The Lords Justices in Council.

IT was this Day Ordered by the Lords Justices in Council, That the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Tuesday the First Day of July next, should be further prorogued to Thursday the Fourteenth Day of August following.

Naples, May 30. The Marquess de Fogliani being upon the Point of setting out for Sicily, in order to take Possession of the important Employment of Viceroy of that Kingdom, the Marquesses Tanucci and Gregori, who were lately appointed to succeed that Minister, the one in the Department of Foreign Affairs, and the other in that of War and Marine, have already began to do Business in their respective Offices.

Vienna, May 31. Field Marshal Prince Lichtenstein is set out from hence for Budweis in Bohemia, in order to review the Body of Artillery that is lately assembled there. The Regiment of Cuirassiers of Archduke Peter Leopold is daily expected here, in order to relieve that of Radicati.

Rome, May 31. The Margrave of Bareith set out on the 16th Instant for Naples, and was followed the next Day by the Margravine, who, on her Passage by Marino, was complimented by Count Lagnasco, and entertained with a handsome Refreshment in a Convent of Monks. On the 17th Cardinal Tempi, the late Nuncio to the King of Portugal, arrived in this City from Florence. On the 18th the French Ambassador had a long private-Audience of the Pope, and on the 22d he and his Lady set out for Frascati for a few Weeks. On the 25th the Pope, attended by his Retinue and Guards, set out for Castle Gandolfo, as usual at this Season, for a Month, and was complimented at a Place called the Frattocchie by the Constable Colonna, who entertained the Pope with Re-

freshments; and, on his Arrival in the Evening at Castle Gandolfo, was presented by the Constable with divers Sorts of Eatables, which were carried there by twelve Servants. Cardinal Besozzi is taken dangerously ill at Tivoli.

Dresden, June 4. The Regiment of Foot, commanded by Count Frieze, who died lately at Paris, is given to Prince Charles Maximilian, second Son to the Prince Royal. Whilst the King was at Fraustadt, his Majesty conferred the Palatinate of Novogorod on Prince Jablonsky, whose Post of Great Cup-bearer of the Dutchy of Lithuania, was given at the same Time to the young Count Poniatowsky, second Son to the Palatin of Cracow.

Florence, June 7. On the 22d past the Emperor's two Ships of War, after having relieved the Garrison at Port Ferrajo, and landed at Leghorn from thence a Battalion of the second Tuscan Regiment, sailed for Malta, to escort to Leghorn such Vessels, under the Emperor's Colours, as, since the Rupture of the Algerines, may have taken Refuge there. On the 29th the Duke of St. Elizabeth, Envoy from the King of the Two Sicilies to that of Poland, arrived here from Rome, and on the 2d Instant proceeded on his Journey to Dresden.

Turin, June 7. We are informed here from Valence, that on the 26th of last Month the famous Mandrin was broke on the Wheel there; and that one St. Pierre, a Savoyard, who was seized with him at Rochfort in Savoy, was put to Death the same Day in the same Manner.

Hague, June 12. M. Paravicini, our late Consul at Algiers, from whence he was obliged to depart at the Time they declared War against these Provinces, is arrived here from thence.

Hamburgh, June 13. Count Wedel-Fries arrived here the 10th, and proceeded Yesterday upon his Journey to Paris, being appointed to succeed M. de-Reventlau at the Court of France, as Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark. The Dutch Minister M. Buys, having obtained from the States, Leave of Absence from his Post at Hamburgh for two Months, set out Yesterday for Holland by the Way of Hanover.

Hamburgb, June 17. The Hereditary Prince of Hesse set out from hence the 13th for Cassel.

Paris, June 18. His most Christian Majesty went the Day before Yesterday to Cresly, where he stays till Saturday; the rest of the Royal Family are at Versailles. The 2d of next Month the Court goes to Compiègne, and will remain there till the 12th of August. The King has given Madame de Lowendahl a Pension of 20,000 Livres since the Death of her Husband the late Marshal de Lowendahl; and has disposed of the Marshal's Regiment in Favour of his Son, who is about 13 or 14 Years of Age.
