14. On Wednesday last the Sieur *Erkenstern*, Ambassador of *Sweden*, gave in a Memorial to the States-General, in which he acquainted them, that the most Christian King, not being able to consent to the renewing the Treaty at any Town in the Empire, would willingly agree, that *Breda* should be the place; provided, the Prince of *Furstenberg* be set at liberty, and the French Moneys seized at *Cologne*, restored. The Deputies of *Holland* have delivered to the States-General, the consent of their Province to the State of the War, as proposed for the year ensuing, provided, that the three Provinces of *Utrecht*, *Gelderland*, and *Over-Issel*, contribute their full Quotas. We hear as yet nothing certain of the march of the *Swedes*.

Paris, Dec. 15. Our Letters from *Nancy* advise, that the 5 instant Monsieur *de Turenne* came with his Army to *Amptville* near *Ramber-Villiers*, and encamped there; that having an account that the Duke of *Lorraine* was with several Troops at *Espinal*, which place he began to fortify, he resolved to go and remove him from thence, but being on his way, understood, that the said Duke having had news of his march, was retired with great diligence into *Alsacia*; and that at the same time, some other of the Confederate Troops, which had been at *Remirembat*, were likewise retreated from thence; our Letters add, that Monsieur *de Turenne* continued his march towards the *Hu-*

per *Alsacia*, to attack the Enemy, though most people, who consider how far the Season is advanced, cannot but think he will now put his Troops into Winter Quarters. Several persons who were Prisoners in the *Basilie*, on account of Monsieur *de Rohan's* business, have been found innocent thereof, and restored to their liberty; We are told, that his Majesty having caused an answer to be made to the Memorial of the Baron *Sper*, Ambassador Extraordinary from *Sweden*, in it proposes *Breda*, as a fit place for the renewing the Assembly of the Ambassadors of the several Warring Parties, in order to a Peace; his Majesty declaring, that he is ready to send his Ambassadors thither, as soon as he shall have received satisfaction in those Matters, which obliged his Majesty to recall them from *Cologne*.

Swansey, Dec. 2. We hear of the sad effects of the late Storms, in several parts of *Wales*. Some Seamen are come hither, who say, they belonged to the *Mary* of *London*; burthen 200 Tuns, and mounted with 10 Guns. Capt. *Shaw* Commander, bound from *France* for *Gibraltar*, lost on this Coast.

Falmouth, Dec. 3. The 1 instant put to Sea the four French Men of War, that were here in Port. The 2, arrived here the Fidelity of this place, with Wine from the *Canaries*.

Plimouth, Dec. 4. This day about noon arrived here, His Majesties Ship the *Bonaventure*, Captain *John Wood*, Commander, and under his Convoy, the *Levanus* and *Bonaventure* Merchantmen, from *Scanderoon*.

Lime, Dec. 5. Yesterday arrived here the *Tanc*, and *Prosper*, both belonging to this place from *Mars*, from whence they came in 24 hours, in company of 5 others, bound for *Topham*, *Dartmouth*, &c. the Masters inform us of two English Merchantmen, that have been left upon that Coast; a little before their coming from thence, viz. a Ship bound from *Virginia* for *London*, laden with about 600 Hogsheads of Tobacco, one *Tucker* Merchant, most of the Men saving themselves upon the Rocks, the other bound from *Bordeaux*, one *Tony* Commander.

Marwick, Dec. 5. Yesterday arrived here one of our *Pacquet* Boats from the *Briel*, the Master whereof informs us, that 7 or 8 Ships, some Dutch and some English, were lost on that Coast, in the late bad weather.

Wimborne, Dec. 6. The last night we had a very violent Storm but we hear not as yet of any harm done; at *Corn* are many Merchantmen, expecting an Easterly wind.

Deal, Dec. 6. This forenoon a Merchantman of 200 Tuns, came ashore upon the *Goodwin* Sands, the wind is very high, so that no Boat can go off.

Whitehall, Dec. 8. On Friday last the Right Honourable the Earl of *Strafford*, was sworn of His Majesties most Honourable Privy Council, which is here repeated, to remove the mistake, which may be occasioned by the error that happened in this Article of the last Gazette.
