Count Flemming, Treasurer of Lithuania, who arrived here a few Days ago, was attacked on the Road near Socharczew, by a Gang of Robbers, who took from him all his Money, and every Thing else

of Value.

Wurtzbourg, June 6. On Wednesday last our new Prince Bishop received the Homage of the Officers of the several Regiments of Horse and Foot in his Service; and on Monday next his Serene Highness is to receive the same from the Magistrates of this City in a Body.
