AT the Court at St. James's the 28th Day of February 1756,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 27th of January last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant February— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty; nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 31st Day of March next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said 31st Day of March next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Warsaw, Feb. 28. The Assessorial Tribunal of the Crown having ended its Session, most of the Members are gone into the Country; and the President, Count Malachowski, set out last Sunday Morning for Skierniewicz, on a Visit to the Primate of the Kingdom.

Stockholm, March 1. The Court resides for the present at Ulrichsdall, where the King was a few Days ago a little indisposed, but his Majesty is now perfectly recovered. Several Persons have been lately secured in this City, and committed to Prison, for having spoke too freely of some of the principal Members of the Diet.

Copenhagen, March 6. Yesterday the King assisted at the Opening of the annual Session of the High Tribunal of Justice of this Kingdom. The same Day Count Rosenbergh, Envoy Extraordinary from their Imperial Majesties, took his Audience of Leave of this Court, and will set out in a few Days on his Return to Vienna, from whence he is to go to Madrid with the same Character. The Squadron of Men of War that has been for some Time equipping in this Port, is near ready, but its Destination is not yet known.

Turin, March 6. Yesterday the Court went into Mourning, for nine Days, for the Death of the Dutchess Dowager of Holstein, Mother to the King of Sweden.
