

Turin, April 10. Yesterday Morning a Courier arrived here from Rome, and brought an Account of the Pope's having made, on the 5th of this Month, a Promotion of nine Cardinals, in which the Archbishop of Turin was comprehended.

Venice, April 14. On Sunday last a Courier arrived from Rome, with the red Callot for Count Trautson, the Archbishop of Vienna, upon his being promoted to the Dignity of Cardinal at the Empress Queen's Nomination; and the same Courier set out next Day for Constance, with the Callot for the Bishop of that Place, who had the Emperor's Nomination. Baron Steinberg, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Great Britain, as Elector of Hanover, arrived here some Days ago; as did Yesterday Count Flemming, Envoy Extraordinary from Saxony.

Dresden, April 18. Prince Xavier, who was confined to his Apartments for several Days by a severe Indisposition, is now perfectly recovered, and appeared to Day in publick. An Express is arrived here with an Account, that the Prince's of Saxe Cobourg was safely delivered of a Prince on Monday last, who was soon after baptized by the Names of Ferdinand-Auguste-Henry.

Cologne, April 22. The Marquess de Montteil, the new French Minister to this Court, arrived at Bonn on the 15th Instant. Last Monday he had his first publick Audience of the Elector, to whom he presented his Credential Letters, and was invited to dine at Court. On Tuesday the Elector set out for Arensburg, from whence his Electoral Highness intends to go to Bruhl on the 4th of May.

Amsterdam, April 26. The College of the Admiralty of this City have caused publick Notice to be given, that Men of War will be ready to sail from the Texel the Beginning of next Month, in order to convoy the Merchantmen bound for Spain and Portugal.

Brussels, April 27. Our Advices from the Frontiers only mention that the Regiment d'Apchon, Dragoons, which was quartered at Cambrai, is arrived at Dunkirk; and, that the Regiment du Roi, Infantry, and some other Corps that were at Nancy, and other Places in Lorraine, are ordered to advance towards the Coasts of Picardy.

Hague, April 27. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland are separated till Tuesday the 11th of next Month. Baron Wassenauer, who is appointed to command the Men of War belonging to this Republick in the Mediterranean, has taken his Leave of her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and of the President of the Week, and proposes to set out next Thursday for Helvoetsluis, in order to hoist his Flag on board the Princess Caroline Man of War, now at Anchor in that Road.
