P R E S E N T,

The Lords Justices in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-sixth of April last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily Enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying Rewards to Persons discovering any Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon this Day: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some longer Time—The Lords Justices do therefore Order, and it is hereby Ordered, with the Advice of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, that the Bounty of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, of Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, and of Twenty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall enter themselves in the Royal Navy on or before the Twenty-fourth Day of June next; and that the Reward of Forty Shillings to Persons discovering any Able Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's said Service, be likewise continued to be paid until the said Twenty-fourth Day of June next inclusive.—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Madrid, May 13. We have received Advice, that the two Men of War, which failed lately from *Alicant*, are safely arrived at *Cadiz*, with several Dutch Merchantmen under their Convoy.

Berlin, May 24. The King, accompanied by Prince Frederick of Brunswick, and several General Officers, arrived here on Thursday last from *Potzdamm*, in order to review the Troops of this Garrison, and several other Regiments of Horse and Foot that were ordered to assemble in the Plain of *Templow* for that Purpose; who, after going through their whole Exercise, marched off for their respective Quarters. The Margrave Henry, and the two Princesses his Sisters, are gone to *Stoltzenberg*, where they propose to stay some Time.

Berlin, May 27. We hear from *Freystadt* in Lower *Silesia*, that the River *Sieger* overflowed its Banks a few Days ago, and laid that Town under Water; and that the Stream ran with such Rapidity, as to break down several Arches of the Bridge. By this Accident a great Number of Houses were very much damaged, and several Persons were drowned.

Vienna, May 24. The first Battalion of the Regiment of *Leopold-Daun*, that arrived here the latter End of last Week, to replace a Battalion of the Regiment of *Colloredo*, were reviewed on Wednesday Morning by their Imperial Majesties, who came from *Schonbrunn* for that Purpose. Yesterday died in this City, in the 83d Year of her Age, *Anne-Marguerite*, Princess Dowager of *Estershausen*, formerly Great Mistress of the Household to the late Empress *Amelia*.

Copenhagen, May 24. The King, who arrived here last Night from *Fredensbourg*, intends to return thither again on Tuesday next. The Regiments appointed to form a Camp near this City, will be all assembled this Evening; and their Majesties, with the Royal Family, intend to remove in a few Days from *Fredensbourg* to *Fredericksberg*, in order to review those Troops, and see them go through their Exercise.

Manheim, May 28. The Elector our Sovereign's Intention of visiting the Dutchies of *Julliers* and *Burgues*, is laid aside for some Time, his Electoral Highness having declared his Resolution of setting out, on the 3d of next Month, for *Schwetzingen*, where he proposes to spend Part of the Summer with the Electress his Spouse.

Hague, June 3. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, who is in perfect Health with her Children at *Soestdyk*, is expected here next Saturday. The Deputies, whom their High Mightinesses have appointed to go into Dutch Flanders, to change the Magistrates of the several Towns, will set out the End of this Week, or the Beginning of next, in order to acquit themselves of that Commission.
