HEREAS by His Majefty's Proclamation, bearing Date the Eleventh Day of November laft, "For recalling and prohibiting Seamen from ferving Foreign Princes and States ; for 44 giving Encouragement to Seamen and Able-\* bodied Landmen, to enter themselves on Board \* His Majefty's Ships of War; for granting " Rewards for difcovering fuch Seamen as shall " conceal themfelves; and also for taking up all " Straggling Seamen;" His Majefty was graci-oufly pleafed to promife and declare, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary man, and of Finity similings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and alfo that the Bounty of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, thould be paid to every fuch Seaman and Land-man réflectively, who thould, on or before the Thirty fire, Day of this Infant December to Thirty first Day of this Instant December, voluntarily enter themfelves to ferve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by the faid Proclamation ; as likewife that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to any Person who should, on or before the faid Thirty first Day of this Instant, difcover any Seaman, or Seamen, who fhould conceal themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman, or Seamen, should be taken for His Majesty's Service : And whereas the Time limited for paying the faid Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, that the fame should be continued for fome longer Time; His Majesty, with the Ad-vice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the Time limited by the faid Proclamation, for Payment of the faid Bounties and Rewards, be prolor ged and extended from the faid Thirty First appoint Benner Noel, Elq, to be Lieutenant Day of this Instant December, to the Thirty Colonel to the Coldstream Regiment of Foot First Day of January next inclusive. Bern, Dec. 13. On Tuesday the oth In-fant, between the Hours of Two and Three in the Afternoon, we had here a pretty violent Shock of an Earthquake, which lasted about one Minute. It was more fensibly feit in some Districts of the Town than others, particularly the lower Part, and in those Houses that stand near the River. The Letters that are fince come in from the Pays de Vaud, which borders on the Lake of Geneva, from this last City, and from several Parts of Switzerland (Basil in particular) mention this Phenomenon, and take Notice of it, as having been observed presty near about the same Hour. We do not how? ever hear of its having cauled any Damage, either here or elfowhere ; but the Conffernation is reprefented as having been general, and greater than can well be expressed, from the Impresfion still left on most Minds, by the fatal Cataftrophe that lately happened at Lisbon.
