P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council,

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Order in Council of the Twenty-seventh Day of March last, to direct, That the Bounties given by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Eleventh Day of the same Month, of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, of Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, and of Twenty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, should be continued to be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of this Instant April, voluntarily Enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds, likewise given by the said Proclamation, should be continued to be paid to any Person, who should, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman, or Seamen, who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time limited by His Majesty's said Order in Council, for paying the said Bounties and Rewards, is now near expiring; and His Majesty's Service requiring that the same should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby Ordered, That the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of this Instant April, to Tuesday the Twenty-seventh Day of May next inclusive.—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Henry Cavendish, of Doveridge, in the County of Derby, Esq; the Dignity of a Baronet of the Kingdom of Great Britain.

Lisbon, March 18. On the 9th Instant, one of our Men of War arrived here from Rio de Janeiro, having on board about two Millions of Cruzades on the King's Account, and a Million and half for the Merchants. We learn by some Dispatches brought by this Ship, that the Spanish and Portuguese Troops, who marched in October last towards the Topas Indians, in order to prevent their forming any Enterprize to the Prejudice of the two Crowns, had been obliged to return back for want of Provisions. The Fleet bound for the Bay of All Saints, consisting of 14 Merchantmen, put to Sea a few Days ago, under Convoy of a Man of War, commanded by Don Joseph de Torres.

Naples, April 1. Their Majesties and the Royal Family will set out towards the End of this Week for Portici, where 'tis believed they will spend some Time. The King has appointed Father Cavalcanti, of the Religious Order of the Theatins, and one of the Preachers of the Chapel Royal, to be Archbishop of Trani.

Turin, April 8. The Duke de Penthièvre, High Admiral of France, who arrived here last Friday from Milan, has been received with great Marks of Distinction by the King and Royal Family. He lodges at the Chevalier de Chauvelin's, the French Ambassador, where he is visited by the Nobility and Gentry of this City. His Highness proposes to stay here a few Days, and then to proceed on his Return to Paris.

Amsterdam, April 23. The Admiralty of this City have given publick Notice, that some Men of War or Frigats will sail for Lisbon and Cadiz the first fair Wind that shall happen after the first Day of May next, and that all Merchantmen, who shall be then ready to sail, may proceed under their Convoy.

Whitehall, April 26, 1755.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, on Wednesday the 21st of March last, betwixt Eight and Nine in the Evening, five Men broke into the House of Sir Hervey Elwes, Bart. at Stoke in Suffolk, and, by Threats, did oblige him to shew them where his Money was, which they carried away, to the Amount of about One Thousand Pounds, and did wound one of his Servants; they were all armed with Pistols and Cutlasses, shabbily dressed; one was a tall thin Man booted; two were short thin Men without Boots; these three had Masks on the whole Time; one of the other two was about forty Years of Age, full faced, fresh coloured, his Complexion inclined to fair, thick set, about five Feet four Inches high, had no Mask on for some Time, was without Boots; the other was thin bodied, long visaged, of a pale Complexion, believed to have a Scar on the lower Part of his Face, appeared to be about Thirty, five Feet five Inches high, booted, he had no Mask on for some Time: It is believed that a Sixth stood without, the Servant, that was attacked at the Stable, seeing a Man there, who, he thinks, was not amongst those that came into the House, and he heard one say, that he would stand at the Hall Door: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

General Post-Office, April 22, 1755.

Whereas the Post-Boy, carrying the Derby Mail, that was dispatched from this Office on Saturday the 19th Instant, was attack'd between Market Harborough and Kibworth, on Sunday Night the 20th Instant, about Eleven o'Clock, by two Men on Foot, who seized on his Horse's Bridle, and led him to an Hedge about one hundred Yards distant from the Road, where they took off, and rifled the Mail, and took out and carried off the following Bags, viz.

Leicester, Nottingham,
Loughborough, Derby and Ashbourn.

The Boy saith, one of the Robbers was a middle-sized thin Man, and the other a fat jolly tall Man: The middle sized Man had on a light colour'd Coat, and wore his own Hair, which was black, and Part of it platted and pulled over his Face, and his Hat slouched before, and was seemingly a genteel Man. The fat jolly tall Man had on a grey Wigg and Snuff colour'd Coat, and his Hat slouched before. After the Robbery they immediately mounted their Horses, which were tied to the abovementioned Hedge, and rode with full Speed towards Harborough. The Boy adds, that one of the Horses was of a grey Colour, and the other a darkish Colour.

This is therefore to give Notice, that whosoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, both or either of them who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen, or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice, or knowing of this Robbery, shall make Discovery whereby either or both of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of either or both of the said Robbers, be entitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.
