

Sensible as we are of the many Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's most mild and auspicious Reign, any Attempt to disturb your Repose cannot fail of raising our just Resentment; but the late unprovok'd Attacks that have been made upon your Majesty's American Dominions, by our perfidious Neighbours, in the Time of full Peace, and in Breach of the most solemn Treaties, and above all, their most insolent and outrageous Threats against these your Kingdoms, must fire the Indignation of every Loyal Briton.

In this Time of real Danger we have the most entire Confidence in your Majesty's Wisdom, we doubt not but every Precaution has been, and will be taken, for the Defence of these Kingdoms, that Prudence can suggest; and we beg leave to assure your Majesty, that we will not only cheerfully submit to such Inconveniences as the Exigency of the State may require, but we will, in our several Stations, and as far as in us lies, heartily and vigorously exert ourselves in the Execution of all such Measures, as your Majesty in your Royal Wisdom shall judge to be either necessary or proper for the Defence and Security of your Crown and Kingdoms.

Turin, March 27. Thursday last, being the Birth-day of her Royal Highness Madame Louise, the Court was very brilliant, and the King received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers and Nobility on the Occasion. This Morning His Sardinian Majesty, and her Royal Highness the Dutchess of Savoy, did the Spanish Ambassador the Honour to stand Godfather and Godmother to his Excellency's Child.

Copenhagen, April 3. The 31st past, having been the Anniversary of the King of Denmark's Birth-day, was celebrated here with all such Demonstrations of Joy, as the Solemnity of the present Season would permit: There was a numerous and splendid Appearance at Court, the Knights wore the uniform Habit of their respective Orders, and some Gold and Silver Medals, struck in the Year 1753, upon the Birth of Prince Friderick, were given out on this Occasion: The Ministers of State and a few Persons of the first Distinction had the former, but the latter were presented to all who dined at the Grand Marshal's three large Tables, and to many others. The Evening concluded with an Appartment at Court, and an elegant Supper in the usual Manner, but no Ball.

Brussel, April 9. We have received from Dunkirk a Confirmation of the Prince of Soubise, Lieutenant General St. Germain, and the Duke de Chaulnes's Arrival there this Day Se'nnight; and we are now informed, that Marshal de Belle Isle and the Prince of Conti, with many other General Officers, are expected there this Day; and that several of the most eminent Engineers in the French Service, are likewise arrived there, in order to consult, as it is imagined, about the perfect Reestablishment of the Harbour and Fortifications of that Place.
