AT the Court at St. James's the 30th Day of March 1756,

P R E S E N T,

The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the 28th of February last, for paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; And likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the 31st Day of this Instant March.— And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given should be continued to be paid for some Time longer:— It is thereupon this Day Ordered in Council, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the 30th Day of April next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 11th Day of November last. And likewise that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said 30th Day of April next, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly. *W. Sharpe.*

Venice, March 5. Last Week a Man went into the House of Sig. Maruzzi, a principal Greek Merchant, and shot him dead upon the Spot. The Murderer being stopt in the House, gave himself several Wounds, of which he died in Prison two or three Days after. He confessed before the Magistrate, that he committed the horrid Fact out of Revenge, because Sig. Maruzzi had sequestered his Effects for the Payment of a Debt which he owed him. On the Thursday before Lent, the Doge and Senate were present at a Firework and other publick Shews exhibited in St. Mark's Place, according to annual Custom, in Memory of a signal Victory obtained in the year 1170, over Uldarick,

Patriarch of Aquileia, and taking him Prisoner. Yesterday were publickly burnt in St. Mark's Place, by Order of the Magistrates, several Copies of a Greek Treatise, printed without Licence, in Defence of the Doctrines of the Greek Church, and in Opposition to those of the Roman Catholick. There was a violent Shock of an Earthquake in Corfu the 14th past, and since that Time a slight one at Feltre.

Turin, March 13. The Court goes out of Mourning To-morrow for the Dutchess Dowager of Holstein. Yesterday her Royal Highness the Dutchess of Savoy saw Company, as usual, in the State-Apartments.

Warsaw, March 13. The great Quantity of Rain that has fallen here within these few Days past, and the melting of the Snow, have raised the Waters of the Vistula so high, that we are very apprehensive lest it should overflow its Banks, and lay the Country round us under Water.

Madrid, March 15. Their Catholick Majesties continue in good Health at their Palace of Buen-Retiro; where they received, this Morning, the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, and Nobility, on the Occasion of its being the Birth-Day of the Infante Duke of Parma. The Conde de Maceda, who has been appointed by his Catholick Majesty to reside, as his Ambassador, at the Court of Portugal, has taken his Leave, in order to set out for Lisbon, from whence the Conde de Aranda is soon expected.

Copenhagen, March 15. This Morning two Men of War that have been for some Time past equipping here, went out of Dock into our Road, and will put to Sea in a few Days.

Brussels, March 23. The Regiments of Beauvoisis and Lionnois marched on the 13th and 15th Instant for Brittany, the first from Landrecies and the other from Valenciennes. Thirty-six Waggons have been lately sent from Douay to Dunkirk with Bullets and Gun Powder, and the French Work Night and Day in all their Arsenals. Marshal Duke de Richelieu, the Duke de Mirepoix, and all the other General Officers who are appointed to command on the Coasts of the Mediterranean, set out from Paris on Thursday last, the 18th Instant. M. de Moncalm, who is to command the French Troops in Canada, set out for Brest the 15th Instant, after having been advanced to the Rank of a Major General.

Hague, March 28. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has conferred on M. Motman the Office of Bailiff or Droffard of the Lordships of Rosendaal and Nispen. A few Days ago her Royal Highness was pleased to make a considerable Military Promotion.
